Gladstone on Parnell Commission's

Report.

London, March 4.—In the House of Com mous Mr. W. H. Smith moved the adoption of the report of the Parnell Commission. of the report of the Parnell Commission. He considered that the course proposed would do absolute justice to the members whose conduct had been impugned, and to all persons included in the allegations of the newspaper which had published the charges. (Ironical cheers.) It was a unique report—(laughter)—but the impartiality of the judges had been acknowledged by the accused members, whose acquittal from personal charges he thought a subject for hearty congratulation. In regard to the commission's finding certain respondents sonal charges he thought a subject for hearty congratulation. In regard to the commission's finding certain respondents guilty of conspiracy, the Government might be asked why it did not take action thereon. He held it was no part of the intention of the Government to constitute a commission with a view of inflicting punishment upon the Parnellites. (Groans and laughter from the Opposition.)

Mr. Gladstone said that in asking the House to give full effect to the acquittal of Mr. Parnell on all serious charges, he would have the members recollect the infamy of the accusations. If these accusations had been proved, Parnell would have been branded as an assassin, a coward, a liar and a hypocrite. The charges were not made at random. They were made with an assurance that they had been subjected to most careful scrutiny. For a long time Mr. Parnell had stood thus pilloried before the country. Was not full reparation due him? The opinion expressed in the amendment was scant enough reparation. Let not the members hesitate to give what acknowledgment or regret they could to a man who had suffered an enormous wrong. Mr. Gladstone emphasized the fact that, although in some sense the judges, the Parnellites and the Government were all on trial, it was mainly the character of the House which, when brought before the the Parnellites and the Government were all on trial, it was mainly the character of the House which, when brought before the tribunal of history—a tribunal which no Farliament or party can finally evade—will suffer or gain according, as on this occasion, its course is wise and just or it sets a precedent unworthy of its high honor and extremely dangerous as an example for future Parliaments.

After declaring that the report expressed a number of opinions upon issues which were in no sense judicial, Mr. Gladstone criticised at length and in detail many points of the report. Referring to the judges' statement that the land legislation of 1881 had no effect as regards the diminishing of crime, he declared it entirely untrue. Regarding the charge of relieving persons supposed to be engaged in crime, he said a more trumpery charge had never been made in a State indictment. He declared nothing was affirmed against the Parnellites but what had been affirmed by Mr. Foster and himself when they were in office. "Why," he continued, "did you not condemn them then? I will tell you why. The Liberals thought the charges were subjects for debate. Was the Tory idea more severe? No. The Tory idea was that these men were quite good enough to associate with for political purposes. The Tories rode into power upon Mr. Parnell's shoulders. MIRCHELL'S ANTECEDENT.

WOODSTOCK, March 4.—Interest in the Princeton tragedy was aroused to a high pitch here yesterday when it was announced that J. Birchell had been arrested at Niagara Falls charged with the crime. The news of the arrest, coupled with the information that Birchell had been in the habit of going under the name of Somerset, was interesting to the people here. In the fall of 1888 a young Englishmen, with his wife, came to Woodstock with the avowed purpose of learning farming, but he did not take to the plow, and in May last decamped with his spouse, leaving several creditors behind. He answered in most points the description of the man arrested at Niagara Falls. He was all activity. He claimed sometimes to be

sometimes to be the son of Lord Somerset, of England, and certainly lived like a lord while here. He boarded with the late Mrs. John McKay while her town, and soon became an important figure. His champagne bills were enormous. He spent his money freely and used his credit with as little reserve. His wife looked like a lady of culture and lived like a woman of the world. He flashed, the comet of a season, and disappeared as mysteriously as he came. In May of 1889 he left Woodstock and some anxious creditors, and has not been heard of since. LORD SOMERSET

WHO IS MR. PELLEY?

This Mr. Birchell, or Lord Somerset, was associated with another young Englishman named S. V. Dudley, who played on the flute and was recognized as "Chawley."

The question arises, Is S. V. Dudley the same person as Pelley mentioned in connection with the effair? A more likely story, however, is that Pelley is none other than Neville Pickthall, a young Englishman who left here rather suddenly a few weeks ago, and of whose whereabouts nothing has since been heard.

A SCHOOLMATE'S STORY.

