And wages have to be high to enable families to live at all.

What is to Be Done About It? Can anything at all be done to bring down prices?

Just two things we can do to help! We can all help to produce more useul things. Grow something or every inch of ground there is. Make speculators cultivate the land they hold for building lots. Compel landowners to do something worth while with all they own. But can you do that without raising something like a civil war over the question of individual rights to do as one pleases? Whether or no we shall have to grow more if we are to reduce prices!

There is no getting over that! We have to produce more in the fac tories, have less strikes and slack times, and get up a stronger community feeling, which insists upon contracts being filled, and bargains being

kept up to. Labor holds one of the keys to the situation; there can be no substantial reduction in the cost of living without the co-operation of labor. That is as clear as that the farmer nust also be a great factor in solving

If agriculture and labor do not co rate to help us, prices cannot fall. That much is certain! Hon. Mr. Clynes, in England, and Mr. Gompers in the United States, agree upon that. And people must buy less extravaantly, as the single-handed Mr. over reminds us, if they want to arry on an era of lower prices. With

national candy-bill sixty per cent. higher than in 1913, how can we hope to get down sugar prices, with raw supplies short at any rate.

Or how can we hope to make up quickly the shortage of wool and cotton, if people insist upon having new spring suits, summer suits, fall suits and winter suits no matter how scarce and expensive the goods are?

High prices are parts of Nature's machinery for checking automatically the customary use of articles which have become scarce. If we are not deterred from purchasing by these prices, we pay the penalty in their continuance or in still higher prices.

There can be no drop in prices which will be lasting and helpful unless it comes about naturally and in concordance with the laws of demand and supply.

Sane Opinion from U. S. As an important metropolitan news-

paper truly said: "The public is pathetically willing to believe that price-cutting by a few department stores, accompanied by the contraction of loans and a selling movement in stocks and bonds, indicate that the peak of high prices has been passed. These surface symptoms, unhappily, prove nothing of the kind. Beyond doubt, there is a certain slack in prices which can be taken up. Manufacturers, middlemen. and retailers may have been receiving unnecessarily large profits, and the recent rebellion of a part of the buying public may have made it necessary to cut profits in order to sell at all. There has been a slight drop in the wholesale price of clothing. Certain wise merchants have realized that they would gain more on a quick turn over by reducing prices than they would save by keeping prices up with a slower turnover. If all retail merchants cut prices this advantage will disappear, and if price-cutting wars follow, the weaker merchants are likely to be ruined, with no permanent advantage to the consumer.

"Our thinking about prices is constantly befuddled by the necessity of expressing them in terms of currency. is world-wide, is due to the loss of material wealth in the war, both directly and through the ordinary wastage which was not made good in wartime. This wastage must be made good before civilization can produce as large an annual income in the necessities of life as it did before the war. Until it is made good there will not be enough of the necessities and luxuries of life to meet the normal needs of of living is not a money problem, it is a production problem.'



Treasures of a Lost Civilization.

A wonderful collection of golden treasure has recently reached New York, and has created a great deal of

The treasure was taken from the graves of long dead Chibchas, an ancient race which once occupied the territory where the Republic of Colomhis is now situated.

The Chibchas were highly civilized,

and much resembled the Incas, Aztecs, Mayas and Toltees, but the race died out soon after the arrival of the Spaniards in America, and only a few remnants remain in Colombia. The treasure is very valuable, and is the result of five years' excavation by natives at Ayapals, their employer entrusting it to a South American banker, who took it to New York to be disposed of.





Army Purchase Abolished.

On Thursday, July 20, 1871, a Royal Warrant, abolishing the appointment to the position of officers in the British Army of those for whom they had been purchased by themselves or families, was signed and issued by Queen Victoria. An Act of Parliament for this purpose, introduced and advocated by the late William Ewart Gladstone then Prime Minister, had been accepted by the Houses of Commons and Lords. This Royal Warrant declared that "On and after the first day of November in this present year, all reguations made by Us or any of our Royal predecessors, or any officers acting under our authority, regulating or fixing the prices at which any sion in Our Forces may be purchased, sold, or exchanged, or in any way authorizing the purchase or sale or exchange for money of any such Commissions, shall be cancelled and now in modern English would say 'terminated." The Pacific's Island of Mystery.

One of the almost mysterious spots in the world is Easter Island, in the Pacific Ocean, 2,100 miles west of the South American coast and close to the Tropic of Capricorn.

It was discovered on Easter Sunday. 1722, by a Dutch navigator Roggeveen He called it Easter Island, and sailed around it, but did not attempt a landing, although much struck by an extraordinary spectacle that met his

What had happened? Nobody will ever know. The history of the island -wholly volcanic, thrown up out of the depths of the sea and 1,100 miles from the nearest land-is lost; the population it had when Roggeveen saw it had wholly disappeared at the time

Origin of the Glants.

The origin of the giants is no puzzle. In all, 555 of the statues have been found. The largest, seventy feet high, remains unfinished in the crater. The crater is cup-shaped, perfectly circular, half a mile in diameter, and contains a small lake that is alleged WEEK ADRIFT WITHOUT FOOD to be "bottomless" sounding lines 300 feet long having failed to reach bottom.

The rim of the crater is broken at one point, where a stream of lava Nair, arrived here this morning with formerly poured through on its way to the sea. It was through this gap that stone images carved inside the crater were dragged. Their transportation down the mountain and to the coast seems a miraculous performance in the absence of steam-hoists and other machinery, but the supposition is that they were lowered by chocks and wedges, and drawn by hundreds of men along roads covered with seaweed. On reaching the seashore, they were probably rolled up inclined planes of earth to the tops of the platforms, where they were placed erect.

Images in the Crater.

In the crater are ninety-three images, forty of them finished and ready statue away from the matrix.



Apparently some sort of calamity overwhelmed the island, wiping out its entire population. It may have been an epidemic of disease. But how about an earthquake, which may have been coincident with an eruption of the volcano. All surmises on the subject are mere guesswork.

There are now on the island about 150 people of Polynesian stock. But they do not seem to be descendants of the image-makers, and in regard to the latter they have not even any tradi-

For all time to come Easter Island and its stone giants are likely to remain an unsolved mystery.

LONDON, July 13 .- (By the Associated Press.)-Ten thousand Jews in a demonstration in Albert Hall on the occasion of Great Britain's acceptance of the mandate for Palestine, last night unanimously adopted resolutions expressive of appreciation of "the illustrious services rendered the Jewish nation by the statesmen and peoples of the Allied and Associated Powers, particularly Great Britain."

The resolutions pledged the Jews to spare no effort or sacrifice for the national home, in collaboration with the inhabitants of the country."

THE SHOE MEN.

Forest Fires!

The Attention of the Public is called to the following provisions of the FOREST FIRE ACT:

1.—Any person who sets out, makes or starts a FIRE for any purpose whatever, between the Fifteenth Day of April and the First Day of December, in or near woods, or without selecting a place free from dry trees, underbrush or other inflammable material in which to make or start such FIRE, or fails to remove all such dry wood, brushwood or inflammable material within a distance of ten feet from such fire in every direction, or fails to completely extinguish the same before leav-

2.—Throws or Drops any Burning Match, Ashes of a Pipe, Lighted Cigar or any other burning substance.

3.—Or fails to totally extinguish any camp fire before breaking camp, shall be liable to a Penalty of not less than \$50 nor more than \$400, or imprisonment for a period of twelve months.
