The Village Council met Monday evening, September 11th for general business. The Reeve and all other members present. Minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted.

Communications were read from the International Business Machines Co. re striking device for town bell, one from Hydro Electric Com. re price of power, and one from County Clerk stating requisition for County purposes.

On motion of councillors Crooker and Speck the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario was asked to remove the Transforming station from the Dominion Sewer Pipe Co. property to Waterdown.

On motion the following accounts were passed and ordered paid.

To Gutta Percha Rubber Co. for hose and couplings for fire engine. \$42.46.

To Geo. Potts for 3 months salary as bellringer, \$15.

To J. Smiley for 3 months salary as constable, \$18.75.

To J. C. Medlar, 3 months salary as Clerk and Treasurer, \$62.50.

To Benefit Fund for Hamilton Fire Department, \$15.

HYDRO ACCOUNTS

To H. E. P. C., power bill for July \$506.40. Additional due owing to increase in cost of power from Jan. 1st to June 30, 1922, \$321.90, for fuse wire, additional postage on cheques, repairs to Plains line, and error made by H. E. Co. in billing, total \$11.97.

To H. Nicol, Hydro work \$25.80.

To J. C. Medlar, on salary \$150.

On motion of councillors Speck and Crooker a by-law was passed re-mitting the village tax for 1922 to all who were deprived of premises in the fire of May 23rd, providing they begin re-building operation before Nov. 1st, 1922.

On motion the council adjourned to Monday, Oct. 9th, 1922.
