## The Way to Get Rich.

Cecil has said somewhere, that the only state of future torment much regarded or feared nowadays is Poverty. How to make money—how to acquire rapidly abundant wealth—is the general and anxious inquiry. Somebody has lately published a book purporting to lay bare the whole art and mystery of money making—including the difficult feat of making the first \$1000—for the paltry sum of one dollar. Fired with emulation, we propose to contribute our mite towards the development of auriferous science.

Let us begin by frankly confessing that we know no royal road to desirable wealth, and greatly doubt the existence of any. We have heard of this or that man making a great pile in a day or night, or some other short period, by speculation, forestalling, gambling, or something of the sort, but have no faith in that sort of acquisition as either desirable or (save in rare instances) practicable. The Old book says, "He that maketh haste to be rich shall not be innocent"—and a more important truth has rarely appeared in any book. If those who are hot on the scent of Coffee plantations in Central America or Sugar estates in Cuba don't believe it now, ninety-nine in every hundred of them will rue their skepticism before they shall be ten years older.

Nor can we advise any one to rush to Pike's Peak in quest of the eagerly coveted gold. A good many are now steaming thither, and more perhaps will follow them, some of whom will probably succeed in their quest, while a far larger number will return poorer than they went, beside being sick, sore and weary. Of the few who make any thing of it, the new El Dorado, many more will use their good fortune in success in gambling or poodling than in persons digging gold.

Still less can we counsel any young man to seek a classic education, with a view to eminence in some profession. The professions are all overdone; it would be a blessed thing for all if not another lawyer or doctor should be ground out during the next ten years. The market is already glutted, and the stock held for a better demand, is deplorably heavy.

Nor do we think it well for even one more youth to addict himself to trade. There are this day as many as two persons engaged in selling goods to each twenty families throughout the country. In other words: Productive Industry is paying about one-quarter of its products for the trouble of exchanging them, not taking into account the cost of transportation. If we could reduce our aggregate of merchants of all grades by three-fourths, the remainder might thrive while selling goods at one half the profit now charged.

And yet we believe the world never afforded larger or better opportunities for acquiring wealth than it does just now; and that there is no better place for trying than our own country affords. Let us give a few hints on this head to those who may need them. We will suppose the inquirer to be a young man of fifteen to twenty, whose educational advantages have been meagre, and who is not thoroughly qualified for any field of productive labor. How shall we set about getting rich? We say—

1. Consider whether you would prefer to be a farmer or an artisan, and, if the latter, of what trade. Having decided, keep your eye steadily on the pursuit you prefer, and find employment in it as soon as possible—doing meantime the best thing that offers, though that be chopping cordwood at two shillings per cord. Never be idle a secular day when there is any work to be had; and if there is absolutely none, where you now are, keep in motion towards a less crowded locality till you find some. Having found work, stick to it heartily and faithfully, and, if it pays you but twenty-five cents a day, contrive some way of living upon twenty.

2. Whenever you can find employment in the pursuit you mean to live by, accept it, unless withheld by the necessity of earning more at something else in order to pay your debts. And, in the deciding where first to follow so as in time to master the calling you have chosen, prefer the place where you can learn most and fastest to that where you can obtain the largest pay.

3. Be sure that work and thought go together. Keep your eyes wide open and your mind intent and active. Resolve not only to keep trying till you know how to do everything just right, but to know why this is the best way—the reason is the nature of things. If you have chosen farming be sure to find some time in each week to read the best treatises on that noble calling, and keep a keen eye on all the periodicals within reach that treat of it. Take the best one yourself, and study it carefully. In short, give two, three or four years to the work of mastering your chosen pursuit, so

that thenceforth, through every day learning, you may confidently measure your strength in it with any competitor.

4. Having thus mastered your calling, go to work in it for others for the best wages you can obtain, resolve so to earn them that you will be morally certain to command a larger sum next year. Thus persevere in industry, frugality and temperance, carefully economizing your time and means, until you shall have earned enough to strike out boldly for yourself.

