

A Meffage came from His Excellency the Governor, requiring the Attendance of the Houfe in the Council-Chamber; accordingly Mr. Speaker, with the Houfe, attended His Excellency, and being return'd, Mr. Speaker reported, That his Excellency was pleafed to make the following Speech to both Houfes:

• Gentlemen of the Council and House of • Assembly.

• O U R meeting at this Time being neceffary, and the Seafon of the Year convenient, I make no doubt that the Refult of your Deliberations will produce those Advantages and Benefits, which our prefent Condition and Circumflances require.

⁴ I am fatisfied that it would be needlefs to re-⁴ commend to your Attention the Provincial Re-⁴ venues; an Object of fo much Concern cannot ⁶ fail of having its due Weight with you. And I ⁶ truft that the Means you will provide for fupply-⁶ ing the Deficiencies, will be as proper and effec-⁶ tual, as the State and Condition of the Province ⁶ will

will admit of. But among the feveral Matters
which demand your ferious Confideration, none,
Gentlemen, is of more Importance, than to make
fome Provision, whereby a Scarcity of Corn and
other Seed, in the most urgent Season, may be

uncommon, is not without Remedy; and to provide that Remedy, and effectually apply it, will
be a Precaution of such Wisdom and Prudence,
as will not only be much to your Advantage and
Profit, but will give you Credit and Reputation.

⁴ I fhall direct the proper Officers to lay before ⁵ you fuch Papers as are neceffary for your Infpec-⁶ tion; and I will communicate to you by Meflage, ⁶ fuch other Matters as may, during the Seffion, oc-⁶ cur for your Confideration.

I recommend to you, Gentlemen, Unanimity
and Difpatch, and affure you of my most earnest
Defire to forward and perfect every Measure,
which can tend to your Advantage, Welfare, and
Prosperity.'

Thursday, October 12th, 1769.

Mr Speaker and the Members waited on his Excellency the Governor with their Address, which was prefented, as follows:

The humble Address of the House of Assembly.

May it pleafe your Excellency,

W E His Majefty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Reprefentatives for this Province, now met in General Affembly, return your Excellency our Thanks for your Speech from the Chair, and for calling us together at a Seafon of the Year which will beft admit of our Deliberations on the prefent State and Circumftances of the Province, from which we hope with your Excellency, to derive all poffible Benefit and Advantage. We are fenfible of the Urgency of applying our first Attention to the Provincial Funds, an Object we cannot fail to have much at Heart, whilft we contemplate it as the Bafis upon which the Growth and Profperity of this Province fo greatly depend, and your Excellency may be affured we shall leave no Refource unattempted to make good the Deficiencies of the Revenues, to the utmost of our power and Abilities.

We heartily concur with your Excellency in Sentiment upon the Importance of adopting fome Method to prevent the Scarcity of Corn, and other Seed Grain in the Country, at that Seafon when they are most needful; and shall exert our best Endeavours to discover and apply fome effectual Remedy to an Evil which if not timely guarded against, must produce confequences of the most distress of the Province.

To promote Unanimity and Difpatch in our Proceedings, we beg leave to affure your Excellency fhall be our earneft Study; and we are particularly perfwaded of your Excellency's Zeal and Defire to forward and perfect every Meafure for the Public Welfare. On this Occafion we are fincerely happy in expression to your Excellency our great Satisfaction in feeing the Roads in the Interior parts of this Province, and about the Capital under your Excellency's active and prudent Conduct, fo greatly improved, from which we cannot but forefee the Advantages that must mutually be felt by the Inhabitants of the Town and Country, in an eafier and fafer Communication with each other than heretofore.

Letter from Richard Cumberland, Efg;

Read.

Petition from the Commissioners of Sewers for Horton. A Letter from Richard Cumberland, E/q; dated London, the 5th April, 1769, directed to Mr. Speaker, was read, fetting forth, that he readily accepts the Appointment of this House as Agent to the Province.

A Petition from the Subscribers, Commissioners of Sewers for the Township of Horton, was prefented to the Houfe and read, fetting forth, that whereas a very confiderable Part of the Dyked Lands in faid Township are owned or held by abfentees or non-refident Proprietors, who neither by themfelves, their Attorneys, Agents or Factors appear to pay the frequent Charges and Expences of making and repairing the Dykes, and that the Petitioners meet with great Difficulty in Leafing the Lands of fuch Non-refidents for defraying those Charges according to the prefent Powers given by the Acts of this Province, as no Perfon will appear to take a Lease of fuch deficient Lands, unless for a very long Term, by which means the Petitioners have it not in their Power to pay off the Charges already arifen or which may arife for fuch Labour, to the great Damage of the Perfons who perform the faid Labour; and praying that the Legislature of the Province will take the faid Matter into Confideration, and afford the Petitioners Relief therein.

Eill be prepared for the Purpoles contain'd in O_{r} the Prayer of the faid Petition.

Order'd, that Mr. Tonge, Mr. Morris, and Mr. Burbidge, do prepare and bring in the fame.

The Order of the Day being read for the Houfe to take into Confideration the Meafures neceffary for preventing a Scarcity of Grain in this Province; and the Houfe having taken the fame into Confideration;

Refolved, That this House cannot agree to the Method proposed by the Committee of his Majesty's Council, and that in lieu thereof, a Bill be prepared for preventing the Exportation of Wheat, Rye, Barley, Flour, Meal, or Pease, until the First of May, 1770.

Henry Denny Denson, Esq; return'd a Member of this House for the Township of Newport, took the Oaths and his Seat.

Upon a Motion, leave was given to Mr. Brenton to bring in a Bill in further Amendment of the Act concerning Bail, and the faid Bill having been prefented accordingly, the fame was read a First Time.

Order'd, that it be read a Second Time Tomorrow.

Then the House adjourn'd till To-morrow Morning Eleven o'Clock.
