regard to these The sole object for which the Legislature has been called is to pass an amendment to the Election Act, an amendment providing for the legalising of a Voters' List, taken sometime in the year 1917, by which process the lists prepared about eighteen months ago will be made valid in the forthcoming general election, which it has now been decided is to be "sprung" on the Colony. The Election Act provides that the list of voters shall be taken within at least twelve months of the election, but by its proposed legislation the Govern ment intends to abrogate this measure of protection and will appeal to the country for a renewal of power, using a list which will practically disfranchise thousands of voters. #### What Regimental Badges Denote.

corps of our army are a fascinating study. Each badge or device has a story of its own. It is regimental history in "tabloid" form. The army badges may be classified under the following headings: Royal badges descriptive badges, national badges representations of the elephant and the horse, the tiger and the lion, the antelope, stag, and eagle, the cat, the serpent, and the Paschal lamb. Fabulous monsters are represented by the Sphinx and the dragon. The gun, grenade, fusil, lance, carbine. and rifle are badges which clearly indicate the branch of the service entitled to wear them. The trumpet, the hugle, and the French horn de note other units of the service, and flowers, leaves, and crosses have their special significance. The eagle is a; foreign badge, and is one of the earliest standards of war. It was first used by the Persians. It is said to have been carried at the Battle of Cunaxa, B.C. 401, but it is most fa-Imperial Rome. Charlemagne, after the coronation in Rome, A.D. 800, adopted the spread eagle, by this badge denoting that in his hands were the governments of both the Roman and German empires.
