PROFIT-SHARING PLAN SUGGESTED AS SOLUTION OF **RAILWAY PROBLEM**

Govt. Ownership and Private Operation by One Corporation Recommended.

DIVIDE EARNINGS EQUALLY

Rates Would Be Automatically Reduced When Profits Reached Certain Amount.

Washington, Feb. 7 .- Railroad interests today proposed Government ownership and private operation by one large CANADIAN COMPANY amp and private operation by one large corporation, co-operatively organized and sharing profits with employees as their solution of the railway problem. Testifying before the Senate interstate commerce committee on behalf of the four leading trainmen's brotherhoods and other employees' organizations, Glenn E. FIGHTERS ARE **NEAR CRACOW**

Polish Forces Compelled To Withdraw When Greatly Outnumbered.

Warsaw, Monday, Feb. 3.-In heavy fighting in the last few days in Northwestern Galicia, Czecho-Slovak forces have advanced to within nineteen miles of Cracow, despite strong resistance on the part of the Poles. The Czechs have the advantage of greater numbers and better training and the Poles have been obliged to withdraw troops from Eastern Poland to join the fighting in Galicia. The Czechs are reported to be arresting a great number of civilians. Manifestations occurred in several towns and villages today against the Polish committee in Paris in the belief that it was responsible for the failure of the Allies to intervene in the fighting between the Poles and the

"Ancient and Modern Greece" was the ubject of an intensely interesting and nstructive lecture delivered last even ing at the Western University by Professor Sherwood Fox, this being the first of a series of university extension lec-tures to be given this winter. Professor Fox illustrated his lecture with excep-tionally clear slides, the original phototionally clear slides, the original photographs having been taken by himself.

The city of Athens formed the main portion of his talk, the speaker adopting the device of taking his audience, first of all through ancient Athens, then into the more modern city of Hadrian, and bringing his talk to a close by showing some buildings of the modern city and the present time Greek citizens.

"You will notice that all Greek citizens are built on a hill, overlooking the water and a possible enemy," declared the speaker. "We find the summit of this hill in the Accopolis of Athens, where exists the finest collection of Greek architecture in Europe—a hill which may be described as a very miracle of art. All the buildings are of solid marthe, unblemished by markings of any kind. Originally this was the purest, dazzling white, but the weather through the centuries has changed. The raphs having been taken by dazzling white, but the weather through the centuries has changed it to a still more beautiful bronze shade. The Acropolis is approached through four great gates, and originally up a series of zig-zag paths. Upon the hill are found the best preserved examples of Greek architecture. In the pure Doric temples, we see how the Greeks studied out to a mathematical nicety, the subject of proportion.

Cheap Gas Is Passing

Quinine That Does Not Affect Head.

A few small batches have been received and distributed by the banks, but by far the greater proportion have not yet come to hand.

I believe in labor unions, in the eight-hour day and in fair wageswages sufficient to buy even the poorest class of worker the necessities, and at least most of the comforts of life.'

That sounds like fair doctrine from a great Canadian executive, and in the last paragraph of his notable article we find the same fine spirit. He

"To build up and maintain the morale of our Canadian people we must have equitable treatment for all citizens. We should be quit of the exploiter of lowclass labor and the speculator in the necessities of life. We should see that working conditions for the people are right. Sooner or later we shall thus be enabled to wipe out the 'boomer' tradition in Canada, and create a national consciousness capable of formulating plans for our future as a nation.'

Such articles as Sir George Bury writes are calculated to put new energy into those who have been working toward the same ideals he so well expresses for Canada. To become conscious of our destiny there are a few simple rules, which might be summarized thusly, "Play Fair, Be Steady, Be Forehanded.'

What Happened Next.

Several weeks have elapsed since the subject of centralization of public health activities in London has been mentioned in this department. But that doesn't mean that the idea has been dropped. On the contrary, it is attracting more and more attention, and definite steps are being taken in the direction of endeavor to co-ordinate under one strong executive head the various activities working in the interests of public health. In the first place, the Local Council of Women with its twenty-five or thirty affiliated societies, passed a resolution in which it declared itself in favor of cordination or centralization, with adequate endowment from the city for the carrying on of these activities. The trades and Labor Council unanimously indorsed the resolution. Before stepping out of office, the chairman for 1918 of the board of health was practically committed to such a course. The new board of health has "carried on." by appointing the chairman, J. H. Saunders, to consult representatives of the various agencies concerned with regard to bringing about this closer cooperation. In the meantime, other members of the board of health are giving the subject their serious consideration.






