**Radio Program Heard
In Tunnel Below River**

Huddled in a dripping tunnel, 90 feet below the surface of the Hudson River and 1,600 feet from an exit, a group of transit officials, electrical experts, and newspapermen recently tuned in on radio concerts broadcast from Westinghouse Station KDKA, Pittsburgh, Pa., U.S.A., and a half dozen nearer stations.

The experiment was conducted at the farthest end of the uncompleted Jersey-Manhattan tube of the dual vehicular tunnel by technicians of the Radio Corporation of America, the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company and the New York and New Jersey Bridge and Tunnel Commissions.

The radio programmes were heard distinctly, both by ear phone and loud speaker. The fact that the ether vibration carried into the tunnel, penetrating 90 feet of water, 60 feet of earth and several inches of steel, demonstrated, said those in charge of the experiment, that the radio could be used as a life line of communication by entombed miners or deep-sea divers.

This convinces us that the future will enable our divers and caisson workers, whose lives often are imperilled when the telephone lines, they communicate with, are swept away, to carry small portable radio transmitting and receiving sets which will make them independent of all other means of communication," said M. M. Frolich, secretary of the New York State Bridge and Tunnel

Commission, who instituted the tests. G. Y. Allen, radio technician for the Westinghouse Company, predicted the experiments demonstrated the practicability of a miniature radio outfit that already had been designed for the protection of the miner.

"The telephone is now the deep mine worker's only means of communicating with those above ground," said Mr. Allen. "If there's an explosion or slide which cuts off his escape, the telephone lines usually are disabled also. The entombed miner is unable to tell his rescuers where he is, what has happened, what gas hazards there may be, what has been the fate of his companions, or to direct those burrowing to his aid.

"The radio should take most of the haphazard out of mine rescue work." The test—called the first successful underground reception of radio, was conducted with standard stock apparatus. The programmes heard were the regular afternoon concerts of broadcasting stations in Pittsburgh and New York.

The Pittsburgh music came clearly and with normal intensity over the headphones, but less distinctly from the loud speaker. The local concerts, however, came so loudly over the amplifier that they were heard 200 feet away.

**Giving Britain
"The Once Over"**

"WHEN AMERICA CALLS, 'Lobster palace'—swagger restaurant.

"Rubberneck wagon"—charabanc. "Tuxedo"—evening dress.

"Table Talker"—wireless loud speaker. People in this country who grow accustomed to these and other similar expressions when the American delegates begin to arrive for the International Advertising Convention, which is to be held in the Conference Halls of the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley, next July.

There will be about two thousand of them, and, to prevent any unnecessary misunderstanding, each visitor is being provided with a glossary of Anglo-American slang.

The idea originated with a half-facetious suggestion at a luncheon-party, that an American who was present chance to overhear it. Within a few weeks the glossary had become an accepted fact, all over the United States, and thousands of applications came pouring in to the Convention offices in London from intending visitors.

"This little guide," says the preface, "is not intended to be comprehensive, but perhaps slightly instructive to both English and Americans. An Englishman rarely says, 'Fancy that!' although he frequently reiterates 'Really,' punctuated by an occasional, 'quite.'"

"Don't tell an Englishman you will buy him a drink. Ask him if he would care to have one. In either case he will probably say 'Yes.' If you are addressing a Scotsman, don't trouble to think."

A glance at the glossary affords some idea of the conversational pitfalls that the American some to "give London the once-over" will have to face.

He may, for instance, find some little difficulty in convincing the British waiter that when he asks for a "high-ball," he really means a whiskey and soda and one can picture the mild flutter of astonishment of the Englishman on being told to "shoot"—get on with what he has to say—or to hear the guests at his tea-party described as "lounge-lizards."

"Cop," "Candy," "gay," "cracker," are all already familiar terms over here, but there is trouble in store for the first daring individual who refers to an Englishman as a "jane."

Some of the bright gems of the collection are:—Rant—small-sized person. Pull down—earn. Handout—charitable gift. Derby—bowler hat. Hobo—tramp. Jeans—trousers. Smooth guy—plausible fellow.

Hotel life will present by far the greatest difficulties for the American guest. Maitre d'hotels are always referred to as "captains" in the States, a term that may at first be slightly resented over here. When an American wants pancakes he asks for "flap-jacks," and "crackers" for biscuits.

