St. Stephen's Methodist Church, which has been undergoing extensive inside repairs will be reopened Easter Sunday. Special collections will be taken to help defray expenses.

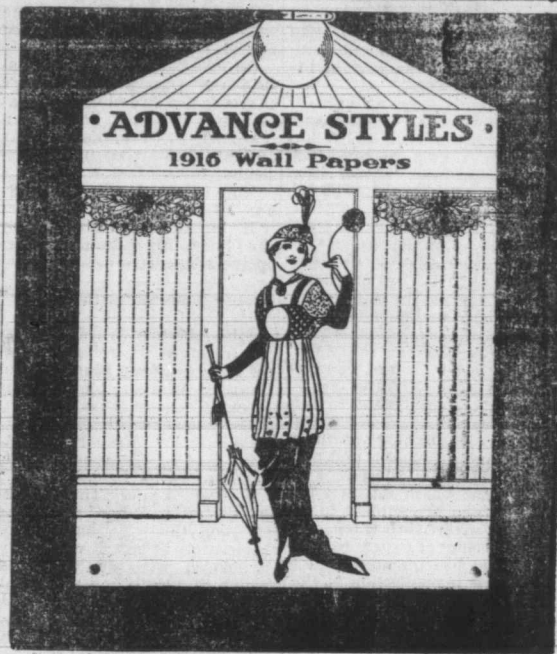

THE LEVATTE CASE.

The case of Mr. H. C. V. Levatte, a member of the Legislative Council who "lent himself" as a paymaster of road moneys last year, and distributed \$3,882 of the public funds during the season of 1915, illustrates how extremely vicious the Murray methods of administration have become.

The commission that was paid Mr. Levatte for his services in carrying the bag, according to a statement of the Commissioner of Works and Mines, was 2 1-2 per cent on the first five hundred dollars, 2 per cent on payments in excess of five hundred and up to one thousand, and 1 1-2 per cent on higher amounts handled by this Legislative Councillor.

Such conduct on the part of a representative of the people in any other Canadian Province would render the Seat of the offending legislator vacant.

The good old sound British constitutional principle that the peoples' chosen representatives must not sell their services to the Government, or accept any pay from the Crown, or handle public moneys, is honored only by the breach of it in the public life of Nova Scotia under the Murray-Daniels regime.

In no other parliament of Canada could any member do what Mr. LeVatte has done and continue to be a member.

Only in Nova Scotia, under the Murray system, is it possible for members of the Provincial Parliament to make contracts with the Government or to become employees of the Government accept pay under their contracts or for their services out of the Provincial treasury.

Only in Nova Scotia can members of the Provincial Parliament act as Crown Prosecutors and receive pay for their services out of the public funds of which they, in common with their fellow members, are the peoples' custodians and trustees.

Only in Nova Scotia can members of parliament sell supplies to the Government, accept pay for the same, and continue to sit in the legislature.

Repeatedly Mr. Tanner, the Liberal-Conservative leader, has endeavored to get the legislature to adopt a law that will

render such vicious practices impossible.

On different occasions Mr. Tanner has sought to induce the legislature to pass an Independence of Parliament Act, thus placing Nova Scotia, in line with every other enlightened British Dominion.

On every one of these occasions the Opposition Leader's efforts in the direction of parliamentary decency have been thwarted by Premier Murray and his supporters in the Assembly.

This is not the least important of the many reforms that will have to be undertaken by the incoming Liberal-Conservative administration.

From "Somewhere in France."

Miss Ardythe Ward of Weston, received the following letter from L. Glenn Blenkhorn of Canning, in answer to a Xmas stocking sent in December:

Somewhere in Flanders, Trenches, March 15, 1916.

My Dear Little Friend:

I received your Xmas stocking yesterday, it has been a long time on the way, but arrived here safely at last, I was greatly pleased with the contents, which proved to be very useful. You can't imagine how we soldiers appreciate things coming from the homeland, Nova Scotia.

I have been here nearly six months fighting Germans. Sometimes it is very exciting, sometimes very dull. We have to go through many hardships but thank goodness the winter is nearly over. You would laugh at us, if you saw us covered with mud from head to foot, soaked to the skin for three or four days. Well, am not going to tell you any more about the dark side of our life. We always have a certain amount of fun attached to soldiering, such as sniping at Germans, bomb-throwing, etc.

Sometimes the Germans get a bit riled and start their artillery and fire wix bombs and coal boxes, shrapnel, bombs, etc., then it gets very interesting.

I have had a few narrow shaves, I was sitting with a chum despatcher in the trenches right close to him when a shell came over and killed him, but didn't hurt me any more than stun me for five minutes.

We go out of the trenches every few days for a rest, we sleep in old barns, houses that people have left on account of the war, and being so near the firing line. There are a lot of villages completely destroyed by the enemy shell fire.

