hundred years ago were very talented and much of the blue and white they manufactured is hard to tell from that of the Dutch. It is as beautiful, with its quaint designs and soft colors; but the historical interest attached to the old Holland delft makes it valuable.

Delft, the Holland city which has given its name to the well-known brand of pottery, was long famous for her blue and white wares, but when the secret of porcelain manufacture became known abroad and new coloring matter was discovered the demand for delft ceased and the factories were closed. That is why a piece of genuine old delftware is so expensive. There are many imitations flooding the market. The delft manufactured today is very different from that of the seventeenth century.

Lovers of china in blue and white if they investigate the subject learn that Delft, the Holland city which has

Lovers of china in blue and white if they investigate the subject learn that Egypt can show specimens of this ware more than 3,000 years old, which in coloring rivals the finest china produced today and the delft or Minton tiles we use around our fireplaces today are the direct descendants of the lovely ones which ornamented the palaces of Arabia and Persia centuries ago, or were used in mosques in Tabreez. Old blue and white tiles are found in Cairo and adjoining cities and the tiles of blue, white, yellow, black, red and green found in the Alhambra show the skill of that ancient day.

The decorative powers of blue and white china are wonderful. Frederick Leyland of England was the owner of the famous Whistler peacock dining room, the story of which is well known. Whistler strolled in one day while the dining room was undergoing repairs, painted a brilliant peacock feather upon the wall and kept on till the room was a blaze of gorgeousness. Leyland would allow no other ornament in the room except a cabinet of blue and white and peacock tones was at once pleasing and immensely strikling. Any one who has seen blue and white plates hung against the wall of a dining room knows how charming is the effect.

In the Ledies' Home Journal Edward W. Bok writes on "The Answer of a Girl's Life." discussing the aliquation made against the American girl that she thinks lightly of the importance of her betrothal. A Dell-Making Towa.

Almost the entire_population of Montreul, France, is engaged in the manufacture of dolls' heads. The 'biscuit' from which the heads are made is composed of lime and earth, mixed and trampled until it becomes a species of kaolin, which is better steeped several days, the longer the better, washed, filtered and strained again and again until it is dazzlingly pure and white. They semi-liquid is then poured in moulds, of which there gry seventeen suses, and when dry are turned out of the moulds and delivered to the women who insert the eyes and affix the sars, etc., after which they are baked forty eight hours in an oven which contains 2,500 heads. The heads, after cooling, are polished with sandpaper and the desh tints laid on, after which skillful artists color the features and put in the lashes and systrows, and when the heads have been baked seven hours longer they are ready to be attached to the bodies, making the dolly which forms so delightful a part of Christmas to every young femininty.





A Church Built of Coral.

A church built of coral is one of the curiosities of the Isle of Mahe, one of the Seychelies islands in the Indian ocean. The Seychelies islands, which are supposed by many to be the site of the Eden of Old Testament history, form an archipelago of one hundred and fourteen islands, and are situated about 1,400 miles east of Aden and 1,000 miles from Zanzibar. They rise steeply out of the sea, culminating in the isle of Mahe, which is about 3,000 feet above the level of the ocean, and is nearly the center of the group. All these islands are of coral growth. The houses are built of species of massive coral hewn into square blocks, which gitsten like white marble, and show themselves to the utmost advantage in the various tinted green of the thick tropical palms, whose immense fern-like leaves give pleasant and much-needed shade. These palms grow as high as 100 feet and more, over-topping both the houses and the coral-built church. They line the sea-shore and cover the mountains, forming in many places extensive forests.