The first visitor to ask the "bell-hop" (page-boy to show him the "shoe-shine parlour") is likely, in his own words, to get the "frozen mitt."

English Excavators**

London, May 17. (A.P.)—A camp house, where probably in olden times the unwelcome Roman legions once feasted, has been found among a group of newly discovered Roman remains at Folkestone, on the English Channel, where the first Romans are said to have landed. The remains consist of two buildings, in each of which are about seven hearths, which leads to the belief that they were used as the cook houses and dining halls of early Roman camps.

**American Guam
Menaced By Deadly
Coconut Tree Scale**

Agana, Guam, May 8. (A.P.)—United States marines, under the command of Captain William W. Allen, who is chief of police of this island, are leading parties of natives

in a concerted attack on a most pernicious enemy. The enemy is a sap-dripping insect, a scale insect pest, recently discovered to be destroying coconut palms, banana trees, alligator pear trees and three.

More than 8,000 trees were found infested in widely separated localities all over the island. The insects are so small that they barely are visible. They attack trees by sucking the sap, causing the foliage to

turn a mottled yellow at first, and in the last stages to assume the appearance of having been scorched by fire.

The scale is one of the most destructive known. It recently wiped out the coconut industry of the island of Siapan, 120 miles from Guam.

SWIMMING.
Swimming "Upside Down."
Most of the styles of swimming adopted by the rest of creation can be encompassed by human beings, but the earliest animal to imitate is, of course, the dog. Having assumed the breast stroke position, the swimmer uses his hands in up and down circles, in front of him and never to the sides at all, and uses his legs as if propelling a bicycle.

The basis of several other fancy tricks is found in the ability to scull the body with the hands. The swimmer assumes the floating position with the arms flat at the sides, palm downwards. From this position the hands move with a circular motion from the wrists, and there is just the slightest bending of the elbows. With the arms held in this position the body is sculled along, head foremost. If the arms are fully extended above the head and the hands circled upon the wrists as already described, the body will travel feet foremost. An elaboration of this trick of propelling the body feet foremost is found in bending the legs at the knees and throwing back the head, which is buried in the water. With an upward stroke of the hands, which also submerges the shoulders, the swimmer then begins to scull, as already described, and with the arms still extended above the head. This trick, if mastered, is very effective, because all that the spectators see are the swimmers feet sliding through the water.

TRAINING FOR FOOTBALL.
The Wing Half-Back.
To come to tackling an opponent this must be dictated by the wing half-back's own intelligence sometimes he is placed to tackle his man as soon as the latter has received the ball and then there is no need for delay, but if the opposing inside forward has had time to get it under control, then the half must use his discretion. What he must not do is a blind rush on retreating too much; each is but playing into the hands of the other side. By the exercise of a little coolness, the right moment will come even if the tackle is not, after all, a successful one. No player can expect to do everything he tries for! Further duties of the wing half-back one of the opposing goal and throwing in from touch. Each may seem unimportant to the young player but each can either directly or indirectly lead to a goal. I hate to see a free kick taken hurriedly or blindly, since a careful look round first may reveal a weakness in the position taken up by the defenders. Similarly, with the throw-in, nothing can be gained by a hasty throw, but, on the other hand, a lot may come from a judicious throw to one of your own team, who may have been overlooked and left unmarked.

What Makes Salt Codfish Turn Pink and Red?

THE ANSWER, FOUND BY SCIENTIST, IS WORTH \$1,000,000 TO FISH INDUSTRY.

What makes salt codfish turn pink and red? Seems a foolish question, doesn't it? But it isn't! It has been answered by Dr. William W. Browne, professor of bacteriology at the College of the City of New York, after five years of pondering it. Its answer is worth \$1,000,000 a year to the American salt fish industry.

