



### Attempt to Pilot Dirgible Across Atlantic.

Fabrice has now definitely completed the plans for his adventurous attempt to cross the Atlantic in an airship, and the date of departure is fixed for the middle of May. The launching point has not yet been chosen, but it will be either on the coast of Portu

gal or the Island of Teneriffe. The balloon is ellipitical in shape 162 feet long and 49 feet broad, and ontains 6.000 cubic metres of hydro gen. The basket takes the form of a gondola, shaped like a submarineboat 28 feet long, 7 feet boad, fitted with a four horse-power motor. Dear Sir,-The other night in reading over the columns of your paper I noticed a communication headed: "Should he be flogged," the writer of which states he would like to know what is being done in the matter with regard to cruelty perpetrated on the poor horse, as previously reported in the Evening Telegram. I perfectly agree with him that the person performing such should be severely ounished. Some time ago (I was told) a poor horse fell in the East End, cutting its leg, the driver of which took a handful of mud and gravel, then rubbing it into the cut on the poor animal's leg so as to stop the flow of blood and hide it from view of our police officers. Last Tuesday this same individual was seen forcing a poor, half-starved brute with a car load of sand and gravel up the bye lane back of the Pilot House, opposite the premises of H. J. Stabb & Co., the animal in question was unable to draw the heavy load, whereupon it was belabored by this inhuman individual with the assistance of his comrade which caused the poor beast to fall under its load three or four times. For the information of those who have feelings for the dumb brute might say that this "brute" to my mind should never be allowed by the authorities to drive any dumb beast. There are too many acts of cruelty allowed to go unpunished in this country, and such inhuman beings should be severely dealt with by flogging or some other suitable mode of punishment, thereby stopping all such inmerciful acts of severity on God's most useful creatures. #### Two Yale Men Shot

By a Negro in Smoking Car of a Train on the Jersey Central.

New York, Feb. 23.-Harison Highee and Leslie Lord, two young Yale graduates, and socially prominent in North Jersey were wantonly shot down and probably fatally wounded to-day by an infurated negro in the smoking car of a Jersey Central train, in which they were riding to their nomes in Newark.

Accompanying Higbee and Lord were Gale Young, of York, and his cousin, Roger Young, of Newark, both Princton graduates. Soon after the train left Jersey City the negro desperado, who was accompanied by another man of his race and a mulatto woman, accused the four young college men of making remarks about the woman. Lord was about to reply but Higbee told him to keep quiet.

"Don't you tell me to keep quiet," yelled the negro as leaped to his feet and drew a revolver. "I'll quiet you' and he opened fire upon the four young men. The first bullet went through Lord's stomach and he dropped to the floor. The second ploughed into Higbee's chest, and then Gale and Roger Young leaped for the negro, but he continued shooting, the shots caused a panic in the car and pasengers stampeded for the doors or hid under seats.

"Gale Young went down under blow on the head, but Roger held on to the man who had emptied his pistol, and who was so powerful that he dragged Roger Young with him from the train while it was making twenty miles an hour. Roger Young went with him. In striking the embankment Young's grip on the negro was broken, and the desperado disappeared in the darkness. His companions also leaped from the train and got away. When the train stopped the wounded men were taken to a hospital in Jersey City, where it was said they would probably die.

Roger Young was found back on the track a half mile, badly stunned but not seriously hurt.




