THE ZURICH CONFERENCE.

The Monitor officially announces, that on the 17th, a treaty of peace was signed at Zurich between France and Austria.

Referring to the contemplated European Congress, the Paris correspondence of the London Times says: "The Powers will meet, viz.—Sardinia, Spain, Sweden, Portugal, Naples and Rome and the five great Powers. The London Post says that preliminary negotiations for a Congress are daily going on, it being much easier to plan a Congress than to complete the necessary preliminaries. England is pledged to enter no Congress unless the independence and free action of Central Italy are understood to be guaranteed.

It is understood that the question of the Lombardy debt was left to the arbitration of the King of the Belgians.

The Times of this morning states that the terms of the Zurich treaty are almost identical with those agreed to at Villa Franca, and that peace is one of the questions which distinguished Italy and Europe, seems settled.

The Morning Post says, that, assuming the information to be correct, the further proposals concerning the questions left upon which it is proposed to submit to the approval of the Congress, are of such a nature that the diplomatists at Zurich have only hesitated on matters of fresh difficulties.

England can and will take no part in any Congress of which the first principle is not the recognition of the rights of the Romanians and Tuscans, no less than the Modenese and Parmense States to self government.

The first cannon shot fired to force on the people of Romagna, Modena and Tuscany, any other rulers than the Italian princes, whom they so fondly put their trust, will be the signal of a conflict as deadly as that just brought to a close.

GREAT BRITAIN.
The Earl of Westmoreland is dead.

Cabinet Councils and meetings of ministers were being frequently held in London, in reference to, and in preparation, for the Italian question.

The Stock Exchange had been buoyant at daily improving prices. Money was easy and the supply very abundant.

London, Wednesday.—The Daily News City article says the tendency of the stock market is still decidedly to improvement.

At one period on Tuesday a fresh rise of 1/2 per cent. was obtained. A little dullness was occasioned in the response of the Paris Bourse, but closed 1/2 higher than on Monday.

The demand for money was moderate. In the open market 2 1/2 may be considered the nearest rate for the best bills having three months to run. No billion operations at the bank.

The Times City article says the confirmation of the news of the signing of the peace treaty at Zurich, the settlement of the dispute between Spain and Morocco, and above all, the continued abundance of capital, seeking investment caused the English funds to open on Tuesday with increased firmness, and subsequently to experience a further advance. Consols fell off steady at an improvement of 1/2. There was an increased demand for money on Tuesday, and the rate in the open market was fully 2 1/2 per cent.

The foreign exchanges were generally steady. The British Railway stocks were firm and advancing, but closed with a reaction. The ship Dover Castle, from Melbourne, with gold dust to the amount of £330,000 and 100,000 in sovereigns, was off Plymouth last night.

FRANCE.
It was reported that the Archbishop of Bordeaux would soon visit Rome at the desire of the Emperor, to press upon the Pope the necessity for reform.

The Monteur de la Flotte explains that the French fleet will be sent to Morocco on account of the attitude assumed by England towards Spain, the English fleet probably being intended to counterbalance its operations.

The Paris Patrie contradicts the statement that the Sultan had ordered the suspension of the work on the Suez Canal, but it is nevertheless asserted that the works had been entirely discontinued.

It is asserted that France will only recall her forces from Rome when the form of Government therein renders the French no longer necessary.

ITALY.
The King of Sardinia had visited Genoa, amidst much enthusiasm. While there he received the dowager Empress of Russia.

The official Piedmontese Gazette states that on a presentation made by Sardinia, Austria had suspended the works at Locca d'Orfo, and had notified that the mines were blown up by mistake, expressing at the same time regret at the occurrence.

Many fresh arrests were made at Parma on account of the late assassination. Tranquillity prevailed.

A committee at Milan, had been making attempts to revolutionize Venice and the Southern Tyrol, and these efforts to weaken the hold of Austria had not been entirely fruitless.

The Sardinian government were seriously considering the expediency of fortifying Brescia, Lonata and Cremona.

The Swiss Federal Council have bought the Austrian steamers on Lago Maggiore.

It is said that the Pope, acting in concert with the Emperor Napoleon, will address a manifesto to the States of the church.

The Neapolitan army on the frontiers was continually increasing, and will amount to 20,000. General activity prevailed in the

arsenals, and the whole army was gradually being placed on a war footing.

INDIA AND CHINA.

[By the Red Sea Telegraph.]
The Bombay mail of Sept. 27, reached Aden on the 6th.

Central India is still unsettled. The frontier districts of Nepal are occupied by the Nawa and his followers.

The Waghers are still in insurrection, and a force was to be sent against them.

Exchange of Bombay is 10s 7-8d. Imports continued active, but a fall in price was anticipated. Exports quiet. Freight without improvement.

