The office of Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is ne sarily a political one, and therefore the incumbent

of it must expect to share in the criticism which is inseparable from party politics. Lord Aberdeen was heartily in sympathy with the Home Rule mo ment, feeling assured, as one who knew ireland well, abnormally high price: for his meats that the peace, order and good government of the affairs. Home Rule, as we all know, was very strongly opposed by the British Conservative party. In no part of the Kingdom was this opposition more evident than in Ireland. During Lord Aberdeen's first term as Lord Lieutenant, the party lines had not been so sharply drawn, but as the years passed, and the Home Rule scheme became more prominent in the politics of the Kingdom, a very keen feeling of hostility was manifested. The wealthy and aristo cratic classes in Ireland were very largely in the Conservative ranks. In Dublin itself, while the mass of the people were in sympathy with Home Rule, there was a numerous and influential class, including many of the "society" leaders, who were hitterly hostile to the movement and to all who supported These people seemed to regard the Viceregal residences as the preserve of the exclusive few, whose views, they thought, should count for more than the wishes of the majority of the Irish people. Very naturally Lord Aberdeen's occupancy of the post of Lord Lieutenant was not agreeable to them. The doors of the Viceregal Lodge were hospitably open to all, but the exclusive set could no longer have the control they desired. There has consequently been more or less social friction throughout the whole o Lord Aberdeen's present term of office. Now that he is about to retire and receive a promotion in the ranks of the peerage, his enemies are ready to assail him in prose and poetry. Lord Aberdeen, while re-gretting, as he must, that his relations with some of the Irish people have been less happy than he de-sired, can comfort himself with the reflection that his services are appreciated, not only by the British Government, which has the right to speak for the nation, but also by the great majority of the Irish peo-When it was announced that he had tendered
