# TURKS EXPELLED FROM BEERSHEBA; PALESTINE CITY HELD BY BRITISH

General Allenby's Forces Sweep Aside Foe's Determined Resistance and Occupy Fortress In Holy Land.

London, Nov. 1.—The city of Beersheba, in Palestine, has been captured by the British, it is announced officially. The text of the war office statement says:

"Gen. Allenby, commander of the British forces in Egypt, reports that, after a night march, our troops attacked Beersheba yesterday morning. While our infantry attacked the defences covering the town from the west and outhwest, mounted troops made a wide turning movement through the desert and approached it from the east. "Beersheba was occupied in the evening in spite of determined resistance by the enemy."

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—Although the date of the election has now been definitely set and writs for it issued, it is unlikely that the expected manifesto from Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be forthcoming until early next week, inquiry at Sir Wilfrid's office this morning brought forth the information that the manifesto would probably be given out on Monday. # BERLIN SAYS 180,000 TAKEN FROM JTALY: 1,500 CANNON

Austro-German Reports Continue To Tell of Enormous Captures.

Berlin, Nov. 1. - Via London.-The Austro-German forces invading Italy have increased the number of prisoners taken to more than 180,000. They have captured 1,500 Italian guns. The foregoing information was officially announced today by the German war office.

Chatham, Nov. 1.—Frank McDonald of Ridgetown was sentenced to life imprisonment in the penitentiary this morning by Mr. Justice Clute, after a jury had brought in a verdict of guilty of manslaughter. The prisoner had been tried for murder as the result of the death of Engineer Stephen Quinlan and Fireman Russel Oakes of a Michigan Central express train which was ditched near Ridgetown on the night of May 31, 1911. The wreck was caused by the removal of a rail, and the prisoner and his brother Henry were alleged to have removed the rail. Frank was tried last spring, and the jury disagreed. > Italian Headquarters, Wednesday, Oct. 31-(By the Associated Press).—As the bulletins of Gen. Cadorna, the commander-in-chief, indicate, the Italian troops, perfectly reorganized, are holding back the enemy at a distance of seven miles west of Udine.

COULDN'T RUSH THE ISONZO.

Italian Headquarters, Oct. 31.—The Germans and Austrians did not succeed in their prearranged plan of rushing beyond the Isonzo into the Friuli Valley, and enveloping the third Italian army, which occupied the region of Gorizia and the Carso. Although they broke the Italian line from Plezzo to Tolmino, the resistance offered by picked Italian contingents, who offered themselves for the supreme sacrifice, so hindered the southwestern march of the enemy that the third army had time to cross the middle and Southern Isonzo, in orderly retreat.

Main Body Intact.

The main body of Italian forces is intact, ready to face the invaders in the counter offensive which is being prepared. Italian cavalry has entered into action on a large scale for the first time during the war. The mounted troops have made brilliant charges, obstructing the advance

Within the next week the people of London will be given the opportunity of substituting oleomargarine for but-ter at their dining tables, and in the kitchens. According to advices received by The Advertiser, practically all local produce firms and stores of the city will handle the buttar substitute. A. E. Sliverwood of Silverwood's. Limited, has already made arrangements with a large margarine manufacturing firm of Chicago for an early shipment, and it is expected that at least a portion of the order will be in the city early next week. Mr. Sliverwood states that the firms of the States are being worked to capacity, more particularly since the order-in-council was passed by the Canadian Government allowing the importation of oleo into Canada. "We anticipate a shipment any moment." said Mr. Sliverwood. "The people of London seem anxious to test margarine, and they will be given an opportunity shortly. Within the next 60 days I expect that every local meat and grocery store will have obtained a supply."

# REFUSE SALARY

Contends That City Has No Right To Lower Office's Stipend.

GOVERNMENT MAY ACT

Legal Status of Trouble May Be Settled From That Source.

Police Magistrate A. H. Marshall Graydon has stated that he will not accept a salary of \$2,000 as police magistrate for London. This was in answer to the action of the finance committee which reduced his salary from \$3,000 to \$2,000 a year. Mr. Graydon will wait and see what action the council takes on the proposition on Monday evening.

The magistrate contends that the council has not the power under the statutes to reduce the salary of the police magistrate. He quotes the law to that affect.

The answer of the council is to the effect that when the salary was fixed this year there was no police magistrate. Judge Judd had resigned, and the council set a scale of pay for the office. Judge Judd started at \$2,400, and reached \$3,000. The new magistrate was to start at \$2,000, and reache a maximum of \$3,000. Mr. Graydon insists that he be paid the amount of the salary of the retiring magistrate. There is a difference of opinion as to the meaning of the act. Mr. Graydon's contention in short is that the office was carrying a certain salary, and that it cannot be reduced. The council on the other hand insists that the act refers to the person. It was plainly put on the books, it is claimed, to deal with disputes between the council and the magistrate.

If the council desired to discipline a magistrate would have appeal to the lieutenant-governor-in-council, as the statutes would prevent the reduction otherwise.



Military representatives to the exemption tribunals under the military service act have no power whatever to request men who have applied for exemption to submit their claims to them for discussion previous to the hearing of the case by the tribunal. This is the substance of statements made to The Advertiser today by both the deputy registrar and the military authorities in this district.