Salt codfish is turned pink and red by a microbe, a germ, a bacterium, an organism. This salt coloring microbe, germ, bacteria or organism is unique. Where other specimens of this lowest form of animal life die quickly when exposed to the rays of the sun—typhoid bacteria is so destroyed in five minutes—this cod coloring organism thrives best in tropical sunshine. Where others can be destroyed by a very weak solution of sodium chloride—plain salt on the dinner table—this will not grow in water of less salt content than 18 per cent, and thrives best in a solution approximately 100 per cent salt. Where other organisms live only in a range of temperature between 20 degrees centigrade and 37 centigrade—body heat—this hilariously tinted germ grows in temperature of from 37 C. to 55 C. However, this germ is a constant fellow, a true affinity of sea salt, with no affection whatever for salt that comes from a mine. By using mineral salt to cure their cod, according to Professor Browne, the salters of fish can save their million a year.

The Whiter the Dearer.

The price of salt cod at the delicatessen varies with the whiteness of the fish, the whiter the dearer and the redder the cheaper. A good white salt cod may be grasped by the tail and shaken vigorously with no other result than tiring the arm of the shaker. Shake a pink or red salt cod a few moments and the flesh falls from the container, leaving you holding the bag—the skin. The germ which colors the fish destroys the substance which holds the meat together.

While the work of this unique microbe is most spectacular upon the cod, it is equally potent as a disintegrator of the haddock, the cusk, the pollack and the hake. It colors the haddock less vividly than the cod, the cusk less than the haddock, and the pollack less than the cusk. The cusk might be described as a conscienceless fellow; he absorbs this germ without the faintest pink blush of shame.

Waste the Epsom Salts.

The prescription this time is the final product, the salt that is shipped to Gloucester. When this exaporation progresses to where only an inch or two of water covers the salt deposit, the water is baled off. This discarded water is rich in Epsom and other salts, but no effort is made to collect and market it.

"The baling of the final water presents another exhibit of evolution. This baling is done by barefooted negroes. Doubtless their progenitors suffered agonies while plying their mahogany snow-shovel-like scoops at this baling. But the present generation has invulnerable feet.

"While inspecting these second stage lagoons I came across one wherein the salt precipitation, which had just begun, was crystal clear. Those previously visited had all shown signs of our vivid germ. The natives, much to my surprise, were emptying their clean lagoon, believing that the absence of red bacteria indicated that the salt was bad.

"Having located the source of Gloucester's red fish germ, I began testing samples of sea water from all over the world, as soon as I returned to New York. The Bureau of Fisheries, obtained the samples from commanders of incoming ships. I extracted salt from each sample and bred cultures in the salt without difficulty. Just where the first colorful germ came from I was never able to ascertain, but I found traces of the germs in all sea-salt-making centers; Algiers, Africa, Terravizza, Spain, Trapani, Sicily, and Southern California.—The Brooklyn Eagle, June 1.

How They Do Elsewhere.

In Nova Scotia and Norway, two other centers of fish salting, there is an intervening step between drying and shipping. This step is said to be not entirely unknown in Gloucester. It consists of giving the dry salt fish a good soaking in strong boric acid solution. The antiseptic coating thus imparted prevents the growth of previously absorbed red microbes. Knowing housewives thoroughly wash salt fish before cooking many of our United States centers have legislated against the sale of boric acid treated salt fish.

The use of mineral sodium chloride would obviate the red disintegrator of dry salt fish. But mineral salt is more expensive than that which may be cured from the bounty of the sea. It also renders the fish unattractively like cork wood, stiff and hard. In sea salt are numerous impurities which exert a barometric control of the moisture content of the product, absorbing moisture as needed, keeping the fish in the desired firm but pliant condition.

"I sought an answer to the question 'What turns salted cod pink and red?' said Professor Browne, "five years ago, at the instance of the Bureau of Fisheries. I studied the fish-salting industry as conducted in Gloucester and eventually arrived at the answer. I made smears of the extract of clean white fish, which I first sterilized, then rubbed a red salt fish over the smear. When the slide was placed in an incubator, I soon produced a culture of organisms, little spiral bacteria that were pink and deep red, others that were of rod form.

"When by laboratory tests I had ascertained the conditions governing their growth, I sought their source. At first I thought them indigent to Gloucester, then that they were imported with the salt. I visited Salt Cay, a coral reef which juts out into the ocean three miles from the body of Turks Island and is an average

THE VOGUE OF BLACK.

Obviousness Versus Sophistication.

