





When a man has absorbed three cold lemonades he may ache inside, but the children do not hide under the bed as he wearily totes his load home, while the destroyer of a fragrant egg phosphate does not advertise the fact by distributing samples of spoiled atmosphere to a street car load of people who can't get away

from him. Soft drinks do not make iron constitutions, but neither do they produce the soft and frazzled head which is the great specialty of the hard





In response to Mr. Bramwell Booth's appeal, 500 officers of the Salvation Army have volunteered for Red Cross work. Miss Murray, brigadjer in the Salvation Army, will have charge of the foreign service contingent.

From a return made to the Church Lads' Brigade headquarters, it appears that over 3,000 officers, warrant officers, and elder lads have been called to the colours, and are now serving in the Army, the Navy, or the Territorial Force.

It is possible that in the meantime English army after army may have to dash itself against German guns, but another army will follow. until they have finally exhausted the

The Boston Herald says: "The week which has just closed witnessed an extraordinary change in American sentiment toward the combatants, if the press of the country affords any test. There was a good measure of neutrality at the start, in the shape of a judicious attitude of mind, rein-

forced by the President's proclar tion. But Germany's course in Belgium has powerfully affected American sentiment until to-day the great newspapers of cosmopolitan New York are speaking out with an emphasis that cannot be misunderstood.

Belgium is the first country to make a wide use of the services of the Boy Scouts in time of war. In Brussels they are employed as despatch riders between the various departments of the State: as orderlies at the numerous depots of the Red Cross organization; as "policemen" at the front.
