**JITNEYS MUST PAY LICENSE FEE**  
Council Passes Bylaw Imposing Tax on Motor Vehicles For Hire.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening in the town clerk's office His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair, with Councillors McKay, Ingram, Matthews, Bissett, Devaux and Campbell present.  
Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.  
A communication was read from J. A. Parker, a returned soldier, asking for the vacant position of fireman at the electric lighting station. The position asked for not being vacant communication was ordered placed on file.  
A number of small accounts were ordered paid.  
On motion Chief of Police Adams and Policeman Smith were granted their two weeks' holidays with regular pay.  
The by-law relating to Cab Licenses was then taken up. The introduction of motor cars and motor trucks had necessitated changes being made in this by-law as no provision had at the time of passing it been made for a license fee for such vehicles. The council went into Committee of the Whole with Councillor McKay in the chair to consider section by section the proposed changes. On the council reassembling the changes were reported favorably and were given a third reading and declared enacted.  
Councillor McKay brought up the matter of the Park and wanted to know definitely if it was the intention of the council to buy the Thompson lot if not he would like the park lot levelled off and cleaned up.  
Councillor Ingram fet the town had already too much land and should dispose of all it had no use for.  
On motion the Public Property and Streets Committee were authorized to level off and clean up the park lot, also G. W. V. A. baseball grounds.  
Councillor McKay reported the assessment was now about completed and requested the members of the various departments getting together so as to ascertain the amounts required to conduct their departments for the coming year. This he asked be done before the next meeting of the council, so that town assessment could be arrived at as early a date as possible.  
Councillor Ingram brought up the matter of engaging an expert to advise the council on municipal system of accounting. Considerable discussion took place over this question the unanimous opinion being that a new system should be installed. The town clerk was instructed to get in touch with competent firms in that line and report to the council costs, etc.  
There being nothing further before the meeting, council adjourned.

**RAILWAY MAN DIES SUDDENLY**  
Trackmaster James Hamilton Passed Away Wednesday Afternoon.

The news that Trackmaster James Hamilton had died at his home here at 2 o'clock Wednesday came as a great shock to friends, both here and along the C. N. E. where he was so well and favorably known. Mr. Hamilton was about an usual Monday, but Tuesday he was seized with an attack of acute indigestion, and despite all that medical attention could do he passed away as above stated.  
Deceased was fifty-nine years of age. He was a native of Point St. Michel, Quebec, and was married to Mrs. Hamilton, nee Lester Ward, Springfield, Ohio; Lillian and Winnifred at home.  
The bereaved family have the heartfelt sympathy of all in their sudden bereavement. The funeral will take place Friday, at 2:30.  
He is survived by his wife, three sons, James Robert, Clarence and Ralph at home and four daughters, Mrs. Alpheus Ward, Scarsville, N. B.; Mrs. Lester Ward, Springfield, Ohio; Lillian and Winnifred at home.