Once upon a time it followed, as the night the day, that if you were buying furniture for a porch you bought green and white. To-day green and white. To-day green is considered too obvious by those who want smartness as well as durability from their furniture. Other colors will do, natural grass furniture is permitted, but black is the ultimate touch of sophistication. And it certainly is stunning. Do you remember in your childhood how porches were furnished with green wooden rockers with rush seats? How the tempo has quickened in these last two decades! Black For Young, White For the Old. Black dress goods in the old days were chiefly utilized by middle aged and elderly women (meaning anyone over 30). To-day it seems as if the young were more likely to wear black than the old. And I think they can better afford it. Black, unrelieved, belongs to the young, who can set it off by their own youth and color. It is smart on them; it is a challenge. On the middle aged it is a handicap. They need the softer colors, soft grey and white and lavender. When they wear black it should always be generously relieved.

Whenever a fashion started by the 400 is taken up by the four million it is soon abandoned by the 400 and then progressively by the four million. I wonder how long it will take this to happen in the vogue of black?

Our Dormant Resources

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—May I claim a few lines in your valuable paper to give publicity to a few observations I have made during a brief time in St. John's. I would remind Newfoundlanders that this island possesses such an enormous amount of untapped wealth that under careful administration and development of her natural resources could make her a young England. The fishing industry is as yet an untouched gold mine, and calls for more rapid development and enterprise. The establishment of up-to-date canneries and chemical plant to deal with fish offal and its conversion into artificial manures. The salmon itself is of exquisite flavour and superior to the much boomed British Columbia sockeye. A strenuous endeavour should be made to increase the export of canned fish and cod liver oil to England. Newfoundland oil is quite equal in quality to the Norwegian variety. The dormant energy lying in the lakes and rivers calls for conversion into Hydro-electric power, and I would urge upon Newfoundlanders the necessity of giving more publicity to this form of motive power to the outside world and attract capital for its development. Given a sufficient and cheap supply of hydro-electricity the vast forests of lumber, other than that used for pulp and paper making, can be used for dry distillation and conversion into tar, alcohol, methyl alcohol and other products for which there is an enormous demand throughout the world in the paint and varnish making industries. The land thus cleared would become of extreme agricultural value and products hitherto imported could be home grown. On my way here from Port aux Basques I observed large quantities of saw-just lying rotten and useless to waste. The apparent useless article is of great value. By chemical process it is used in the manufacture of calcic acid and other bleaching chemicals used in laundries and brass and copper works. The development of hydro-electric power would give to Newfoundland a valuable alkali industry, carbide and acetylene gas, used in steel welding.

Newfoundland Poultry Association

The June conference of the Poultry Association was held in the Board of Trade rooms last evening. The President, welcomed Mr. Alfred Martin, of Hamilton Avenue, who joined the Association. A circular was approved of to send to outport folk showing the advantages of joining the organization. Records of May 28th were read showing the results of the egg laying competition at Truro, N.S., where White Leghorns leading in laying the largest number of eggs, Rhode Island Reds coming second. Secretary McCarter is enquiring about freight rate from England on live poultry, which at present is prohibitive—the present rate being more than the cost of the birds. The Association approved of the new regulations regarding the annual show, exhibitors yearly who make exhibits for the first time. All competitors who import birds must have them when here sixty days before the show in order to enter them for points. A resolution of regret was passed to Judge Tom Lynch, who has left for Boston. Judge Lynch has been an active member of the Club and the members are sorry to lose his services. Seven poultry club members reported their flocks had laid 3,490 eggs for May month. Secretary McCarter reports that Mrs. T. McCarty of Renews advised him of an extra large egg from one of her flocks weighing five ounces. Greater interest is being taken in poultry culture than for many years. A large number of hatching eggs have been distributed to the following places: St. John's and suburbs, Topsail, Bay Roberts, Heart's Content, Bell Island, Goulds, Dunville, Placentia, Grand Falls, Bonavista, Carnarville, Musgrave Harbor, Coley's Point, Belleoram, Conception Harbor, Upper Gullies, Lamaline, Botwood, Little Bay Islands, etc. The Association estimates that the members have distributed about three thousand eggs for hatching to date this season, of which about a thousand were White Leghorns, which breed is rapidly increasing in popularity in Newfoundland by reason of its early maturity in laying its eggs at five and a half months old and being a small consumer of grain.

