## OVER FOUR FEET OF SNOW FELL IN LONDON SINCE JAN

Actual Figures of Local Weather Bureau Are 50 1-2 Inches-Old Timers Cannot Remember Such a Cold. Steady Winter.

The weather man got busy again last night, and added 21/2 inches more to the covering of snow with which he has wrapped the country. snow department seems to have been working overtime this year, and since the first of January no less than 501/2 inches of snow have fallen in London. Of this amount only 10 inches have fallen in February, but the month is only a little more than half over, and a couple of big blizzards would easily bring February up to January's record.

#### A STEADY WINTER.

Old residents, who have lived in the country for half a century or more, say they never remember a winter when the cold was so steady, or when there was such a general snowfall all over the province. It is freely predicted that there will be something doing in the flood line this spring, and with about three and a half feet of snow on the level in the districts north of London, and several inches more than is usual here and south of the city, it looks as though there might be trouble, unless it goes away very gradually. A warm rain, followed by a couple of mild days would send the river up on the jump.

#### WATCHING FOR FLOOD.

The authorities at Springbank have orders to watch closely, and at the first sign of a thaw, fix things so that the water can pour over the dam. The heavy snowfall has been a severe test on roofs, and many of the old ones have not stood it very well, and carpenters say they have had many requests for estimates on roofing work for the spring. During the night the mercury dropped steadily until it was only 5 degrees above zero. At 8 o'clock this morning it had risen to 10½ above. The prospects are for fair, cold weather.







#### **BUDGET DEBATE ENDS IN ROW**

MacKay.

KILLING HOMESTEADER
Regina, Sask., Feb. 18. — Yesterday
STARTS WARM EXCHANGE

Accuses Mr. MacKay of Being in Alliance With Electrical Ring.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, F.b. 18.-The budget debate was concluded vesterday in the Legis lature, the closing hour being marked by a most acrimonious and exciting interchange of invective and denunciation between Sir James Whitney and the leader of the Opposition. The ball was set rolling in the afternoon by Mr. Studholme, the Labor member. He was followed by Mr. Musgrove (North Huron), who defended the education department against the Opposition harges of deterioration. Mr. Mac-Kay, in a speech of an hour and a quarter, summed up the arguments against the Government's course, and showed that if the capital receipts and expenditures were divorced from the udget, the province would show a deficit of a quarter of a million dol-lars on current revenue and expenditure. The address was one of the most logical and well-reasoned heard dur-ing the present Parliament. Slippery Whitney.

The Premier was characteristically hyperbolic, and time after time, his statements were called in question by members of the Opposition. It was when he accused Mr. MacKay of being in alliance with the electrical corporation enemies of the Government that he roused the ire of the Opposition leader, who stoutly denied the charge. Sir James persisted, and applied the word "slippery" to Mr. MacKay's denials. This brought from Mr. Mac-Kay a trenchant rebuke, and an appeal for a ruling from the speaker, but Sir James showed a little slipperiness himself, evading the issue by explain-ing that he used the word in political and not in a personal sense. The first division of the session gave a Government majority of 54, the vote standing 71 to 17 on the following amendment, moved by Mr. MacKay, to Hon. Mr. Matheson's motion to go into sup-

"That this House regrets that when proper classification of current, as listinguished from capital, receipts and expenditures, has been made, it cleary appears that the current expendiures for 1909 exceeded the current Teceipts, and this House therefore regrets that the Government is gradually depleting our forest wealth, while doing nothing by way of reforesta-tion, or otherwise, to make this large source of revenue continuous and abid-

"This House further regrets that because of the abolition of the model schools, and of unwarranted and undesirable changes in regulations, the result is that about ten per cent of the public schools of the province are without qualified teachers, and there is confusion generally as to text books and their supply.

"This House further regrets that, afvernment has spent amount of money of the province in making the necessary literary selections for the public school readers, that should have handed the printing of the said readers over to a Toronto departmental store at a price which does not at all represent the whole cost of the said readers, while regulating prices, so as to induce the public generally to deal with the said ronto departmental store, to the detriment and injury of the whole retail trade of the province. This House further says that the said readers are inferior to the old readers, both as to contents and make-up, and the primer is entirely wrong in conception, absolutely unfit for use in primary classes and should be immediately withdrawn "This House further regrets that no practical steps have been taken by the Government to establish a system of technical schools throughout the province in which the mechanic and artisan may receive training supplemental to his practical training in the

workshop. "This House further regrets, that while hereby approving of all legitimate means of supplying cheap power to the municipalities, the hydro-electric commission in securing easements for a transmission line did not pursue any systematic and equitable plan for the purchase of said easements, but practiced a system of brow-beating and dickering entirely unworthy of this province, and one which has led to absolutely inequitable results as to the amounts paid to the farmers for the



In a day or two the ankle began to swell and cause excessive pain. A doctor, called in, found that dye from her stocking had entered the wound and set up blood-poison. Treatment with Zam-Buk followed, but it was several days before the limb was out of danger. "Had it not been for the powerful antiseptic properties of Zam-Buk and its exceptional healing virtues, the wound might have had a very serious result," says Mrs. Harrison. "But I believe if I had applied Zam-Buk at the time of the injury, it would have prevented the blood-poisoning altogether."