Some interesting information was elicited from a young man living here, recently out from England, and who attended a boarding school in London, Eng., along with Somerset about fifteen years ago. He did not think that his school mate would be guilty of such a crime. He could not recollect much of his early career, but never knew him to be a very tough character. The supposed Lord's father was merely the keeper of a livery stable in London. There has always been some suspicion surrounding his domestic affairs. It was generally believed that the lady with whom he lived as his wife was never legally married to him, and this belief is not without some foundation.

SEEN AT EASTWOOD.

It was learned that Somerset was seen about the time of the murder in Eastwood, a small village about three miles from the place where the body was discovered. He intimated to a young lady, a Miss Smith, of that village, that he was going to Hamilton, but would return. He only bought a single ticket and was not afterwards seen by the young lady in question. He was also positively seen on the streets of Woodstock a couple of weeks ago. Circumstances point ominously to Somerset.

BIRCHELL OR SOMERSET.

From the particulars, a great many of our citizens are inclined to think that Birchell, the man arrested at Niagara Falls, if the same person as Lord Somerset, of Woodstock notoriety. There is unmistakable evidence of the identity of the two persons. A number of Somerset's friends at once recognized the name of Birschall or Birchell. They understand that his explanation was that his name was Burchall, and that Somerset was his father's title or his own. Some letters addressed to him were discovered, one envelope bore the superscription, Reginal Birchal, care Messrs. Somersett & Co., Brock street, Woodstock. Another was addressed to Fre'k. A Somerset, Woodstock, and another to R. Burchell, C. F. Somerset & Co., Woodstock. Inquiry brought out the information that his letters were usually addressed to R. Burchell, (Birchull), care Somerset & Co., Woodstock. In 1889 Mr. Birchall, Eurchell or Somerset, was adjudged bankrupt in England and rendered himself liable to criminal proceedings.

Detective Murray's opinion.

Detective Murray says the information he has received since his arrival here has not left the slightest doubt but Birchell is the nurderer of Benwell. The detective says young Pelley has escaped very lucky, as Birchell evidently intended to kill him on two or three occasions. Lirchell's wife has also been placed in the hands of the police as an accessory to the crime.

A DEEP PLOT.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., March 4.—It is stated that Douglas Raymond Pelley, the young Englishman who has been, up to last evening, in the company of Birchell, will make a statement in court, showing there has been a deep plot concected in England, where unsuspecting young men were lured into agreements on the assurance that there were big profits to be made in a paying business at Niagara Falls, owned and conducted by Birchell, and that money was thus extorted to insure the profits that the victims were to receive. In this way Pelley handed over to Birchell £170 before leaving England, he to come out to this country and assist in the running of the business. The whole thing was made attractive by the introduction of a woman, claiming to be Birchell's wife and daughter of George Stevenson, the noted engineer. Pelley now considers himself a lucky man that he did not meet the fate of Benwell. Pelley related among similar cases an instance where Birchell had enticed him down a stairway leading to the water edge of Niagara River opposite the Wesley Park, a man coming up at the time, no doubt, prevented him from being murdered then. The inducement from Birchell was that they could have a better view of the river from the water's edge. On another occasion while down upon the Suspension Bridge, inducements were offered him whereby he could have a better view of the water's edge. 

In the prize list com-petition Ontario Province, of course, bore away the bulk of the laurels. At intervals during the session the delegates were driven out to the Experimental Farm where, under the guidance of Prof. Saunders and others of the staff, they were shown the various buildings in which experiments are in

buildings in which experiments are in progress.

Prof. D. B. Penhallow, president of the Montreal Horticultural Society and Fruit Growers' Association of the Province of Quebec, occupied the chair, Mr. W. W. Dunlop, of Montreal being secretary. In opening the convention, Hon. John Carling spoke in favor of teaching agriculture and horticulture in the public schools of this country. (It might be mentioned here that a text-book on agriculture for use in the schools has been prepared and will shortly be issued under the authority of the Education Department of Ontario.) Mr. Carling urged producing instead of importing certain classes of fruits, etc., for home consumption.

President Penhallow, in his inaugural address, paid a high tribute to the men who had organized the Provincial associations, such as those of Ontario, Nova Scotia and Quebec, which, in years past, have done such a grand work in the interest of fruit culture.