Radio Through 120 Feet of Solid Rock

Radio waves can leap through 120 feet of solid rock about as swiftly as through free air. This was demonstrated recently at Rocky River, Ohio, when a receiving set placed that distance underground in a mine shaft picked up concerts from local and distant stations.

The set was used with a highly directional loop. Because the tunnel at no point was higher than 5 1/2 feet and averaged four feet in width, the sides and roof exerted a marked ground capacity. This was overcome by swinging the loop parallel with the mine shaft, proving that the radio waves heard were penetrating the rock, not entering the mouth of the tunnel.

A loudspeaker was used. Local stations came in very loud, and many distant stations were heard faintly.

Kerosene Spray Designed to Clean Auto Engine

A kerosene vapor spray device for cleaning grease, oil, and dust from automobile engines and other machinery recently has been developed. It consists of a nozzle with a double jet, one of which is attached to the compressed-air line and the other to a kerosene can.

As the air is released from the air-line, passing through the hose and out of the jet, it sucks up kerosene through the hose connected with the can. The cleaner is operated on the injector principle and a powerful spray of kerosene and air is thrown against the motor, quickly cleaning off dirt and grease. The flow of kerosene can be regulated at will.

After the engine surface is cleaned, the kerosene is shut off and the motor is dried with the air.

Charlottetown, June 2.—Charles Mitchell, of Mount Albion, has received telegraphic advice from Muscatine, Idaho, stating that the body of his son, Isaac, formerly of Village Green P.E.I., had been found in a river there under circumstances that pointed to his having been murdered and robbed of his jewelry and money.

Photographing Electricity Without Light.

The remarkable discovery that electrical disturbances lasting twenty billionths of a second can be made to record themselves on a photographic plate, without light, has been made by Mr. J. P. Peters, electrical engineer, Westinghouse Electrical & Manufacturing Company.

Photographs made in such infinitesimal time are most remarkable. To gain an idea of this most unbelievable speed it is only necessary to point out that light could travel around the earth seven times in one second and in twenty billionths of a second it can travel only twenty feet. The projectile of the monster cannon used by the Germans to bombard Paris would have gone in this length of time approximately five thousandths of an inch—not enough movement to be visible.

The instrument used by Mr. Peters to obtain his photographs is termed a Klydonograph. It consists of a suitable plate holder for receiving ordinary photographic plates, and is provided with suitable electric connections so that electrical disturbances may be brought into contact with the sensitized side of the plate.

When surges occur in the transmission line they photograph themselves. The surges may last two-billionths of a second, or longer, so that the photographic plate must register them in that minute space of time. Mr. Peters states that he has never yet detected visible light in the camera while photographing a surge and that therefore the impulses must contain some property in themselves that affect the plate. The prints obtained from such plate exposures show many geometrical figures of beautiful shapes and also take on certain definite forms according to the character of the voltage at the time the surge or impulse occurred. It is possible to observe from the developed plate whether the voltage at the time of the surge was positive or negative, whether it was alternating or unidirectional and the direction the surge was travelling, and its intensity.

Mr. Peters states that the photographs obtained by the Klydonograph are of immense importance to transmission engineers. The instrument for taking the photographs is the only practical device yet invented and made for obtaining data in regard to that type of line disturbance, known as surges. Heretofore, engineers have only known that surges occur but where they occur and their nature has been largely guesswork. The photographic plate now gives the characteristics of surges, thus giving the engineers data with which to devise line protection.

The instrument, Mr. Peters states, will do much to enable the engineering profession to increase the reliability and continuity of service on existing power lines. The device is applicable to transmission lines of all kinds and is connected to them by means of an electrostatic potentiometer.

In early tests Mr. Peters used a condenser discharge to simulate the condition that occurs during the period of a surge. From these discharges were obtained his first photographs of electrical impulses. Later, tests were made with the Klydonograph connected directly on a transmission line.