In the trenches we have little dug-outs, made of sand-bags filled with clay. We burn candles for a light I am writing this on an empty ammunition box, by the light of a candle. The bullets are pouring over head, but cannot hurt us on account of the mud banks that protect us.

Well, I think I have written enough. Thanking you again for the box. Hoping this finds you enjoying the best of health, luck and happiness, as it leaves me the same.



Get Ready For Letter Writing Week

The Kentville Board of Trade is making a forward movement in the development of the resources of the Valley and Province. The move for co-operation of the different Boards of Trade has struck a responsive chord in all the sections from Halifax to Yarmouth and now a move is being made to increase tourist traffic this year. As outlined in a report of the Board of Trade last week a committee has been appointed to arrange for a campaign of letter writing to friends in the United States asking them to visit our Province this summer. So "Letter Writing Week" has been decided upon as May 15th to 20th inclusive. During that week everyone should plan to write to as many people in the United States as possible and literature telling of the attractions of our Valley will be given out by our different Boards of Trade to be forwarded with those letters.

An extra inducement to write letters General Manager Graham has offered a prize of \$5.00 to the school teacher or school which writes the largest number of letters and an additional sum of \$25.00 to the Red Cross Society which causes the largest number of letters to be written. Every teacher and Red Cross Society in the Valley should get busy and plan to win these prizes. You are eligible if you reside at any point along the line of the Dominion Atlantic Railway and branches only including Halifax city.

The committee of the Kentville Board to further this scheme is a strong one and every effort will be put forth to make the letter writing week a great success and as a result a large number of American tourists and former Nova Scotians in the United States will be induced to visit our beautiful province this season, where cooling breezes blow and a full measure of pastime and pleasure may be enjoyed.

ON THE VERGE OF WAR.

Washington, April 19—President Wilson's long expected final warning to Germany that the United States will break off diplomatic relations unless she abandons her present methods of submarine warfare, and immediately declares her intention to do so, was delivered today in a note to Berlin and was announced by the President in an address to a joint session of Congress. The President demands nothing less than an abandonment of submarine warfare against commerce.

The President's address and the note to Germany are virtually identical. Mr. Wilson declares, in unequivocal terms, that only by Germany acceding to the demand can the breaking off of relations altogether be prevented.

The President considers that the next step depends solely upon Germany, and that three or four days constitute a reasonable time for a reply. He is willing to discuss how submarine warfare may be conducted within the limits of international law and humanity, after Germany abandons her present methods.

Diplomatic history records but one instance, as yet, where a breaking of relations between two first-class Powers has not eventually brought war—that which now exists between Germany and Italy.

Board of Trade.

Dear Sir:

My attention has been directed to your open letter in The Advertiser of April 11th. You have addressed it to me, as President of the Liberal Association, instead of to the Secretary. You, of course know I have no right or authority to dictate to the Association how it shall vote on any resolution submitted for its consideration, or to answer for its action. I will, however, out of consideration for you, at the next meeting of the Association call its attention to your communication for whatever action thereon it may choose to take.

Would it not have been more regular and more just to yourself and to the Association had you given to the public, along with your letter, a copy of the resolution on which you try to base your strictures?

In order that the public may properly estimate you and your letter I submit a verbatim copy of this resolution contained in the press of Dec. 11th.

Resolved that the Liberal Association of Kings County hereby commends the action of its Executive Committee in promoting the appointment of additional magistrates pledged to the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors; and is gratified that, as a result, many offenders within the County were convicted and fined during the year. As an Association we hereby pledge our efforts to secure, if possible, still more effective temperance legislation, and to our Provincial representatives our continued support in any action they may take to the end."

The above contains two simple statements, (first) approval of successful efforts made to punish offender (twenty in number) for the illegal sale of liquor, (second) pledging support to our provincial representatives in any action they may take to secure still more effective temperance legislation.

This resolution has two and only two plainly stated objects in view; the one to commend and stimulate the magistrates in their efforts to enforce temperance laws; the other to encourage our provincial representatives to support the enactment of improved temperance statutes, meaning by that the impending Bill to abolish the license system in Halifax City, and any other possible improvements.

You have taken the responsibility to condemn the action of the Liberal Association, and to impeach its motives. With this and other matters, in your letter referred to, with which I have had nothing to do, it is not necessary for me to interfere.

I regret you were not present at the December meeting of the Association where I fully expected to find you as usual. Per-

mit me to suggest that you attend its next gathering.

Sir,—I was very much interested to have attention drawn, in your issue of April 11th, by your correspondent "Novice" to the importance of dissemination of literature setting forth the evils of alcoholic drinks. It is all too true that the liquor interests are sparing no expense to get their views before the public. Just how to meet paid advertising with paid advertising in the public press is a pretty difficult problem to solve. Perhaps it is not too much to hope that our papers, following the example of a number of influential dailies in Ontario and the West, will refuse to publish liquor advertisements.