Military representatives in Toronto, owing apparently to a misconception of their powers in this regard, have sent postcards to applicants for exemption, requesting them to meet them for the discussion of their grounds for claiming exemption, and after considerable consternation had been caused among the recipients of the postcards, Glyn Osler, registrar for Ontario, issued a statement to the effect that the cards were not issued with his sanction, and that there was no obligation to comply with the requests made on them.

No Local Complaints.

Neither the registrar's department or the military authorities have heard of anything of a similar nature happening in this district.

"Nothing like that has happened here, that I know of," was the reply of Deputy Registrar W. E. Wismer to an inquiry from The Advertiser today.



# MILK PRICE JUMPS TO TEN CENTS TODAY; CREAM DEARER, TOO

Producers' Agitation Has Been Effective in Gaining Increase.

Commencing today, the price of mil will be 10 cents per quart, repre ing an advance of one cent over previous prices. Cream will be sold at the advanced rate of eight pints for \$1. These increases are the result of agitation on the part of milk producers for larger returns for their milk. Some months ago the Middlesex milk producers met in the city and passed a resolution, as a representative body, to increase the price of milk so that the producer might receive sufficient to meet the increased cost of cows, labor and feed. This resolution was never put into effect, however, owing to advice being received from Ottawa asking all producers who contemplated raising rates to refrain from doing so until the committee appointed by the Government to inquire into the cost of milk had considered the question in all its aspects.

After extensive investigation word was received by local distributors from the committee that a one-cent increase will be put into effect. Although a plan by which milk would be efficiently distributed was drawn up by the committee, it is not thought itself that any change in the present method of distribution will take place here.

"I cannot see any benefit to be derived from such a system in this city," he said. "If each milk firm were allotted a particular district in which to distribute in Toronto, no doubt a saving of labor and gasoline would be recorded. But in London the conditions are different."

The new prices for the city of Toronto will be 15 cents per quart for milk, and a similar increase for cream. These values represent an advance of 2 cents per quart.

Distributors will receive no benefit from the increased scale of prices, the producer being the one securing the advantage. The price of milk to the consumer in London is the lowest of any city in Ontario because of this district being essentially a dairy product producing locality.

Under the Military Service Act, all men in Class One are soldiers today, absent with leave and without pay. Failure to obey the law amounts to DESERTION and can be punished as such.

Class One includes bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th of October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

# DO IT TODAY!

The rush in the last few days may be such that in the hurry and stress a number of men may fail to comply with the requirements under the Act. That will not be recognized as an excuse, as every man is being given ample time to report for service, or claim exemption.

GO TO YOUR POST OFFICE TODAY and ask for a form for reporting for service or for claiming exemption. Understand, it is a matter of LAW that all the men in Class One must report for service or claim exemption not later than November 10th, 1917.



# CHRISTMAS GIFTS FOR OUR SOLDIERS AND NURSES AT THE FRONT

HOW TO ADDRESS MAIL TO SOLDIERS

The following correct method of addressing troops has been issued by Dr. R. M. Coulter, deputy postmaster-general. In order to facilitate handling of mail at the front, and to insure prompt delivery, it is requested that all mail be addressed as follows:

(a) Regimental number.
(b) Rank. (c) Name.
(d) Squadron, battery or company.
(e) Battallon, regiment (or other unit), staff appointment

or department.

(f) Canadian Contingent.

(g) British Expeditionary Force.

(h) Army Postoffice, London, England.

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

Post Your Christmas Parcels Before November 15

### SENDING PRESENTS BY PARCEL POST

(Cilp This Out for Reference.)
For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front, The Advertiser publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof; limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for par-cels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents—not 32 cents per pound, but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender), having the word "hospital" marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.

# GREAT DAMAGE DONE BY WINTRY TEMPEST IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Loss From Gale at St. John Will Be \$75,000-Many Accidents.

St. John, N. B., Oct. 31 .- Damage to the extent of about \$75,000 was done in this city and vicinity by a 50-knot gale and tremendous tide last night and early this morning. Many trees were blown down; shipping wharves and buildings were damaged, and wires disarranged.

The Government wharf near the Atlantic Sugar Refinery was badly damaged, the waves carrying away one section, overturning five box cars, and derailing nine others. The two-masted schooner Onward was driven ashore at the lower cove, and while driftin; crashed into the schooner Tourist, of Dipper Harbor, and dismantled her. The stern of the Onward was badly damaged.

The waves swept over Navy Island, carrying away everything movable.

The Canadian Government Railroad was washed out near Upper Dorchester for 150 feet by the big tide. The track was repaired during the day.

Considerable damage was done to trees and buildings at Moncton, Buctouche, Frederiction and elsewhere.



One cannot conceive of anythings odespicable, so utterly beyond the sweet things of life, as the inveterate drinker. His abominable jests, his horrible, bestial remarks and his utter lack of self-respect are but unimportant phases of the drink will compared with the misery his very existence gives to his children, his wife and relatives. Realizing the misery suffered directly through the existence of public houses I cannot think that Lloyd George would not do all in his power to abolish the liquor traffic.