The authorities at Peking are represented to be ready to receive the British Minister in a friendly manner. Meanwhile the Indian government had been applied to for 15,000 troops for China, and two regiments were under orders to depart.

Three Days later from Europe.

ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICA.
The steamship America, which sailed from Liverpool at 3 p.m. on the 22d ult. arrived at Halifax at 6 p.m. on Thursday.

The Vanderbilt arrived at Southampton on the 19th; the City of Baltimore at Queenstown on the 20th, and Liverpool early on the 21st; and the North American at Liverpool on the 20th.

THE TREATY OF PEACE.
A Zurich telegram of the 18th says: "The principal points of the Treaty of Peace between France and Austria have been signed by the Plenipotentiaries, but not ratified by the two governments. They are as follows:—Austria gives up Lombardy, except Mantua, Peschiera, and as far as the frontier line, fixed by the special commission, to France, who transfers it to Piedmont. The pensions required in Lombardy are to be paid by the new government.—Piedmont to pay Austria forty million of florins.

It will be seen from the above that the treaty is merely an amplification of the Villa Franca agreement.

A Zurich telegram of the 21st announces that Count Colerado was that morning attacked with apoplexy; four physicians were attending him, but there were little hopes of his recovery.

PROJECTED CONGRESS.
The Paris Pays intimates, of its own knowledge, that in a Congress accepted in principle by the English government, the only Powers to be represented, besides the great ones, will be Piedmont and the Pope, and Naples under certain eventualities.

Admission of Spain might be natural, but Sweden and Portugal have no claim.

Independence Belge says, out of compliment to Napoleon, Austria proposed that Congress should sit in Paris, but this was declined, and chances favored Brussels.

Policy of England taking part in Congress was being canvassed by the press and generally arguments were against it.

The London Times and Herald are both adverse to England joining any European Congress on Italian affairs.

BRITAIN.
The Directors of the Great Eastern held a meeting on board on the 19th, and it is authoritatively announced that the departure of the vessel for America has been postponed *Sine die*, and orders given that all passage-money received be returned. No time will be fixed for the transatlantic voyage until good progress has been made in fitting out the ship in thorough sea-going completeness, and according to some authorities there is no likelihood of the voyage being made before next Spring. The ship would remain at Holyhead about ten days longer as it then goes to Southampton to complete her fittings, after which a trip to Lisbon is spoken of. It is stated that in her present condition the Directors will not accept the ship from Scott Russell.

FRANCE.
Reported that Emperor refused granting audience to deputation from Bologna, but had received those from Duchies.

Sardinian Minister of Foreign Affairs left Paris for London.

Paris correspondent of London Herald continues to point out immense naval armaments armis are in progress, particularly at Toulon, where, he says, no less than twenty large ships are being constructed.

Bourse: Bull and declining; rentes closed heavy on 21st at 69 5/8.

Projected China expedition had been discussed in Council of Ministers; proposed to dispatch eighteen thousand men, but nothing definite arrived at; troops not to leave before end of year.

ITALY.
Marshal Vailant is reported having written to Napoleon, suggesting the occupation be responsible for three fifths of the debt of Monte-Lombardo Venetia, making the debt in all transferred to Sardinia, two hundred and fifty million of francs. The two contracting Powers will unite their efforts in order that the reform is the Administration should be carried out by the Pope.

The rights of the Dukes of Tuscany, Modena, and Parma are expressly reserved. The two Emperors will assist with all their power the formation of a Confederation.—The ratifications are to be exchanged at Zurich of the Duchies by French troops to prevent a civil war breaking out.

The Neapolitan Army on the Roman frontier was increasing, and it was rumored that the Neapolitan troops had landed at Neoms.

A considerable excitement prevailed in Piedmont on account of the conditions of the Zurich Treaty.

The King of Sardinia, in receiving the deputation from the Municipality of Genoa,

reiterated his intention to defend the cause of Italian independence to the utmost of his power. He expressed a hope that wishes of Italy would be granted.

The Paris correspondent of the London Herald says that the object of the Sardinian Minister of Foreign Affairs in visiting Paris is to obtain the Emperor's consent, pending the occupation of Central Italy by the Piedmontese troops, and the appointment of Prince Carignano as Regent of the Duchies and Legations.

The Communal Council of Milan has voted one hundred thousand francs towards Garibaldi's subscription for the purchase of muskets.

It was reported at Turin that in consequence of Neapolitan war ships having been signalled in a hostile attitude off the Coast of Romagna, a Piedmontese squadron had been ordered round into the Adriatic.

It is asserted that there has been an insurrectionary movement in Palermo, but it was suppressed. One story says that a hundred and fifty rebels were killed, but it lacks confirmation.