I am writing to say that the Forward Movement of the County Temperance Alliance is designed, in a measure, to meet this need. Literature containing the truth about the degrading effects of alcoholic drinking is available in cheap, attractive and telling forms. I have before me the catalogue of an American Publishing Company covering an extensive field, such as "Alcohol and Disease," "Child Death rate higher in drinking families," "Alcoholism and Degeneracy," "Skill and Endurance Impaired by Drink," "Alcohol going from the Medicine Chest," "Alcohol and Spiritual Life," etc., etc. These may be obtained in the form of large posters suitable for public exhibition and in small size suitable for circulation. The former cost forty cents a dozen, the latter three dollars and fifty cents a thousand.

We propose to make the public and Sunday schools distributing centres for the circulation of such literature, and to invite the co-operation of all interested workers. Contributions for this work will be received at public meeting, and from private sources. We mean business, and our operations will be limited only by the degree of co-operation that can be secured.

**TOURIST TRAFFIC**

Submitted by D. A. R. at the Conference of Boards of Trade

Canada's tourist traffic for 1913 took fourth place in her national sources of income:

First came Field Crops	\$509,437,000
Second, Forest Products	161,093,000
Third, Minerals	102,000,000
Fourth, Tourist Traffic	50,000,000
Fifth, Fisheries	43,667,000

In analysing the local situation along the Dominion Atlantic, between Yarmouth and Halifax, in 1915, we found that there were 271 hotels and boarding houses with accommodation for 6,198 guests at one time. Our tourist season (including the Spring and early Summer fishing) totals about a hundred days. In normal years we have 20,000 American people. The average time each person stays is 20 days. The daily expenditure made by each person is placed at \$3.50, which most anyone will agree is conservative—Based on these figures for the total season, we receive \$1,400,000—more than our farmers will realize from last year's apple crop.

The following figures show the value of the tourist to Digby alone—3,759 guests were registered at the hotels and boarding houses in that town during the week beginning July 26th, 1914, the daily average being 537, spending \$3.50 per day meant a daily income of \$1,879.00—for the seven days this totals \$13,156.50.—There are not many industries in our valley towns making a weekly turn-over of that magnitude—8 weeks of this would produce \$105,000.00. In connection please note that 90 per cent of the income from tourist sources goes to the trader, the farmer and to the merchant—and from them flows to the four corners of the entire industrial organization.—No money circulates more broadly than does that spent by these visitors.

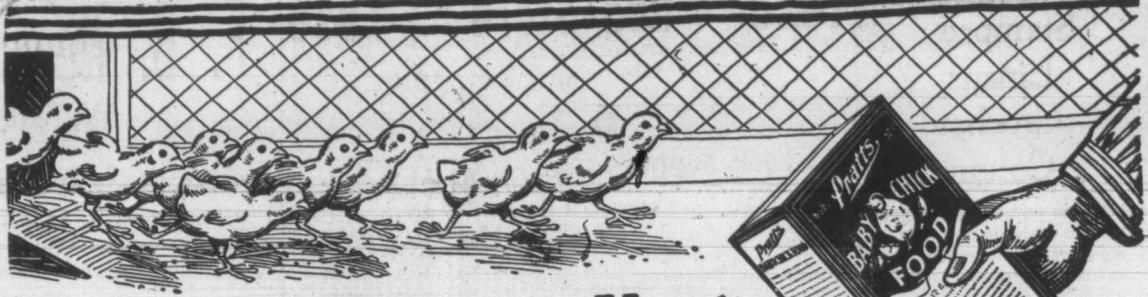
Our figures—however—look small in comparison with the wealth derived by the New England States from the tourist—There is no question in that Country of the status of this great industry—everyone recognizes its importance. In 1914 along the lines of the three great New England Railways were 4,244 hotels and boarding-houses, which would accommodate, at one time, 226,000 people. In 1914 a million and a half people summered in New England and spent upward of \$110,000,000. Let us examine the records of the State of Maine alone, as natural conditions in that State more nearly approximate our own.

Maine has 1,265 hotels and boarding houses that cater exclusively to tourists. These places accommodate 69,000 people—(compare with our 5,193). 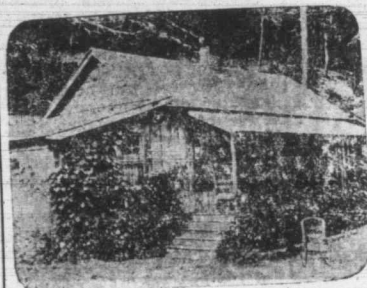
