





cellor's palace in Berlin, Prince Buhad written these words of Frederick the Great: "The world does not rest more securely on the shoulders of forces of the Reich to 100,000 men re-Atlas than Prussia on her army." Just as securely does the German

Confederation, present-day dissolving tendencies notwithstanding, rest on Prussia, so that in the State fabric of modern Germany the army remains an integral part. The military system was devised to dominate the whole life of the nation. It took the youth at the most impressionable age, molded him to the army pattern, and retained a hold on him until late man hood. The army offered an established position and a safe career to the brainless nobleman as well as the unambitious bourgeois. By the privileges it conferred on the officer caste and by the strict regulations governing the social standing of candidates for commissions the veto on Jews, for instance—it consolidated the position of the upper classes against the growing influence of moneyed indus-

The Junkers, the titled squirearchy of Prussia, were always the backbone of the country. They are so more than ever to-day. The produce of their great landed estates in East and West Prussia, Hanover and Pomerania, which, incidently, brought them in great fortunes in the lean times of the war, renders them practically independent of the vast economic upheaval caused by the slump of the mark. To illustrate the wealth of some of these gentry I would cite the case, recently brought to my notice, of two brothers whose annual income from their forests to-day stands at the astonishing total of £120,000 sterling. And this is poor bankrupt Germany!

People call the Junkers "Monarchists." Little they cared, or care today, who rules, provided he is their puppet. "Let the King be absolute as long as he does our will" is the otto of their caste.

This Germany, represented by the unkers, solidly supported by a mass of reactionary opinion in Southern Germany, and backed by regulars of the old army throughout the Empire, the Allies, by the ambiguous and wisely-worded Military Clauses of the Treaty of Versailles, sought to disarm. Not a day passes but the Junker drives a gun-carriage and six through one or other of the twentyone articles which, as pathetically reorded in the preamble, Germany "undertakes strictly to observe."