Justice continued to be energetically carried out in Parma. New arrests had taken place. The Municipality determined on the destruction of the Column on which the head of Anvitte was placed.

It was expected that the effective strength of the new Sardinian Army will be 300,000 men, exclusive of rifle corps and Military Marine. In addition, there will be throughout the Kingdom about six hundred thousand National guards. The financial affairs of Naples are represented as critical, and a loan of six millions stg. is spoken of.

LATEST.—Turin, 21st.—The official Piedmontese Gazette publishes a decree authorizing the finance Minister to contract a loan of one hundred million francs by means of the alienation of the rents on the public debt to that amount.

Count Rogier, Minister of Belgium, has arrived at Turin.

SPAIN.
The Correspondencia Autografa announces that in consequence of unsatisfactory declarations made by the Emperor of Morocco, the Council of Ministers has resolved to have recourse to arms. The same journal approves of the action of the government in ordering the Spanish Consul to leave Tangier.

By the R. M. Steamship America, we have news from England to the 22d ult. The Treaty of Peace between France and Austria has been agreed upon, signed by the Plenipotentiaries, and is to be ratified at Zurich.

From the terms of the treaty, it is not likely to be satisfactory to Italy, which will never agree to Austrian rule in any of the Italian Provinces; in fact the Italian question becomes every day more complicated.

The sailing of the Great Eastern for America, has been indefinitely postponed, and the ship will be thoroughly fitted out for sea-voyages.

The funeral of the late Robert Stephenson, the eminent Engineer, took place on the 21st ult., and was attended by leading men of rank and profession.—Experiments had been made on the old Atlantic cable by Messrs. Barmore and Robinson, and encouragement held out, of the resuscitation of the old, and the laying of a new cable.—The weather in England had been wintry, frost and snow having appeared.—Immense naval preparations were still going on in France; at Toulon twenty large ships were in course of construction.—The Chinese expedition had been discussed by Ministers, and France will send 18,000 men; not to leave before December.—Spain had resolved to declare war against Morocco.—The price of Breadstuffs was unchanged and dull. Consols 96 1/2.

The Special Court of Oyer and Terminer was opened here yesterday for the trial of the prisoners now in jail, for capital offences. His Honor, Mr. Justice RITCHIE, presiding. The Grand Jury found a true Bill against Gardner, for forging Lodge.

SIR JAMES CARTER.—From a paragraph in another column, it will be noticed that Her Majesty, the Queen, has been pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood on Chief Justice Carter. The honour is as much provincial as personal, and is another proof that the Province and its inhabitants are not passed over by the Imperial Government.

Sir James Carter is deservedly esteemed and respected, not only by the gentlemen of the Bar, but by the people generally.

The murder of a man named Wiseman, took place near Salisbury, on Saturday night.

He had a large sum of money on his person in the afternoon, which had been taken from his pocket by the murderers. Government had offered a reward for their apprehension.

The St. John Globe has taken a step in advance on Railway extension, from St. John to the United States. The articles upon this (to St. John) important subject, are well conceived and ably written. The writer, by referring to the files of the New-Brunswick for 1854 or 1855, will find several excellent letters upon the same subject, containing information with respect to the route, statistics, &c., which might be useful in supporting his arguments. Travelling districts before unexplored by the white man, that offer, entered Africa on east coast, worked up the northward and westward, to the Mountains of the Moon, in their vicinity had discovered a vast lake or inland sea, to which he has given the name of Victoria Nyanza, and which is every reason to believe is the long-sought Fountains of the Nile. The Honourable James Carter, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Province of New Brunswick, has had conferred upon him by Her Majesty, the honour of Knighthood. FIRE IN BRONX.—The Sugar Refinery of 5th Adams St. (Couch-street), was destroyed by fire Wednesday evening. The loss is \$150,000, which is mostly covered by insurance. The flames were only quenched after a struggle by the firemen of nearly six hours.

A Russian authority estimates the loss of the Chinese in the late action at the mouth of the Peiho or Tien-sin hoo river at 1000 killed; the number of the wounded is not stated. Some of the wounded English were still in the hands of the Chinese at the last accounts, but were well treated.

A Novelty in Fashion.
The New York Express states that among the novelties recently introduced in Ladies' apparel, is a new art of suspenders. They bear resemblance to those worn by gentlemen, except that they are made of delicate white elastic fabric, with fringed edges about one inch wide, and are attached to the skirt by buttons in like manner. We doubt not this invention will be generally adopted with a view to relieve the waist of the unlimited strings, which such habiliments necessarily produce. From this situation he was rescued in an exhausted state and considerably bruised. He was carried home and has since recovered. His escape was almost a miracle, many men having gone through the Falls the same way before, but none of them ever picked up alive.—[Herald.]
