most serious runoffs which has occurred on the Wellington, Grey and Bruce branch of the Grand Trunk took place about 11:30 yesterday morning at Keating's farm, Lower Pilkington, a mile or so below Ponsonby. The morning train north was running at a fair rate of speed when one of the trucks, it is believed, on the rear coach jumped the track. The ominous bumping alarmed the passengers, and then over went the coaches. The passenger coaches went off, apparently, over a trestle above a creek crossing under the track, taking a drop of ten feet into the water, which was swollen by the spring thaw, and filled the car one or two feet deep, when it turned on its side. The back coach looks to have pulled the smoker and mail coach off after it. The latter was almost completely turned over, but it held to the tender and did not go far down the bank, which was not high, where it went off. The tender was not upset, but its wheels were off the rails. The engine did not leave the track. From the culvert to where the engine stood was about 60 yards. The passengers in the last coach suffered the most AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

Master of Transportation Price, of London, who is here in charge of matters, made the following official statement at a late hour tonight: "Local passenger train, No. 17, which runs between Harrisburg and Palmerston, and on this date consisted of engine 303 (Engineer Hazelwood and Conductor Lillis), one baggage car, one mail and smoker, and one day coach, left Guelph at 11:03 a.m., and when about seven miles north of Guelph met with an accident in which the tender of the engine and three cars were derailed. About 25 passengers traveling in the coaches were all more or less injured, none seriously, with the exception of two children, one belonging to Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Huston, of Thessalon, and the other to Mrs. Irwin, of Niagara Falls, N. Y., both of whom have since died. It is not possible until a thorough investigation has been made to give the cause of derailment, but present indication point to something going wrong with a coach. The accident was at once reported to Guelph, and relief trains with physicians were immediately dispatched from Palmerston and Guelph. Everything possible was done to relieve the injured passengers, the ma-jority of whom, after receiving what medical attention was necessary, continued their journey on later trains. The track has been cleared and the trains are running as usual.



Sir Wilfrid Laurier in commencing his speech forewarned the house that he would say but little that was new. Whilst he was in Europe, he said, his attention had been called to the fact that Mr. Tarte was pursuing a course which was not consistent with parliamentary usage, and was advocating a policy that was at variance with the policy hitherto followed by the Government, of which he was a member. The charge was denied by McArthur, and there were other circumstances throwing considerable doubt upon Griffin's story. The witness Griffin, however, and his daughter were discredited by the petitioner's agents. For a fortnight next before the trial they had placed a man named Prince in Griffin's house, who boarded and lodged there until the trial; and actrial. Griffin said that Prince's board was to be paid, but could not tell what, if any, bargain had been made. He had left that to his daughter. The daughter admitted, with great reluctance, that Prince's presence was connected with The Lawson cheese factory at Peebles the election, and that the evidence she and her father were to give at the trial was the principal thing spoken of in the house while Prince was there. We think such treatment of witnesses by parties interested is sufficient to discredit them. In a matter of such importance a judge ought not to trust the evidence of witnesses who are distrusted by those who bring them forward, to such an extent that they must be watched for a fortnight before trial by a guard placed over them. We think, therefore, it would not be safe to give effect to evidence either of Griffin or his daughter against the denial of McArthur, and other evidence which might be referred to, of John McGregor and John Tay-

CANVASSING CHARGE. "The next charge against McArthur is that he had canvassed one Charles Sagaman and had offered his \$3. Sagaman's evidence is that McArthur came to his place while he was on a scaffold vote. Sagaman replied that he did not passed. McArthur turned to go away, and as he turned, said: "Will \$3 be any use to you?" Sagaman replied, "No, sir." In cross-examination he said he did not know whether McArthur was joking or in earnest. McArthur denied positively that he made the remark that had been attributed to him, and we think we ought not to hold this charge established.

"The third charge against McArthur was an attempt to bribe one Falconer by saying to him that he would make it worth his while if he voted for the respondent, and that he had some oose change about him. This charge was also denied by McArthur, and Falconer said in cross-examination that there was no offer made, that he did not consider that there was an offer. We are of opinion that this charge also was not made out." MCARTHUR AN AGENT.

At this point the judges took up the question of McArthur's agency, and after going into the evidence state their opinion that McArthur ought to be held an agent of Dr. Routledge. "Charge No. 30 was a payment of \$2 by one John Bell, an agent of the respondent, to James Judge. The payment was denied by Bell, who pressed us favorably, and gave his evidence with apparent candor. We were not favorably impressed by Judge, who is an old man, a day laborer. He said he received the money in an envelope, which he gave to the petitioner's solicitor about two weeks after the election, having spent the money.
