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Attacks Scout Garb.

The matter of dress reform was one of the topics that received extended consideration at the annual convention of the National Federation of Women's Clubs in Chicago, June 9.

A resolution was prepared and adopted which places the women squarely against the extreme Paris styles and in favor of a normal development of American art and manufacture in dressmaking. The resolution proposed was as follows:

Whereas the General Federation of Women's Clubs, in convention assembled, view with disapproval the present tendency among American women to follow designs in dress, regardless of beauty, comfort or modesty; and

Whereas these objectionable designs in women's clothes emanate largely, if not entirely, from foreign houses; and

Whereas this constant patronage of foreign designs and foreign materials hinders a normal development of American art and manufacture; Be it therefore

Resolved, That this convention, in full recognition of the rights and privileges of the individual, places itself on record as heartily in favor of the movement for simpler, more becoming and more modest designs in women's clothes, and urges the cooperation of all clubs and club women of the federation in a concrete effort to adopt styles in dress adapted to American needs and to encourage American designers and manufacturers.

Stranger Birds.

DEAR ACADIAN.—There is at Eastville a pair of birds we have not known before, but I suspect it belongs to the thrush family. They have been here several weeks and one now is heard making melody for its settling mate. They are about half the size of the robin with a jet black bill and eyes jet, medium to large. The top of the head, wings and tail are black. The back is very near to a purple while the breast is mixed pepper and salt coloring. His music is exceptionally sweet and is composed of several notes (4 to 6) linked together with quavers and surs. They move from tree to tree in wavy dips and sing in almost every hour of the morning and the day. It is not easily disturbed. It pipes its notes with its bill at about quarter angle towards the sky and repeats its song. It seems to have the company of persons, and comes into the trees close to the house. I think music writers would find the song most worth transcribing. We are all interested to learn more of these charming birds and where they will go. Are they our second birds for the time being in apple trees? I trust, Mr. Editor, some of your readers know those and their habits and history and will tell us when they leave us in the autumn. Is it known to be a fact that new birds come to us and acquire the haunting habit of coming again? Your readers will, I am sure, appreciate information and further knowledge of these delightful creatures. Last Sabbath I heard this bird singing in Mrs. (Prof.) Kennedy's garden, in passing, and another in the tree directly opposite across the street.

A Magistrate Dismissed.

MR. BECKWITH MAKES A STRAIGHT FORWARD AND MANLY STATEMENT TO THE PUBLIC OF KING'S COUNTY.

DEAR SIR:—I wish to thank you for your recent kind reference to me and my work in the suppression of the illegal sale of intoxicating liquor in the county. And as I have been set aside by the Provincial Government as being totally unfit for the position I have held for nearly forty years, and have been dismissed without an investigation, which was asked for, it may not be out of place for me to say that I did not seek this business. It was thrust upon me because no other magistrate would take it, and in the public interest some one must act.

I have been strengthened in my duty through all these years, by believing that the Lord had called me to this work; that this was, perhaps, the one purpose above others which He had for me in life, and that I was enabled to fill that place. Had I been set aside justly I should have taken it that my work in this direction was done, and I would have taken it with out complaint; but the way I have been benched I believe it to be from some other source. The Lord has permitted it for some good purpose. Sometimes more is accomplished by one's death than by his life, and if the temperance cause is advanced by my official death, which I believe will be the case, I shall be satisfied.

One naturally asks for the motive prompting our two local representatives, for they are responsible for what has been done, for persuading the course that has been adopted. I am the victim of the liquor interest. In times gone by buildings have been burned or other property destroyed; but in the present case they attempt to injure one's reputation. The latter I consider more cowardly than the former.

Dr. Covert, without any just cause, swore vengeance on me because I would not dismiss the suit against Rand, when I found that the liquor which the Wolfville boys had been drinking, (previous to giving evidence in my court, in the matter of the King vs. Jubie) had been obtained from his store.

What would the public have thought of me if, as soon as I learned that this wine was from Dr. Covert's I refused to have anything further to do with the complaint against Rand? After having made my conviction in this matter I stated in open court in the presence of the three lawyers in attendance, that I would not take an information against Dr. Covert, that his abusive language to me previous to the commencement of this trial was such that I would be prejudiced, and I felt justified in not taking it.

Dr. Covert, in his address, in the House, said that animus was at the bottom of this whole affair. I believe he was correct in this, but I leave the public to say where the animus lay. I am quite sure there was some on the part of the magistrate; I would have shielded Dr. Covert if I could honorably have done so. When the proper time arrives the public will be made acquainted with all the facts in this case of the King vs. Rand, and also in the King vs. Jubie matter, which led up to the Rand case.

I want to say, Mr. Editor, that I have done nothing in this matter which I regret. I have a clear conscience in every step taken and believe I have not lost the respect of those whose opinion is of any value. And, better still, I have not lost my own self respect.

Your readers may wish to know if I ever said anything approaching the statement made in the affidavits of Illey and Harris. On one occasion, having convicted a man for illegally bringing liquor into the county, while I was sitting up the conviction papers, Mr. Illey, in open court, had the impudence to criticize my judgment, and said to his comrades in a tone that I could hear, 'I do not see how he can convict on that evidence.' I turned to him and said, 'It is for me to decide whether the evidence is sufficient and not you.' He left the court room with some others and deliberately pleaded the statement made in his affidavit, namely, that if I believed a person guilty I would convict him whether I had any evidence or not. I was prepared to prove this, if an opportunity had been given me, by one who went out of the court room with him. The statement in the affidavits is too absurd for any one to believe after the experience I have had in my own courts, and in attendance at the Supreme Court for so many years. About 40 per cent of the cases brought before me for the illegal sale of liquor have been dismissed for want of evidence. And in those cases, with very few exceptions, I was convinced in my own mind that the witnesses were not telling the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. The jury committed in those liquor trials is the worst part of the whole business. I view the witnesses with a great deal of contempt, and I thank you, Mr. Editor, for your courtesy for allowing me so much space.

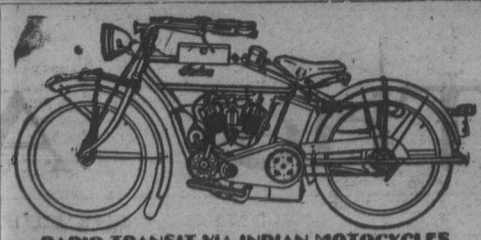

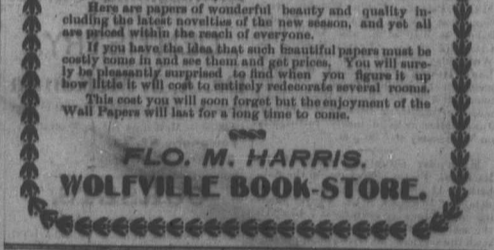
