CARRIED OFF

Prominent Galt Man Alleged to be Sanctimonious Swindler.

Was Great Church Worker and Ex-Town Councillor-He Forged Vouchers.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 17 .- Thomas Mc Given, a church treasurer, who is alleged to have stolen \$1,000 from the church, of which he was a respected and long-standing member, was arrested here to-day by detectives of the Buffalo force on request of the police of Galt, Ont. The police here have but meagre information about the alleged crime, but they say, according to the information given them by the Canadian police, McGiven absconde about the first of the year from Galt, It was then found that he was \$1,000 short in his accounts as treasurer of the church. He was taken to headquarters and locked up, to await word from the Galt police.

CAUSE OF THE TROUBLE.

Galt, Ont., Jan. 17.-Thomas Mc-Giverin, who was arrested in Buffalo to-day, charged with grand larceny, and is being held by the Buffalo auth-Thomas Stone & Son orities for extradition to Canada, was until the latter part of last year a highly respected resident of Galt. He is a married man, about 55 years of age, and came from Hamilton to Galt about 25 years ago. He was for several years a member of the Town Council, and has been prominently identified with the Methodist church here as treasurer of its funds and superintendent of the Sabbath school.

The discovery was made by the board of the church about three months ago that McGiverin was short in his ac-counts. Nothing could be elicited from him as to his true position, and an investigation was held, which dis-closed a very bad state of pffairs, involving a shortage of several thous volving a shortage of several thousand dollars. Moneys received for the purpose of reducing mortgage indebtedness were not so applied, and the fact concealed by means of forged vouchers. This had been going on for two or three years, until dishonored bank checks became so numerous as to create suspiction, which led to the exposure. When the report got out everybody was astenished, but out of consideration for his family, the local press said very little, if anything, about the matter. It was, however quietly discussed as the commonest topic of conversation for some weeks after discovery. Mr. McGiverin was clerk of the third division court, and engaged in the fire insurance and that estate business. Considerable short-age in connection with insurance and real estate and money borrowed from private citizens coming to light simply amazed the townspeople. Opportuni-ties for restitution were offered by representatives of the Methodist church, but were not taken advantage of. Where the money went is a mystery McGiverin was a man of very steady habits and didn't live extravagantly. Towards the end of December last criminal proceedings were threatened which apparently caused him to attempt suicide, and he was found in his office about midnight a day or so later in an unconscious condition from es-caping gas, the pipe having been severed. A week's medical treatment restored him. He quietly left town immediately afterwards. A warrant was then issued for his arrest at Hamilton, but he had gone on to the United States. Nothing more was heard of his whereabouts until to-day.

Miss Knight objected to a settlement preferring revenge. Her solicitors, however, considering the Duke's bankrupf condition, persuaded her to settle the case out of courf. The press is informed that the case hinged on verbal prom ises. The witnesses included a hotel-keeper and a doctor. The Duke met Miss Knight soon after her arrival in London, and their friendship was ripened by Miss Knight's serious illness in her Westminster flat the result of a fall in the Hotel Cecil. The Duke, protesting good intentions, insisted upon nursing her. He proved apt and assiduous. His nursing resulted in mutual affection, and the first promise o fmarriage was made. After her recovery Miss Knight entered a convent connected with the Brompton Oratory. The Duke followed her, and brought her out, under promise of marriage and engaged rooms for her at St. Erimin's Hotel, as his fiance. He then went to Paris, and the next thing she heard about him was that he had married Miss Zimmermann. GIVING TIME

Likely Deal Leniently With Treasurer.

Claims his Salary was Insufficient to Cover Living Expenses.

Sandwich, Jan. 18 .- The Essex coury council devoted the greater part of yesterday's session to discussing the report of the auditors. The statement that Henry Morand, county treasurer, is short in his accounts was received with surprise by several members and it was thought best to settle the matter at once. During part of the discussion, the treasurer was present and admitted that he had misappropriated county funds. He asked the councillors to give him time in which to make restitution, promising that he will do so in the near future.

The session was held in Windson behind closed doors, but sufficient was learned to give an idea of the opinions expressed by the councillors. Several were in favor of asking the treasurer for his resignation at once, but other counsels prevailed and it was at last decided to give Mr. Morand until March 3 to make good the amount of his defalcation. A resolution to this effect was passed by the committee of the whole, but it is expected that some opposition will de-velop at the meeting this morning, ouncil. If the resolution goes through a special session of the council will special session of the council will be called March 3 to deal with the

A resolution instructing the municisalities in the county to refrain from paying any more county money to Treasurer Morand, but to make the

vouchers payable to the Traders' bank, Windsor, was also passed. Insufficient salary to meet living expenses is the way in which Mr. Mc-radn explains the shortage. He said that when he took charge of the office he received a yearly salary of \$1,300 and, out of this amount, he paid his assistant \$500. He could not keep his family on the salary and told the county council that he would have county council that he would have to resign or receive an increase. His salary was raised to \$1,600 and he claims that he was then able to meet all expenses. However, the council reduced the amount to \$1,400 and he has been going behind since. He says that he did not use the money in speculating, but simply to provide for his family. He thinks that the shortage will amount to \$1,600. On every hand expressions of regret are heard over the news of Mr. Morand's shortage in his accounts.

