

ANNUAL REPORT.

In presenting this their thirty-eighth annual report, the Directors feel that the year just closed has been an unusually eventful one in the history of the hospital.

Early in the fall of last year typhoid fever broke out in Ottawa and the surrounding district, as the season advanced the number of cases increased until the epidemic became very alarming and widespread. The Hospital was soon crowded with fever patients, and it was not until the winter was nearly over that the dangerous scourge showed signs of abatement, though in some cases the disease was of a most virulent type. The Directors are thankful to say that comparatively few deaths occurred in the Hospital.

The alarm caused by the fever was scarcely over, when about mid-day on the 6th of June during the storm which did so much damage throughout the County of Carleton and some of the adjoining counties, the west end of the building above the public wards was struck by lightning and took fire. The patients were removed as speedily as possible into the convalescent wards and the private rooms.

For a while, notwithstanding the exertions of the city fire brigade, who were promptly on the spot. The destruction of the building appeared almost inevitable.

The Fire Brigade worked with intelligence and great industry, and succeeded in quenching the flames, but not until a large amount of damage had been done to the roof and the attic above the wards.

The damages having been assessed by a competent board of arbitrators, the amount fixed was promptly paid by the insurance companies, and the necessary repairs were at once proceeded with. In addition to the repairs several much needed improvements were made during the summer. The Vice-President giving daily attention to, and constant supervision of the work.

A number of cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever have been treated in the Hospital for infectious diseases, but the Directors are glad to say that there has not been during the year a single case of that most dreaded of all epidemics—small-pox.

In the death of the Hon. John Hamilton, during the year, the Board have to regret the loss of a life Director.

In the year just closed the following bequests have been received in aid of the institution, and the Board thankfully acknowledge the receipt of the same viz., from the estates of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Drysdale; \$120.00; Mrs. Janet Cameron, \$40.00, and George Story, \$300.00.

The Directors desire to record in a special manner their sense of the loss which they feel the Hospital has sustained in the death of Mr. G. Story, only those who have had daily opportunity for observation can fully appreciate the numberless services rendered by him for many years.

The amount expended during the year for supplies, viz., bread, meat, vegetables, milk, groceries, drugs, fuel, salaries, wages, etc., was \$10,690.76.

The number of patients admitted during the year was 369. The number of out-door patients, who received medicine and advice was 1,008. The number of days spent in the Hospital by Patients was 17,551. The cost of maintenance for each patient averaged 60.91254 cents per day.

The actual average cost per day for sustentation, medical attendance, supplies, etc., for each patient was 21.7446 cents.

The Directors are glad to be able, to again record the fact, that to the many old and tried friends, who have by liberal contributions helped to maintain the institution for years past, some new ones have been added, and that with all debts paid up to date there is still a balance on hand sufficient to meet ordinary expenditure for a short time, and they hope that as the season advances, and the regular collections are made, as they have been heretofore, they will have enough to meet all ordinary and necessary outlay.

It must be apparent to those who are interested in the success and welfare of the institution, that in view of the increasing population of the city and surrounding country the time cannot be far distant when increased accommodation will be required, and for that purpose the Directors feel that not many years can elapse before it will be necessary to enlarge the building—by adding a new wing in accordance with the original design. They trust that when the time comes to do this they will have the necessary means at their command, and that in the meantime the many friends of the Hospital will continue to support it liberally with that object in view.

They have again to thank the municipalities of the City of Ottawa, the Towns of Perth and Smith's Falls, the Township of Fitzroy and the Counties of Carleton, Leeds and Grenville for grants to aid in maintaining the Hospital.

For their constant and regular attendance they again offer their sincere thanks to the gentlemen composing the attending and consulting staff of physicians.

To S. Rogers & Son, for again donating their receipted account for undertaking.

To the Auditors, Messrs. Lindsay and Kenny for auditing the accounts.

To the proprietors of the city newspapers for daily issues of each supplied, and for acknowledging the receipt of contributions from time to time.

To the clergymen of the various churches, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Young Ladies' of the Y. W. C. T. U., Flora Mission for attendance and kindly ministrations.

To the many generous friends and supporters who have so cheerfully contributed to the funds when called upon, as well as the several gentlemen who have assisted in collecting.

The House Surgeon, the Matrons and all others connected with the Institution continue to discharge their duties satisfactorily.

The directors once more call the attention of the Hospital supporters, and of the general public, to its improved condition, and again ask them to continue to aid by their contributions and influence an institution so worthy of support and confidence.