5. By this time, you will have made friends, especially among those of kindred position and habits to your own; and now you can make that sympathetically available for your mutual good. When you can do it without getting in debt, buy a suitable piece of land, and begin to farm for yourself. No matter if it is not over twenty or thirty acres. If it is near a manufacturing town, so much the better; but by all means have your neighbors around you. Do not put up any other but plain comfortable buildings. Set out good fruit trees, have the best garden in the vicinity, and put the stamp of improvement on every rod of your land. See to it that you raise enough of corn, potatoes, and all the staples to meet your wants. If you have a few spare days, work out for your richer neighbors. Raise produce so as to be able to sell to the mechanics—the carpenter, blacksmith and shoemaker who must buy. Let it be seen by every passer-by that your farms every season growing more valuable.

6. Having thus made a home, resolve to spend your remaining days there, and to be one of the best farmers or citizens to be found there or elsewhere. Work steadily but not immoderately; think, observe and read so as to make every blow tell. If your land is timbered, contrive a way to make the timber, if possible, a source of profit; if the soil is rather lean, devote all the time not absolutely needed otherwise to making it richer. Sell only for pay down, and buy likewise for cash. Do not allow your wants to grow faster than your means. Make each mistake or failure a source of instruction and improvement. Form no bad habits—have no liquor on your premises, and no tobacco unless to kill vermin. Have no capital locked up in land that you do not use, unless it be woodland rapidly enhancing in value, nor in fast horses, showy turnouts, nor any sort of fancy property,—at least not till you shall be out of debt, with good buildings, well fenced fields, and every thing comfortable about you. Thus move on quietly and steadily; and if you have no bad luck, you may be beyond the reach of fear and of want in five years, in comfortable circumstances by the end of ten, and as well off as a man need be within twenty.

Do you say this seems a slow humdrum, petty way of getting rich? Well; it is not quite so fast as gambling or slave trading, or making \$100,000 in a month by cornering an adverse party in the Stock market; but let two hundred young men try the course we have so rapidly outlined, against an equal number who try any radically different course—gold mining, trading, speculation, or the professions—and if our party do not, in the average, come out very far ahead, we shall be forced to conclude that the world is a lottery; and that Chance is God. [N. Y. Tribune.]

## European Intelligence.

From papers by the Steamship Nova Scotia.

### THE ZURICH CONFERENCE.

The Montreux official announces, that on the 17th, a treaty of peace was signed at Zurich between France and Austria.

Referring to the contemplated European Congress, the Paris correspondence of the London Times says: "The Powers will meet, viz.:—Sardinia, Spain, Sweden, Portugal, Naples and Rome and the five great Powers."

The London Post says that preliminary negotiations for a Congress are daily going on, it being much easier to plan a Congress than to complete the necessary preliminaries. England is pledged to enter no Congress unless the independence and free action of Central Italy are understood to be guaranteed.

It is understood that the question of the Lombardy debt was left to the arbitration of the King of the Belgians.

The Times of this morning states that the terms of the Zurich treaty are almost identical with those agreed to at Villa Franca, and that peace as one of the questions which distinguished Italy and Europe, seems settled.

### INDIA AND CHINA.

The authorities at Peking are represented to be ready to receive the British Minister in a friendly manner. Meanwhile the Indian government had been applied to for 15,000 troops for China, and two regiments were under orders to depart.

ARRIVAL OF THE AMERICA.

The steamship America, which sailed from Liverpool at 3 p.m. on the 22d ult. arrived at Halifax at 6 p.m. on Thursday.

The Vanderbilt arrived at Southampton on the 19th; the City of Baltimore at Queenstown on the 20th, and Liverpool early on the 21st; and the North American at Liverpool on the 20th.

THE TREATY OF PEACE.

A Zurich telegram of the 18th says: "The principal points of the Treaty of Peace between France and Austria have been signed by the plenipotentiaries, but not ratified by the two governments. They are as follows:—Austria gives up Lombardy, except Mantua, Peschiera, and as far as the frontier line, fixed by the special commission, to France, who transfers it to Piedmont. The pensions acquired in Lombardy are to be paid by the new government.—Piedmont to pay Austria forty million of florins."

It will be seen from the above that the treaty is merely an amplification of the Villa Franca agreement.

A Zurich telegram of the 21st announces that Count Colloredo was that morning attacked with apoplexy; four physicians were attending him, but there were little hopes of his recovery.

PROJECTED CONGRESS.