Mr. Peters is a native of Franklin County, Pennsylvania, U.S.A., and joined the Westinghouse Company in 1905, working first in the shop, but soon being transferred to the Engineering Department. His first engineering work was in the Transformer Engineering Department and he has remained in that department since. In the last few years, Mr. Peters has interested himself greatly in high voltage phenomena and did a great deal of work in connection with the 1,000,000 volt transformer at the Westinghouse High Voltage Laboratory that has created a sensation in the engineering world. While on this work, he was directed to develop some device for recording surges that occur on transmission lines. The Klydonograph is the result of his investigation.

Flying Autos in 20 Years

AN EXPERT'S VISIONARY PICTURE OF MOTOR TRAVEL IN THE FUTURE.

By E. V. RICKENBACKER.

Ace of Aces in the World War. Within the next two decades autos will be made with folding wings so that when on a straight stretch of road they can be spread and the machine will take to the air. The present day tendency to lighten the construction of automobiles through the extensive use of aluminum alloys, without sacrificing the safety factor, and the great progress made in airplane construction as the result of recent experiments with motorless gliders, as well as motor gliders, are the two factors that will make this probable.

This combination automobile-airplane will have a body shaped similar to the present hydroplane hull, making it both a water and land machine. The wheels will protrude sufficiently to permit the machine to be driven on the highway after the wings have been collapsed, propeller disengaged and the automobile control mechanism applied, which in reality will give a three-in-one conveyance.

Imagine the convenience of being able to drive around in the city, as is done nowadays, and then when you start for some other town and get on a straight of way or enter a near-by pasture, to unfold the wings on the machine and take to the air! It will mean quicker transportation for the suburbanite, for people living at a distance from a large city, and for the traveling salesman who now uses the motor car and highways to cover his territory.

Recent glider trials held throughout Europe have shown ways of increasing the lifting power, while reducing the spread of airplane wings. Further, it has been demonstrated that with properly constructed wings and properly designed motors it is possible to fly almost any type of fuselage.

The development of automatic safety devices to control flight will decrease the liability of accident. Today, flying is no more dangerous than motoring on the streets and highways—sometimes I think not as dangerous. However, people have a fear of flying that will have to be overcome just as they had to overcome their fear of traveling 20 miles an hour in the horseless carriage of 20 years ago.

Save in time of war, there is no need for stunt flying, and that is the only really dangerous part in flying. It is a good bit like driving through heavy traffic at 60 miles an hour—every one doesn't have the skill to do it.

Rigid rules will be laid down for flying, much the same as there are rules for vehicular traffic today.

In the combined automobile-airplane I see a machine, that is not greatly different from the present-day motor car, except in its decreased size. The body will be narrower and shorter, to reduce weight, and will be of a modified streamline design. The engine will be made

lighter and smaller, but with about the same horsepower as is used today through the use of a supercharger.

The wings will fold back against the sides of the car when driving along the street and will have sufficient span to lift the car off the ground at a moderate "take-off" speed. The 23-foot span that it is possible to build on the present-day motor-car—124-foot wings on each side—will be sufficient to lift the lighter and more efficiently built machine of 1940.

Consider what such a machine will mean to the man who works in the city. He could live several miles farther away from the heart of the city and spend less time getting to and from work. By flying, more speed could be made with a greater degree of safety than now possible on the streets and highways.

It would not take a great stretch of imagination to foresee municipalities regulating the height of buildings to uniformity, the streets to be bridged, in order to form one vast landing-field in the center of each city for flying machines. The landing-field or tops of the buildings could be connected with the street level by elevators so that a machine alighting could descend to the street and be driven about as an automobile. At the end of the business day it would be driven on back to the elevator and lifted to the roof to take off for the homeward flight.

Such a forecast is more than pure fancy. It is founded on present progress in automobile and airplane design.

210 Miles of Jointless Pipe

TO CART-MATERIAL-GAS-SUPPLY.

KIRBYVILLE, TEX.—C.P.—A continuous steel tube 210 miles long, without a coupling or a screw-thread connection will be laid this summer between the Texas-Louisiana natural gas fields near Shreveport, La., and Beaumont, Tex.

When completed, the longest 16 in. diameter pipe line in the world will cross two rivers, innumerable creeks and run underground through four countries to carry the natural gas to Beaumont. Oxygen-free welding will seal every joint, replacing the old method of screw couplings, thus reducing the upkeep of the line to the vanishing point, and conserving a great quantity of gas from the leakage which has always been unavoidable with threaded joints.

