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## THE DEAN SPEAKS...

## "Only connect .

This mysterious little phrase on the title page of E. M. Forster's novel, Howards End, contains a key to the solution of the problem which two characters in the story, both of them sensitive
and intelligent young women, have to solve. Caught between the demands of the practical and the imaginative, they begin to see a possibility of resolving the conflict only when they realize that both elements are needed to make a whole life, whether it be the life of an individual, a family, or a nation, just as blooms and grasses of many kinds and colours are combined in a bouquet of field flowers.

Within a university, perhaps the most obvious need for such "connection" is between the two sides of campus life, the academic only if it overflows into other areas stimulating awareness, awakening concern, giving colo

More important still is the need to 'connect' in a wider sense, to realize the relationship between things academic and life as a university days might be regarded as a window affording a new out look, or as a light which will always illuminate some particular aspect of life. Of what use is experience if we miss its meaning? Only if we learn to make these important connections will the experience of years to come assume its full significance.

It may seem strange that this article in honour of Co-Ed Week has so far made no reference to the women students of UNB as could add more to their sense of dignity than.to be considered simply as an integral part of the University, contributing that indispensable quality - is it imaginativeness or practicality?-without which no community can approach perfection

There are many advantages to maintaining the federal parties on campus. The chief one is that students by participation with topical issues on the national (and thus the international scene) are not limited to the petty perocial squabbles which a totally independent political party would be susceptible to get concerned with.
It is good then, to see at UNB not only a bastard party the Christian Atheists, but also the old reliable federally named parties: Tories, Grits and "Novels"
