On three inportant topics Dr. Briggs advances views which have been called in question or regarded as erroneous—on the tion after Death. He does not regard in spiration as a guarantee of the "inerrancy" of Scripture, and emphasizes the human element so much that the divine element, as many think, takes an inferior place. Ac-cording to the professor, there are three as many think, takes an inferior place. According to the professor, there are three co-ordinate sources of authority in religion—the Bible, the church and reason; though it is but fair to state that in a note to a second edition of his inaugural, it is explained that these three are not properly regarded as on the same plane. 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

PROHIBITION AT OTTAWA. Fifteen religious den institutions interested in the suppression of intemperance were represented in the deputation that waited upon Ministers Bowelland Foster at Ottawa Wednesday. A request had been made that Sir John Macdonald should also be present, but continued illness prevented his attendance. Among the delegates were leading members of the Methodist Church, the Congregational Church, the Presbyterian Church, Episcopal Church, the Baptist Church, the Royal Tempiars of Temperance, the Sons of Temperance, the Women's Christian Temperance Union, the Good Templars and the

Salvation Army. The spokesmen of the deputation gave the members of the Government to understand that what the country required was a prohibitory measure and a Government willing to carry it out. Never before, it was shown, had the Churches made this question so much their own, or exercised so great an influence in its favor, as was videnced by the petitions which had been laid before Parliament in favor of the passage of a prohibitory law. Several speakers denounced the adminstration of the law in that the Dominion authorities were alone to blame for the abuse of the permit system. The delegates plainly told the Ministers long, and that prompt action was now demanded. In passing, Minister Foster earnest hope was expressed that he would now stand up for principles with as great earnestness as was his wont before he

The Ministers gave small comfort to the The Ministers gave small comfort to the shoulders. The Liberals have no interest delegation. Mr. Bowell adopted the usual in the scandal apart from the public welstereotype phrases of the opponents of pro-hibition, and gave the deputation to understand that the difficulties in the way would prevent the Administration from doing anything to help them. Mr. Foster also gave evidence that he has joined the party of shirkers. He gave the delegates to understand that the Government would make no advance till the people forced them, and to the surprise of all who had listened to his temperance addresses in the days when he was plain "Prof." Foster he caised the question of the loss of revenue which would occur if the traffic in intoxicating liquors were prohibited. Where, he asked, would they get the \$7,500,000 now raised from liquors? The only satisfactory admission made by the Minister was a hint that the Advertiser's proposal to take a pleblacite on the subject might be adopted.

Mr. Foster, the one-time zealous advocate of prohibition, now raises the revenue bugbear. As a temperance advocate, he was consistent throughout. He was a sound political economist. As a temperance advocate, he knew that the workers in this country had only their earnings to spend. The wages fund amounts to a given sum in a year. If there is much illness or much broken time by drunkenness that fund is lessened. If there is little liness, and sobriety generally prevails, more work will be done, more money will be earned. Then we come to the spending. It is an acknowledged fact that the large majority of workinen accumulate very little money. They spend their wages as earned. Suppose a man spends \$2 a week in intoxicating liquors; he has just \$2 less to spend on clothing or on other products of industry. Does anyone contend that the country would not be more benefitted in point of revenue as well as in point of socia point of revenue as well as in point of social well-being if the man spent the \$2 for food or on clothing rather than for intoxicating drink? A writer on the subject put the question in these strong terms a few years

The country looks out upon this public sale of alcoholic liquors, from which results 70 per cent. of the crime, 60 per cent. of the pauperism, 20 per cent. of the insanity, and a large proportion of the disease, waste, misery and death which affiliots it; and the country says: "I have a right to protect myself, even though it diminishes the gains,

and crosses the appetites of a few. I will henceforth allow no person to sell this most destructive beverage. I will prevent this preventible crime, poverty and disease, which so burden and weaken me." Who shall deny that the country has this right, that it is abundantly able to maintain it, or that it is abundantly able to maintain it, of that it would immer urably conduce to the

that it would immer urably conduce to the sobriety, prosperity and happiness of the people if this right were exercised? And if the gains of men who live by producing and selling this destructive agent, or the tastes of persons who have made it an artificial necessity to them, are interfered with, who shall say that these should outweigh the good of the greater number, and perpetuate this terrible will?

(a) It can pronounce the verdict of the

(c) It can put away all public tempta-tions to drinking and drunkenness, and thus make it as easy as possible for all to grow up into sober and honorable citizen-ship.

(d) It can prevent men, whom no considerations seem to influence, from making it their sole business to induce their fellows to tipple and drink, so as thereby to live upon their degradation and

(e) It can elevate law into righteousness, and thus make it a continual teacher and supporter of sobriety and justice. The writer of the above strong statement

(i) Nothing in any such law shall prejudicially affect any right or privilege with resect to denominational schools which any class of persons have by law or practice in the Province at the union.

OCCUPIED A DOUBLE GRAVE

How Margaret Mulhaney, Weighing 650 Pounds, Was Buried.

New York, May 28.—When Margaret Mulhaney used to wabble through the flast side streets everybody stopped and stared at her. Margaret was an old woman who weighed 650 pounds. Her husband was dead and she lived with an only daughter until they had a falling out, when Mrs. Mulhaney went to live with a cousin at 43 Hamilton street.

Three months ago the small boys in the vicinity began to notice the stout woman's absence. Her flesh was accumulating at such a rate that she was unable to move about. Heart failure set in and Dr. Campbell, of the New York dispensary, who prescribed for her, saw that death was not far off. Early Saturday morning Mrs. Mulhaney died. She was 55 years old. Undertaker Charles McCollum found it impossible properly to care for the huge body except by embalming.

The funeral took place at 2 o'clock Sun-

The funeral took place at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. A large crowd had gathered in the street, expecting serious difficulty in getting the easket out of the house, and they were not mistaken. An ordinary coffin is 16 inches wide and 13 inches high. A plain, cloth-covered box 37 inches wide and 20 inches high inclosed Mrs. Mulhaney's body.

The hallway of the house being only 35 inches wide, the box had to be tipped sideways, while twelve brawny men strained every muscle to carry it through the hallway. This required transports minutes of hard ways, while the control of the hallway. This required twenty minutes of hard work. No hearse was big enough to accommodate the coffin, and an undertaker's wagon was in readiness, which carried the remains to Calvary Cemetery, followed by five carriages containing mourners.

A grave is dug ordinarily 24 inches wide. Ground had been bought for two graves, giving a width of 48 inches. Sixteen of the cemetery employes laid hold and lowered the gigantic box into the double grave.
