AID WILL BE FORTHCOMING

The business interests of the community have lain dormant altogether too long and permitted public move ments to drift into the hands of a few irresponsibles. The reorganization of the board of frade and the active steps taken in the direction of ameliorating unsatisfactory conditions in local affairs is an excellent sign. The whole community will rally around the board and lend assistance toward reaching a realization of the purposes now held in view

Efforts at securing needed reforms have failed too frequently owing to the fact that they have been regarded litch as inspired by motives of a political character. The popular method in this territory of gaining public notoriety leading in the direction of political preferment has been through fierce and unqualified condemnation of everything and everybody connected with the government.

expenses, etc., and they left Eagle on a scow for the mouth of the Dahl river intending to go in via that That was the last heard of them until near the holidays when the U.S. mail carrier who had the contract for taking the mail to Coldfoot on his return trip to Fort Yukon came across the pair roaming about the woods raving maniacs. He succeeded in getting them back to Fort Yukon and after careful nursing and medical attendance they regained their mind and shortly afterward recovered. The story they then told was harrowing in the extreme. It appears that after leaving the mouth of the Dahl river they soon ran into an immense patch of timber land that the previous summer had been burned The trees growing merely upon the surface as soon as the moss had been burned away fell over with 1 00 the first breath of wind thus creating a windfall miles in extent. The trail was totally obliterated and after traveling for days and days through the blackened forest they at last came to the realization that they were lost. Still they continued to push on as their grub was short and they hoped to soon reach some point where