**FAVOR ERECTION OF TOWN HALL**  
Council to Ask Ratepayers to Vote on This Important Matter.

A meeting of the town council was held on Thursday evening in the Council Chambers, His Worship Mayor Murray in the chair, with Councillors Bissett, Matthews, Ingram, Dickie and Campbell present.  
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.  
A petition was read from Mr. L. T. Joudry asking for an auctioneer's license. On motion same was granted.  
A petition was read from the residents on Christopher Flat asking for improved street conditions, also that water and sewerage be placed upon the streets in that locality. Referred to Public Property and Streets Committee.  
The usual monthly accounts were ordered paid.  
The Water and Sewerage Committee submitted estimated cost of storm sewer on Roseberry and Minto Streets, the estimated cost of which was \$4,065. Laid on table for future consideration.  
Councillor Bissett from the Electric Light Committee reported recommending the purchase of an air compressor for the Electric Light Plant. Authority was given to purchase one.  
On motion of Councillor Ingram, Mr. W. R. Millican was re-appointed a member of the Board of School Trustees.  
Councillor Matthews from the Fire Committee brought up the matter of the erection of a combined town hall and fire station. Sketch of the proposed building had been prepared by Architect Brodie of St. John, without cost. The estimated cost of the building was \$35,000. A lot of land could be procured on Roseberry St., 50 x 100, at \$650. This site lot was not large enough, but Mr. M. B. Moores who owned the adjoining lot could sell a portion of his at the same rate per acre. He had offered the lot in view 88 x 100. Owner had not yet decided to sell, but should he do so would dispose of it at \$1,500.  
Considerable discussion took place over the erection of the building, the councillors apparently being unanimous in feeling that the building was not only necessary, but would prove a profitable investment.  
On motion it was ordered that a public meeting be held on Friday evening, July 19th, in order that all ratepayers might express their views regarding this undertaking. At this meeting Councillor Matthews hopes to be in a position to place all the necessary information before the meeting, such as sites for the building, cost of them, as well as the estimated cost of building in brick, etc., so that when the vote is taken ratepayers will be in a proper position to vote intelligently upon the question.  
His Worship brought up the matter of opening up a street from Sugar Loaf to Landsdowne. At present we had but one street leading to the West end of the town—namely Roseberry. Should this street be blocked at any time and fire occur in the West end the fire apparatus could not be got to the scene of the fire. This was a most serious state of affairs, but this was nevertheless the situation at present. He felt a street should be opened up back of Roseberry street. This would overcome the difficulty. The councillors were unanimously of the opinion that such a street should be opened up and on motion the town clerk was instructed to write Mr. W. F. Yorton and ask him if he would meet a committee of the Council and set a date for such meeting to discuss the matter of opening up a street through his property, and upon what terms.  
On motion His Worship the Mayor, Councillors Ingram, Dickie and Matthews were appointed a committee to confer with Mr. Yorton when a date of meeting has been arranged.  
Chief of Police Adams and Policeman Smith were granted two weeks' holidays, Police and License Committee to arrange the time when each would be allowed off.  
Mr. W. H. Wallace was heard before the council with further reference to his proposition of giving land for street purposes upon the O'Leary property should the town open up the streets and put down water and sewerage pipes. Mr. Wallace said he was only one of the interested parties, but he had quiet a competent one in Campbellton, in the person of Mr. Blythe. There being nothing further before the meeting, council adjourned.