The Paris Pays intimates, of its own knowledge, that in a Congress accepted in principle by the English government, the only Powers to be represented, besides the great ones, will be Piedmont and the Pope, and Naples under certain eventualities.

Admission of Spain might be natural, but Sweden and Portugal have no claim.

Independence Belge says, out of compliment to Napoleon, Austria proposed that Congress should sit in Paris, but this was declined, and England taking part in Congress was being canvassed by the press and generally arguments were against it.

The London Times and Herald are both adverse to England joining any European Congress on Italian affairs.

BRITAIN.

The Directors of the Great Eastern held a meeting on board on the 19th, and it is authoritatively announced that the departure of the vessel for America has been postponed *Sine die*, and orders given that all passage-money received be returned. No time will be fixed for the transatlantic voyage until good progress has been made in fitting out the ship in thorough sea-going completeness, and according to some authorities there is no likelihood of the voyage being made before next Spring. The ship would remain at Holyhead about ten days longer, and then go to Southampton to complete her fittings, after which a trip to Lisbon is spoken of. It is stated that in her present condition the Directors will not accept the ship from Scott Russell.

FRANCE.

Reported that Emperor refused granting audience to deputation from Bologna, but had received those from Duches.

Sardinian Minister of Foreign Affairs left Paris for London.

Paris correspondent of London Herald continues to point out immense naval armaments are in progress, particularly at Toulon, where, he says, no less than twenty large ships are being constructed.

Bourges full and declining; rentes closed heavy on 21st at 69 65.

Projected China expedition had been discussed in Council of Ministers; proposed to dispatch eighteen thousand men, but nothing definite arrived at; troops not to leave before end of year.

ITALY.

Marshal Vailant is reported having written to Napoleon, suggesting the occupation be responsible for three fifths of the debt of Monte-Lombardo Venetia, making the debt in all transferred to Sardinia, two hundred and fifty million of francs. The two contracting Powers will unite their efforts in order that the reform in the Administration should be carried out by the Pope.

The rights of the Dukes of Tuscany, Modena, and Parma are expressly reserved. The two Emperors will assist with all their power the formation of a Confederation.—The ratifications are to be exchanged at Zurich of the Duchies by French troops to prevent a civil war breaking out.

The Neapolitan Army on the Roman frontier was increasing, and it was rumored that the Neapolitan troops had landed at Ancona.

A considerable excitement prevailed in Piedmont on account of the conditions of the Zurich Treaty.

The King of Sardinia, in receiving the deputation from the Municipality of Genoa,

reiterated his intention to defend the cause of Italian independence to the utmost of his power. He expressed a hope that wishes of Italy would be granted.

The Paris correspondent of the London Herald says that the object of the Sardinian Minister of Foreign Affairs in visiting Paris is to obtain the Emperor's consent, pending the occupation of Central Italy by the Piedmontese troops, and the appointment of Prince Carignano as Regent of the Duchies and Legations.

The Communal Council of Milan has voted one hundred thousand francs towards Garibaldi's subscription for the purchase of muskets.

It was reported at Turin that in consequence of Neapolitan war ships having been signalled in a hostile attitude off the Coast of Romagna, a Piedmontese squadron had been ordered round into the Adriatic.

It is asserted that there has been an insurrectionary movement in Palermo, but it was suppressed. One story says that a hundred and fifty rebels were killed, but it lacks confirmation.

Justice continued to be energetically carried out in Parma. New arrests had taken place. The Municipality determined on the destruction of the Column on which the head of Anelli was placed.

It was expected that the effective strength of the new Sardinian Army will be 100,000 men, exclusive of rifle corps and Military Marine. In addition, there will be through-out the Kingdom about six hundred thousand National guards. The financial affairs of Naples are represented as critical, and a loan of six millions stg. is spoken of.

LATEST.—Turin, 21st.—The official Piedmontese Gazette publishes a decree authorizing the finance Minister to contract a loan of one hundred million francs by means of the alienation of the rents on the public debt to that amount.

Count Rogier, Minister of Belgium, has arrived at Turin.

SPAIN.

The Correspondencia Autografa announces that in consequence of unsatisfactory declarations made by the Emperor of Morocco, the Council of Ministers has resolved to have recourse to arms. The same journal approves of the action of the government in ordering the Spanish Consul to leave Tangier.
