ARE THE ELECTIONS AT HAND? The activity of Ministers at the presen time points to an early dissolution of Par-

The time is no doubt thought to be op

ortune. In Ontario, Quebec and Manioba the farmers have been blessed with fairly good harvests-better, possibly, than can be looked for in all of these three Provces next year. Then the situation in the United States may be regarded as favorable. Congress is not likely to pronounce an opinion on the subject of reciprocity with Canada this session, but it is al-most certain to pass the McKinley Bill. Whatever the effect of this measure will be opinion on the subject of reciprocity ultimately, they cannot be seriously felt by Canadian farmers before the close of the present year. It is easy for the present to say, as Ministers and their friends are say. ing, that no harm is going to be done to Canada, and that if we so desire we may Canada, and that if we so desire we may readily find a good market for our products olsewhere. There is nothing like striking the dignified attitude and asserting our independence of the United States. Ministers will reason to them-pelves, "The people do not know any better; they cannot know better sooner than six months, anyway, and they will admire our pluck. Then if we go to the country before Congress has had a chance to declare for reciprocity we can say that the Americans do not want it, and point to the dropping of the Butterworth Bill and the Hitt and Sherman resolutions as proof that they do not." This, we firmly be-lieve, is at the present time the Ministerial programme, and it explains the activity of Sir John Macdonald, Sir John Thompson, Sir Hector Langevin and their col-leagues in various parts of the country. It has never been the First Minister's po to spend his energies for nought. At his time of life he cannot afford to campaign

time of life he cannot aford to campaign the country a year ahead of the general elections, and he has the advantage of knowing precisely what he intends to do. In so far as the Liberals are concerned, it is not a party triumph they desire, but a measure that will bring prosperity and con-tentment to the Canadian people and save them from the ruinous effects of high customs tariffs on both sides of the inter-national line. But it may well be asked, if the Government at Ottawa desired to promote free commerce with the United States why did they bring in and carry the Foster Bill? Why did they in this matter set a bad example to the Congress of the United States—an example which was promptly followed by the production of the McKinley Bill? And why, if they have always favored reciprocity with the United States, did they speak against and vote down the resolutions proposed in Parliament setting torth its desirableness in the interest of all classes of the Canadian people? Why did they allow a member of the Government, so late as last session to de-clare against any measure of reciprocity ber of the Baptist body, and Hon. Mr. Government, so late as last session to de-clare against any measure of reciprocity with the United States, and to say that even reciprocity in natural pro-ducts was a thing to be rejected by Canadians? They are not in favor of reci-procity. They are as hostile to it as they can be, and any professions recently made have no object but to deceive the people. There is foolish talk indulged of our

suffering no loss by the operation of the McKinley tariff, and that we have only to look for equally good markets in other countries to get them. We find that even Lord Stanley, the Governor-General, has been brought forward to speak upon this subject on the same lines as his Ministers. The Governor-General ought to know better, and the Canadian people will expect him to mind his own business. This is a matter that, so far as the interests of Canada are concerned, they intend to settle in the way which they think is best, and we can tell him and his advisers that the days of Foster tariffs are well nigh at an end.

THE M'KINLEY BILL BECOMES LAW. The Conference Committee of the two Houses of the United States Congress has agreed upon and reported the new Tariff Bill, leaving the taxes of special importance to Canadians substantially as they were when the measure passed the Senate. The taxes on horses and mules has been increased from 20 per cent. to \$30 per head; cattle over 1 year old from 20 per cent. to \$10 per head; cattle under 1 year, which have been free will now be taxed \$2 a head; hogs will be taxed \$1 50 a head instead of 20 per cent.; sheep over a year old will be taxed \$1 50 a head instead of 20 per cent.; under 1 year old, 75 cents a head, instead of 20 per cent.; all other animals remain as now -20 per cent. Hay will be taxed \$4 a ton, instead of \$2; eggs, now free, will pay a tax of 5 cents a dozen; barley, 30 cents a bushel, in place of 10 cents; flax seed, 25 cents a bushel. And so on, throughout the entire list. The taxes on oats, oatmeal, cheese, beans, onions, apples, potatoes, poultry, straw and every other farm product have been in-creased. Nickel will be free; that will help the mines at Sudbury, Ont., where there is agents of the United States Government, or Wilford Woodruff, "President of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints," are guilty of stretching the truth to an unwarrantable extent.







So many conflicting and sensational statements have been made about the dangers and possibilities of hypnotism that it is gratifying to have at least something like a scientific summing up of the matter. The English Society for Physical Research has made a very careful and minute study of the phenomena of hypnotism, and has just issued a circular on the subject. The two French schools of hypnotism—those of Salpetriere and Nancy—are in conflict particularly on the question whether hypnotism can be induced in strong and healthy persons or only in weak and hysterical subjects. The English society holds that perfectly sound 'and strong persons may be readily hypnotized. Other of their conclusions may be summarized as follows: Hypnotism has many affinities with natural sleer; Englishmen (and presumably Americans) are less susceptible than inhabitants of Oriental countries; it is possible for a healthy subject to be hypnotized without his full knowledge and consent—the important bearing of this on the possible criminal aspects of hypnotism is evident; the ordinary physical phenomena are that the patient appears to grow drowsy, his limbs became limp and may be molded into [Christian Union.]

"We are not told," comments this journal, "whether the 'Church and Stage Guild' proposes to bring about more friendly relations between the church and the theater by bringing the church down or by bringing the theater up. Since the movement has been inaugurated by the actors and man agers of the theater, and all advances have been made by them, we may infer that they have no idea of changing the character of their work. They have no conception of any want of congruity between the kingdom of God and the world. They believe,

or profess to believe, that the theater is doing a good work, and is the handmaid of the church and the ally of the school. They cannot understand that anything is necessary in order to harmonize the theater and the church except the abandonment of projudice on the part of the latter. If the two are to be brought together, it must be by a degradation of the church. There is no other way. Let clergymen who are foolish enough to be caught in that snare accept the invitations and mingle in the sports of the theater, but let them also consider diligently the meaning of these words: 'Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that friendship with the world is enmity against God?' When ministers of the Gospel go to theater managers and actors for counsel and instruction concerning their duty with reference to the various movements in society, and especially with reference to anusements, they have reached a stage in which they sadly need the lessons just quoted from St. James and the great Teacher.'

"He has perished." said the writer, speaking of the Pennsylvania Friend, "in no tunnit of arms, nor by the march of any pestilence. He was neither indolent nor lacking in shrewdness; he did not starve to death, nor did the Germans so much as too good to live." A Philadelphia Friend resents this charge of being too good, and proceeds to show that the members of the seven yearly meetings of the Hicksite Quakers number over 24,000, and that the eleven yearly meetings of the Orthodox Friends show a membership of 85,000.

The meetings referred to include those of the East and West. Without this showing it was evident to anyone having even a slight acquaintance with Quaker communities that the New York writer did not know what he was talking about. In Indiana the Friends form a large and influential element in the citzenship, and show no signs of diminishing strength, either of numbers or character. So far from being too good to live, they live a long time, and all that time they are good enough, but not too good.—[Indianapolis Journal.]