Desert Cliffs Yield Ancient Secrets

Of America's little-explored natural wonders that are being opened to tourists by the completion of new automobile highways, few are more interesting from a scientific standpoint than the majestic cliffs that mark the site of an ancient lake in the now waterless wastes of the Mojave Desert in southern California.

Here from the depths of deep defiles rise great buttressed walls fashioned through the ages by nature's architecture. These strange formations in the heart of desert lands, hold for the scientific explorer a fascinating story of the ages, giving up new secrets of evolution on the American continent.

Millions of years ago, geologists tell us, the present waterless country of the Mojave Desert was dotted with lakes and rivers. Into the lake waters year after year spring freshets and floods washed sand and clay, laying down layer after layer of mud in the lake bottoms.

Now, by some unrecorded convulsion of the earth, these lake bottoms have been lifted up, and the rains of the centuries gradually have cut through them, creating the buttress-like formations. The projecting, shelf-like layers mark the harder strata, where the material deposited in the ancient lake bottom happened to be sandier and sturdier than usual. These harder strata have resisted the rains more than the rest.

In the softer between the harder layers, modern geologists have found the bones of animals long extinct—animals that reveal important stages in evolution as it was enacted on the North American continent. The clay layers have yielded, for example, the bones of a remote ancestor of our modern horse.

Scientific interest in these discoveries have been increased by the recent finding of five prehistoric human skeletons, standing upright in undisturbed strata at Los Angeles, only a comparatively few miles to the west. Scientists believe the skeletons date to the last Ice Age, 125,000 or more years ago. Further excavations will be undertaken in the hope of revealing relics of glacial days.

Jumped into the Sea to Save Balloon

A French balloon, one of eleven which started from St. Cloud, Paris, in competition for the Aumont Thierville Cup, landed at Broughton, Hampshire, with only the pilot aboard, his companion, M. Boitard, having jumped into the sea when the balloon was caught in a Channel storm.

During the night the balloonists lost their bearings, and while over Solent they found the sea was escaping from the bag. They threw out all the ballast, but the balloon continued to sink and was in danger of falling into the sea, when Boitard adopted the daring expedient of jumping overboard.



Produce and Provisions.

Codfish—Not much can now be written as to codfish. The St. John's market is practically denuded, except for the late caught fish of last fall, which after all is comparatively small. The outlook for the future is bright, and with a good catch of fish well cured, we are certain to market most of our catch of both Shore and Labrador. The prices that will rebound to the country's benefit. Cod is making its appearance already in many places and the fishery will soon be in full swing, and we must hope for the desired success. The Norwegian fishery now promises to be a record one of nearly so, this year's total to date being 62 millions as against 46 millions for last year, but no doubt most of this will have been disposed of in the European markets before our new fish comes into competition with it. The exports for the week were 2,547 quintals for the West Indies, and 350 quintals to Italy, while the schr. Jordon T. Tibbo sailed for Oporto from Grand Bank with 4,761 quintals.

Flour—As far as trade in flour goes the market has taken on the activity usually evident at this more or less busy season, and much business was done during the week. Much of the goods is being handled in connection with the supplying for the fishery in addition to the current consumption all over the country. To date the imports we will up to the average of other years, and it would not be surprising if imports this year were not in excess of some of the more prosperous of previous periods, as the article is now perhaps cheaper than it has been for many years past. The remission of the duty and the cutting of the freight one half has largely contributed to this. The market all the week has been strong, and there was an advance of 20 cents per barrel. The imports for the week were 4,534 bbls. by the Winona from Montreal, 1,980 by the Essex from New York, and 840 by S.S. Hekia. The prices, wholesale, locally, vary from \$4.80 to \$7.25 and \$7.30 per barrel, according to the quality required.

Rural Tragedy in Spain Brings Death to Four

Madrid, May 12. (A.P.)—Three persons were killed and one burned to death recently as a result of an attempted burglary of a lodge occupied by a woman and her family at a remote railway crossing near Monzon.

