





CANADIAN FUNDS REACH HIGHEST LEVEL IN YEARS

Premium Has Fallen Ten Points On New York Market in Past Three Months.

EXPORTS FALLING OFF

Investments Show Unprecedented Demand For Canadian Government Securities.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—(By Canadian Press).—Canadian financial conditions in the New York market showed a big improvement during the last three months of last year, this improvement being very largely reflected in the re-duction of the premium on New York funds which has fallen over ten points es compared with the premium at same time last year when it reached 19 per cent, the highest point in recent his-tory. By the end of last year the premium had fallen to 17 per cent and this week it was in the neighborhood of 6% per cent, the closest exchange has been to par for over two years.

The consensus of opinion among banking men here indicates that business conditions in the United States have improved and it is felt that this improvement is beginning to have a re-troactive effect for good on Canadian business. It will appear that there is how a good deal of United States capi-tal available for foreign investment, and in the last three months there has been an unprecedented demand for Canadian bonds—particularly government secur-ities—and the fact that \$25,000,000 of Canadian Pacific Railway 4 per cent de-benture stock has been purchased by a syndicate headed by the National City Bank and including the Guaranty Trust Company, indicates the estimation in which Canadian securities are held. This debenture stock is being offered at a price for a railroad flotation in this inarket for many years, according to the Wall Street Journal

Tariff Checks Trade.

From the point of view of financial men here export trade has not shown a noticeable improvement. Although Canada continues to buy more from the United States than any other country with the exception of the United King-dom and to sell more to the United States than any other country, and although one-half of Canada's total trade with the world is with the United States, the introduction of the United States emergency tariff has substantially checked the further growth of trade between the two countries.

The most striking feature in Canadian-United States trade during the year has been the marked effect of this tariff upon Canadian exports to the United States. For the seven months ending October, 1921, Canada's total trade with the United States decreased \$403,000,000 as compared with the total trade between the two countries for the corresponding period ending October, 1920. Canadian exports to the United for this period (including re-excorts) fell from \$317,000,000 to \$157,000,000—a reduction of nearly \$200,000,000. Canadian exports of vegetable products to the United States were cut in half-falling from \$62,000,000 to \$29,000,000; animal products from \$45,000,000 to \$25,-000,000, and wood, wood products and paper from \$141,000,000 to \$82,000,000. It must, of course, be borne in mind that the reduction in this trade as expressed in dollars is to some degree attributable to the fall in prices, but





Time To Organize.

THE FEELING HAS been expressed in more than one place that the Liberals of Western Ontario should go ahead with their organization work right now, when the interest is still keen following the success at the general election.

One of the best-known Liberals of London Township was discussing this matter, and brought forth the very good suggestion that an attempt should be made to get Liberal clubs to follow through the sessions as they will now be held, and in that way keep their members thorcughly informed on the current political history of the day. In short, here is his view:

"A debate is always more inter esting when it is right near at hand. Thus, if we had a membership that was ready to get down to real work for a while, say once a week, go over briefly the important things that had been brought up in the house, study the Liberal angle on the matters, and know for a certainty why the party follows certain policies on these questions, you would find by the time another election came around there would be very little demand for speakers, hand-books, or any other form of election material, because the members would be well informed on the matters of importance, and perfectly competent to deal with them. I am quite convinced that this is the one best way to study current politics. It is impossible every three or four years, to take a few weeks off and cram the workers and speakers with a lot of canned facts and knowledge, and expect them to be on familiar ground. In that way it is only possible for them to have a smattering of knowledge, and as a consequence, their work is inef-

THOMAS, Jan. 3 .- The two main planks of the Kiwanis Club of this city for the ensuing year will be the promotion of the Kiwanis playground scheme to benefit the children of the city, the Ki-Wi Club and the underprivileged boys who the Kiwanians are assisting, was the announcement made by the president, R. W. Kidner, at the first luncheon of the year held at noon

Tuesday at the Parkview Hotel.

Wallace Charlton, chairman of the Ki-Wi Club committee, submitted a very encouraging report on the work of that department and spoke of the need of Kiwanian Daddies making weekly reports on their charges and weekly reports on their charges and enlisting the co-operation of their assistant daddies. If a few of the assistants were to visit the homes of the boys who have been adopted by the club they would soon realize the importance of the work, Mr. Charlton

Kiwanians George H. Small and Stanley Oliver were the speakers of the day. Mr. Small spoke on "Canadian Assets," the most importance of which, he claimed were the children of the nation

claimed were the children of the hands, while Mr. Oliver dealt with "The Influence of Music on the Character."
"The people of Canada," said Mr. Small, "must look after the Canadian children first, must place them on top lest conditions arise here similar to lest conditions arise nere similar to those in the United States where the foreign-born citizens predominate. A census recently taken of Detroit, he reported, gave that city 750,000 foreign-born residents and 250,000 native-born.

"There is a grave danger of similar disparities developing here if the Cana-dian children are not educated along dian children are not educated along proper lines and shown the importance of maintaining the ideals that have made Canadian citizenship what it is today. The trouble with too many men who are endeavoring to assist boys to grow up along the right lines is that they are not willing to make sufficient sacrifice and forget to look after the boys' interests in the same light that they do their own interests." they do their own interests.

Praises Cities' Efforts.

Mr. Small praised the efforts of the London and St. Thomas Kiwanis Clubs in their underprivileged boys' movements, predicting that from this plan will grow a province-wide effort to assist the youth. Good things could be made just as contagious as bad things.