**DALHOUSIE AS A SUMMER RESORT**  
Bay Chaleur County Has No Equal for Scenic Beauty.

Dalhousie, July 9.—Following the splendid start made by the "All New Brunswick Tourist" Game and Resources Association convention held in St. John, on June 3rd to advertise the province, in Restigouche Co. at Campbellton, Dalhousie, Chatham and Jacques River, steps are being taken to write up our attractions and when the booklet is issued our attractive Tourist Section will occupy a prominent space.  
In this connection it is well to refer to the letter which appeared in Saturday's St. John "Globe," to show what is thought of the charms of Restigouche County, by outsiders, under the heading of Dalhousie and St. Andrews. "Simultaneous success," says a fashionable summer resort. Among other things the writer says, "You can say they are equally beautiful, and the tourist might well remark, 'How happy would I be in either were I to be a gay charmer away.' Dalhousie has more of the masculine beauty, St. Andrews is the more lady-like of the two. Dalhousie came into notoriety as a summer resort before St. Andrews and the Bay of Fundy. A well known hotelier before the occupation of the Algonquin ever entered into the progressive mind of the C. P. E. There came a time afterwards when Dalhousie took a back place and St. Andrews forged to the front, and St. Andrews to some days ahead now, but the old Nova Shore town is coming back to its own.  
Just now it would be difficult to find a prettier sight than a view from the highlands about the town of Dalhousie, far, far out to sea the eye catches with the enticing picture of island and headland and across the Restigouche the rugged Quebec coast rises just enough to give a background to be extremely picturesque."  
Like St. Andrews, Dalhousie, while the political, is not the commercial capital of its county, Campbellton is to Dalhousie, what St. Stephen is to St. Andrews.  
"Going back into history the writer says the comparison between the two places is interesting. Champlain was in the earliest days of the French occupation and wintered on St. Croix Island. Dalhousie, too, has had its experience of the French occupation, and while its experience was of later date, it was the scene of a battle to its credit—a battle which had no little to do with the final destiny of this Dominion of Canada.  
"A place of such natural beauty and historical significance would naturally be thought have monuments to show the visitors where heroic deeds took place, but strange to say, the most prominent monument in Dalhousie is to a private gentleman who was, however, famous from a local standpoint. It is a large imposing shaft to the memory of one Captain John Hamilton.  
There is no doubt that with the beauty of Dalhousie and its surroundings, the wonderfully striking outlook of the far-famed Bay of Chaleur, the appetizing strong salt air, etc., the shiretown could be made to be one of the greatest summer resorts of all Canada. All depends on the citizens of the place, whom if united and progressive, as in neighboring towns and villages, could do so much to improve conditions.  
Of course most of the progress depends on the action of our Town Council, minutes of which are not published in our local press, so to do things in Campbellton, Bathurst, Riverview and other incorporated towns.

**THE TRAIL OF THE PROFITEER**

(Toronto Globe.)

"Our mill wasn't built for the glory of God or of anybody else. It was built for the benefit of the shareholders. Any man who couldn't make money during the war must have had something wrong with him."

While he was under examination before the Cost of Living Committee of the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. W. E. Paton of the Paton Manufacturing Company, Sherbrooke, maker of treads and other cloths, admitted that the profits of the company, which were 6.8 per cent in 1914, had increased tremendously during the war period, and for the year ending January 31, 1919, were 72.9 per cent. Mr. Paton said the average profits of the firm had been only 1 per cent, and that during a period of eight years no dividend had been paid. When a member of the committee asked him, in face of the extraordinary earnings of the past year, lower prices were not due to the public, the witness made his economic confession of faith in the words quoted at the head of this article.

It is manifest that Mr. Paton is perfectly sincere. If he ever had a conscience it has become merely a recording machine for the Paton will. And the Paton will is a will to profit. The man who profited by a 42 1/2 per cent tariff and by the submarine activity of Germany which limited materially importation from Great Britain, could not make money during the war must have had something wrong with him. There was nothing wrong with Mr. Paton. People in Canada must wear woollen clothes—or an approximation to them—in winter time. Mr. Paton was in a position to provide a necessity of life and did so—at his own price.

While he and his associates were showing that there was nothing wrong with them on the money-making side, other Canadians—the fathers and brothers and sons of the people who were buying his treads—were fighting in Flanders in order that the mill might continue its operations. They were slain in thousands. They were wounded in tens of thousands. They are coming back in hundreds of thousands, and they are paying the Paton price for the clothes they must buy when mastered out.

"Couldn't you bring down prices by lowering your profits?" asked Mr. Pringle, the counsel for the committee, when Mr. Paton had disclosed his amazing earnings. "No doubt," answered the manufacturer, whose mill was not built for the glory of God.

And if he will not, what does Parliament propose to do about it? Is sacred tariff to remain untouched, a bulwark for profiteering? Will the people be asked to continue to pay cheerfully grossly excessive prices for necessary clothing in order that the government may collect a part of the excess in the form of a tax on profits? The committee will be able to secure plenty of evidence that a great many men of business have the Paton idea, although they may not express it in the blunt way of the Sherbrooke mill owner. They are carrying all the traffic and the tariff will stand. What are the people's representatives going to do about it? Is the tariff wall to remain unindented for the "protection" of industries like the Paton Company? Is it not rather the people of Canada who need the protection?