A gipsy woman armed with a revolver broke into the lodge with the object of robbing it. The crossing-keeper overpowered her, locked her in one of the rooms and then sent her son to fetch his father. The gipsy woman's husband, who had been keeping watch outside, realizing that his wife was a prisoner, caught the son, killed him, and himself got into the lodge to release his wife.

The gatekeeper succeeded in locking him in another room where a big stock of wood was kept and then set fire to it. The man was burned to death.

Meanwhile two policemen, attracted by the cries of the tortured gipsy arrived on the scene. As they entered the room in which the gipsy woman was locked, she fired and killed one of them and was herself shot dead by the other.

Bible Text Used as Ballot

Berlin, May 19. (A.P.)—When the tellers in one of the outlying Berlin districts counted the votes in the recent Reichstag election, they found one ballot marked "John 4:24."

From the Bible the tellers learned what the voter thought of the 188 candidates running in the district: "Behold, ye are of nothing, and your work of naught; an abomination is he that chooseth you."

California to Produce Silk

OHIOVILLE, Cal., June 4. (A.P.)—A silk farm near here has commenced operations of incubating more than 2,000,000 eggs of silk worms for the commercial production of silk. The eggs were imported from France and Italy. The farm has more than 25,000 mulberry trees planted for feeding the worms and furnishing the material from which silk is made.



Sugar—Most dealers in sugar are now of the opinion that prices have reached the bottom mark, and that no further decline in figures seems to be possible, at least for a while yet, as the consumption of this article must continue to increase largely during the next few months. As a matter of fact during the last couple of days of the week an advance of about 10 points was recorded, which would go to show that the general tendency is for an upward turn for the present, and it must be remembered that the Cuban crop which is now being harvested will be available in a month or six weeks time. The sugar imported during the week amounted to 1,525 bbls. by various conveyances from New York and Halifax, and the prices prevailing on the local market are: for granulated, \$3.20 per bbl.; and for brown sugar in 100 lb. sacks, \$7.55.

Molasses—Though the duty has been removed from molasses, all indications are at present that, before many months pass over, the price will soar; and it cannot be otherwise, for supplies to date are very much short of those received last year. Molasses will be a hard article to procure six months hence, all dealers believe, and our imports to date, as far as we can learn, are much less than last year. The market is pretty active now, owing to the presence of the fishery supplying season. The price ruling to date is in excess of that quoted last year, but not much so. Had the duty remained on the goods, however, it would have been much heavier. During the week two cargoes of molasses arrived here. The schr. Catherine Moulton discharged 300 puns, 30 tiers, and 150 bbls., and the schr. Little Stephen, 267 puns, 25 barrels and 147 half barrels—for factory (new) 90 cents the gallon, and choice (new) 80 cents.

Tea—Like most other lines, the market in tea has been active of late, and a good deal of business is being done. In England the duty on this article has been lowered considerably, and quite a rush demand has ensued there as a result, so that some of the more prominent importers say that in some of the exporting countries an advance has been noted of about one penny or nearly two cents per lb., and no doubt there will be a sympathetic advance in this market. Up to date, however, nothing like this has been noticed, and prices rule the same as last week. The weeks imports were 100 packages by the Rosalind from New York; 335 by the Digby from Liverpool; and 100 by the Schem. Figures locally, wholesale, vary from 34 to 80 cents per pun, according to quality.

Hay & Oats—There is not much doing in hay and oats at present, nor will there be for some months to come. Of the latter there were imported during the week 3,056 sacks by S.S. Winona from Montreal, and the figures quoted locally are: P.R.I. Black Oats, \$3.50 per sack of four bushels; White 2 feed, \$3.35; Mixed, \$3.30. Hay is quoted at \$36 per ton.

Miscellaneous—Amongst the miscellaneous imports for the week were 2,347 sacks potatoes, 268 packages of butter, 88 packages of cheese, 300 crates cabbage, 8,000 fire clay brick, 750 packages cement, 800 sacks corn, 100 bags rice, 437 sacks peas, 780 boxes soap, 350 bags salt, 600 pieces of spruce deals, 100 bbls. prunes, 325 packages soap powder, 300 tubs lard, 150 pieces pipe, 205 packages shoes, 50 cases canned goods, 92 pcs. maple flooring, 98 packages rubber boots, 103 packages slippers, 155 packages paper, and 75 cases oranges.




