A MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT occurred in Montague last Thursday evening. A Mrs. Campbell, a widow, going into a stable found a little son of Mr. Peard Downey, aged 3 years, lying on the floor with his head crushed in, supposed to have been caused by the kick of a horse. She immediately ran to a neighbor's house, where, when she arrived, she found the child dead. She had never heard the name of the boy.

Last week, Mr. W. A. White, of Graham's Road, New London, purchased from Mr. John Wade, of Killbuck, a very fine stallion for the handsome sum of \$500. Mr. Wade obtained him from Mr. Robert Fitzmaurice when young; he is sired by that noble sire of trotters, "Dean Swift," and full brother of "Island Chief." Mr. White is to be congratulated on his purchase, and deserves to be well patronized for his spirit in buying such a fine animal.

The several County Courts for the preliminary revision of Voters' Lists under the new Dominion Franchise Act, were opened last week, and the progress made. In Prince County we learn that nearly 3,000 applications were made, 2,200 in Queen's County and 2,100 in King's County. Of course, as is natural, a number of names will be struck off, of those who have died or who have removed; but there is no doubt that the vast majority of applications will be allowed.

At a meeting of the City Council on Monday evening last, the principal business was the consideration of the tenders for the water hydrants. Two tenders were received, one from Henry Baldwin, of Boston, Mass., and the other from Thomas T. Turnbull, on behalf of the Charlottetown Waterworks Company. That of the latter was accepted, by the casting vote of Mayor, supplying fifty hydrants for twenty years, at an annual charge of \$5,000.

MR. WILKOT, Manager of the Bedford, N. E. Hatchery, left here to-day, taking with him about 400,000 salmon ova from the Dunk River Hatchery. Their removal was necessitated by the recent frosts which undermined the foundations of the Hatchery and caused the destruction of about 400,000 of the ova. The ova were saved by a jet of seawater and other rubbish getting in among the ova and killing them. Mr. Wilkott hopes, by careful nursing, to be able to save a lot of these taken gray to-day, which he will return as soon as the Hatchery at the Dunk River is ready for them.—*Observer*, April 13th.

**THE SUBWAY COMPANY.**

Thursday last was an island day in the Senate. Hon. Senator Howland introduced his bill to incorporate the Subway Company. The following is a summary of the proceedings:

This is a bill, he said, to construct a tunnel from shore to shore in only seven nautical miles. I may say that the proposed tunnel will be capable of sustaining a pressure of 400 tons to the lineal foot, or 40,000 tons to the 10 feet. The tube would be made of chilled white iron, which is non-corrosive.