EARTHQUAKES

Austria Experiences Damage-Great Hurricanes in Denmark.

Vienna, Jan. 17. - A hurricane, the violence of which has not been equaled in many years, struck this city and district to-day, and during the last hours of the storm there were more than a hundred accidents, requiring the use of ambulances. Many persons had limbs broken, and two were fatally injured. In the outskirts, a freight train was blown over.

The right arm was cut from the shoulder and the right leg at the hip. An envelope found on his person was addressed to P. J. Tierny, George Block, Syracuse, N. Y., also a slip of paper bearing the address, 'Mrs. De. La Barre, 435 S. Salina street.' The indications are that the man was struck and killed by a train. It is possible that he fell from a train on route to Syracuse.

THE DANGERS OF GREAT CAPITAL.

Henry George, who lectured in Toronto recently, is not the first person who has questioned the possibility of building up enormous fortunes honestly. So long as the limit of individual vealth was a million or two there was no very great amount or complaint at the methods of the colossi of money, but that has all been changed in the last few years, at least in America, and it is a common thing now to find persons, otherwise conservative in their views, who conider men like Andrew Carnegte to be nothing short of blood-suckers. When Carnegie made the offer of \$11,000,000 to the Government of the United States to found a national university, one plain-spoken editor delared that it would be more to the oint if he sought out the impovershed workmen who had labored in is factories and made restitution to m of the ill-gotten gains which by every privilege of right and justice belonged to them. Many others gave nce to similar opinions and it plain that there are a great number ons in the United States who

would repudiate with scorn any sym pathy with anarchistic or even with socialistic doctrines, who yet think that a man cannot accumulate two hundred millions of dollars in his own hands without resorting to wholesale cheating and robbery.

Without going into that question, it may very well be doubted whether it would be for the good of mankind for Mr. Carnegie's example to be followed to any considerable extent, or, indeed, whether Mr. Carnegie himself, allowing him every credit for sincerity and singleness of purpose, would not have been more good to the world if he had been content with a competency and had passed it on to his heirs in the sustomary manner. It seems a dangerous thing for one man to have the absolute control of such enormous capital as two hundred millions of dollars and to be able to dispose of it, if the whim should seize him, to the unsettlement of the best interests which it sustains. Mr. Carnegie says that it is a shameful thing to die rich, but it matters little how a man dies in comparison with how he lives, and if men like him would only rest satisfied with moderate fortunes during their lifetime and would refrain from taking advantage of the circumstances which enable them to divert to their own coffers the wealth which should be distributed among many people, there would be no danger of their living or dying disgraced, nor would there be any need for millionaires to give their money to the extension of education or to any other charity.

Miss Parloa is the authority for re-Miss Parloa is the authority for reversing the long-cherished tradition of most housekeepers that prunes should be soaked several hours, or even overnight, to prepare them properly for cooking. Instead, this well-known expert teaches that the fruit should be washed carefully in tepid water, and allowed to stand in it two or three minutes to swell. Wash in water, and allowed to stand in it two
or three minutes to swell. Wash in
a second water, and put on at once in
a saucepan with one and a half cupfuls of cold water to one cupful of
prunes. Simmer slowly for two hours
and a half. No sugar is needed, as,
cooked in this way, the natural sweetness of the fruit is brought out. Other dried fruits need soaking.

Since it is the dry quality of the heat that is supplied in our homes that seems its most pernicious quality, it is worth while emphasizing every means by which I hay be fessened. The water reservoir of stoves and furnaces should be kept filled, and in addition, water should be kept in an open vessel in the bedrooms and livopen vessel in the bedrooms and liv ing-rooms at least. It is possible, when the hot-air feed-pipe reaches a room by the side wall, to set a small pan that is kept filled with water just inside the registrar. Occasionally, even in a floor register, the pipe will make a turn just below, and then a resting place for a similar water pan is secured. The effect on fine furniture and on plants of the dryness of our houses is well known; the injury from the same cause to the delicate membrane of nose, throat and lungs is as great, but is more often unh

BAKED SALMON.

Clean the fish, rinse it and wipe it dry; rub it well outside and in with a mixture of pepper and salt, and fill it with a stuffing made with slices of bread buttered freely, and moisten with hot milk or water; add sage or thyme-to the seasoning, if liked. Tie a thread around the fish so as to keep the stuffing in, but remove it before taking to the table. Lay muffin rings in a dripping pan; put bits of butter over the figh, dredge flour over and put it on the rings; turn a pint of hot water in the pan to baste with; bake one hour, if a large fish, in a quick oven. When the fish is taken up, having cut a lemon in very thin slices, put them in a pan and let them fry a little, then dredge in a easpoonful of flour, add a small bit of butter, stir it about and let it without burning for a while, then add half a teacupful of boiling water; stir it smooth, put the slices of lemon into the gravy boat, strain the gravy over. Serve with boiled potatoes.


