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TRAVEL IN AND TO MUSKOGA.

Mr. Cockburn Explains the Delays-The Muskogean Train Pass Through on Saturday-Waiting All Night on a Port Car-Line Wharf.

There were three passenger cars on the special train to Muskogea over the Northern line on Saturday, all well filled with Torontoians bound for Muskogea. The train was put through in good time to Gravenhurst, where the baggage for Port Carling and Rosseau was specially transferred to the Nipissing.

"What's up today?" inquired several passengers. "Oh, the World's been striking them up," was the reply.

The passengers for Rosseau and Windermere, some twenty-five, got off at Carling in the evening. They were told that another boat would be along about seven o'clock and take them over. Ten of them remained on the wharf at Port Carling all one o'clock Sunday morning and still no boat called for them.

They then went to the hotel for shelter for the night. On Saturday night, however, a small boat to take them through the locks but the lock-keeper refused to open the gates because it was Sunday, so they had to grip and bear it. This promised Substantian is one of those bound for Windermere, four miles across, got boats and rowed over, and some even started to row Tuesday, yet in justice to their destination. Mr. Cockburn explained the matter by saying that the men in charge of the boats had failed to carry out his instructions.

Muskogean Steamboat Service. Editor World: While I desire to express regret and to offer an apology to that portion of the passengers arriving by the Muskogean Express on Saturday, I wish that, who were delayed at Port Carling two hours, yet in justice to the Navigation Company I feel compelled to offer some extenuating explanations.

Firstly, as to your own statement that the passengers by Muskogean Express on above date were detained at the wharf for two hours, I have to state in reply to this that you are quite mistaken. We had a boat ready with steam up on the arrival of the train at that station as we invariably have upon the arrival of all passenger trains. The steamers depart the moment the baggage is got on board.

Secondly, Muskogean and others through feelings of annoyance, not without cause I must confess, have evidently taken an extreme view of the case which is calculated to impress your readers with the erroneous idea that these delays are of ordinary occurrence, whereas, in any case the complaint could only apply to a portion of Saturday's train passengers. Our passengers by the Muskogean are forwarded promptly. I am permitted to say that this steamboat service is the most reliable in all directions from a somewhat awkward system to manage, requiring for the present Saturday arrangements to obviate all possible delays in reaching the numerous points, at least four passenger boats.

I am glad to say will now be available for the future, we trust therefore that there will be no cause of complaint afforded our numerous and welcome patrons.

Permit me to volunteer a word in vindication of the Railway staff. I speak advisedly when I say that no more diligent staff of officers can be found in any more anxious or ambitious to furnish good railway accommodation than the gentlemen who are now in charge of the service. It may be true that the removal of rolling stock has of late been pointed out by the public, but I understand that a considerable quantity of rolling stock is being built for the use of the Muskogean, and a somewhat awkward system to manage, requiring for the present Saturday arrangements to obviate all possible delays in reaching the numerous points, at least four passenger boats.
