## Germany Ordered to EVERY APPLICATION Pay Twenty Billions Before First of May

Article 236 of Versailles Treaty Stipulates Payments Must Be Made in Gold, Commo dities, Ships or Securities-Expenses of Armies of Occupation Must First Be Met -Germans Only "Wasting Time" to Further Delay

Paris, March 15.—Germany was yesterday called upon by the allied reparations commission to carry out Article 235 of the Versailles Treaty, which stipulates that Germany must pay before May 1, 1921, the equivalent of 20,000,000 of marks. The treaty provides that this payment may be made in gold, commodities, ships, securities or other valuable articles, and that out of this sum the expenses of the armies of occupation are first to be met. The commission also took steps to carry out Article 233 of the treaty, which provides that Germany must be notified before May 1 next of the total amount of war damage imposed upon her by the treaty.

"If Germany persists in refusing to make payment," says the Petit Parisien in discussing the action of the commission, "she will force us to impose upon her the integral execution of the treaty.

While consideration of the applications for the position of secretary of the board of education was laid over on Friday last till 4:30 Wednesday afternoon, it is possible that the matter will have to be still further postponed as a result of the city council's demand that the board's estimates be revised again to the extent of \$70,000.

The official notice of the special meeting of the board, issued to the trustees today by Secretary Tanner, places the matter of revision of the estimates first and the discussion of this matter will likely occupy the whole hour and a half which constitutes the legal time the board may sit without the passing of a motion to extend the time.

"No consideration of the applications in the hands of the board has taken place," emphatically declared one of the trustees today. "At least, not to my knowledge. It was clearly understood that the whole list would be considered by the board as a whole, and if there is any attempt by any clique or outside influence to give any of the applicants any boost or undue advantage before the board takes the matter up I shall have something to say."

Telegraph—Co-operation Is Required.

London, March 15 .- Canadian Associated Press .- Discussing the naval estimates and the question of the development of Dominion navies, the Daily Telegraph remarks that while the Dominions enjoy the advantage of autonomous government under the protection of the Imperial navy, their total contributions to naval defence now amounts to less than a quarter of a million pounds. The Dominion statesmen have admitted the Telegraph says, that this does not accord with the proper feelings or self respect of the Dominions. The solution of the problem of establishing a partnership of the Dominions in the matter of naval defence is fraught with many difficulties, and it is for the Dominions rather than for the mother country to determine the manner of meeting their responsibilities. It would be foreign to the whole trend of Imperial policy, the Telegrap's proceeds, for the admiralty to attempt to impose any scheme of co-operation without the

consultation and approval of the Dominions.

The Telegraph points out that in order to maintain even a modest standard of naval strength the mother country must spend two pounds per head of population, and it expresses belief that the Dominions will not be content to allow the whole of this burden to rest upon the shoulders of the people of these islands.

London, March 15.—Purchase of a direct cable to the United States was announced by H. Pike Pease, assistant postmaster general, in the House of Commons during an explanation of postoffice estimates in the pending budget bill. He said the British Government had acquired the cable for £570,000 including £100,000 worth of cable stock and three cable stations as CASE NOT CONSIDERED.

Vienna, March 15.—World-wide war on Judaism was contemplated in resolutions passed at the closing session of the Austrian Anti-Semitic Congress yesterday. A world anti-Semitic congress was called to meet in Bujapest next autumn, and a central bureau was created to get in touch with anti-Semitic centres throughout the world. Received Training **Mothers Know That** So Far.

OTTAWA, March 14 .- (By Canadian Press.)—The report of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment for the calendar year 1920, was tabled in the House of Commons today by Hon.

S. E. Tolmie. In the report, which presents a summary of the activities of the department up to December 31, 1920, it is pointed out that the peak load of reseasablishment responsibilities has been reached and passed and that more than one branch of the department's work has been completely demobilized. The branches at present in operation consist of five in number, three of which are technical—treatment, training, orthopaedic—and two service—administrative and accounting and audit. From the commencement of operations by the military hospitals commission the training branch has accepted 50.521 men for training, including 11,574 minors, who enlisted under the age of 18 years. In February, 1920, there were 26,022 men undergoing training. At December 31 last the number had decreased to 4,714.

The after-care statistics show that over 70 per cent of the men who have graduated have been able to follow the line of their training.

In February, 1920, there were 9,755 patients on the strength for treatment, while on December 31, 1920, there were 6,431. The number of patients treated by the department during the calendar year was 23,591. In addition to these figures outside clinics have been operated, and 447,142 treatments given. mary of the activities of the depart-




