The New School Bill -- Meeting in Erin. The New School Bill --Meeting in Erin.

A meeting convened by order of the Trustees, was held in the school house in section No. 12, Erin, on Wednesday evening, 24th ult., for the purpose of discussing the new School Bill. John Burt, Esq., was called to the chair, and commenced the business of the evening by stating the object of the meeting. Mr. George Dixon and others were then called upon, and spoke in most decided terms against the Bill, as a whole, pointing out as some of the more objectionable features, the centralizing nature of the whole measure by confining the power too much in the hands of superior officials, the appointment of the Local Superintendents, and the infringement of the rights of the people in many instances. The following resolution was then put and carried unanimously:—"Resolved, that this meeting after due consideration of M. C. Cameron's Bill to amend the Common School Act for Ontario, is in favor of a total rejection of the measure as one injurious to the interests of education, more especially in rural districts." ## Ocean Penny Postage.

The question of an ocean penny ostage has to be decided in about a fortnight or it will have to stand over ex Prussian.) for eight years longer. Before the late British Government went out of power they invited tenders for the Atlantic Mail Service. Tenders were sent in by the Cunard and Inman Companies conjointly to perform the service for £150,000 a year, the contract to last for ten years, £100,000 going to the Cunard, and £35,000 to the Inman Company. This was refused. Government offered £70,000 to the Inman Company, with a contract for seven years, and one year's notice, which would make eight years. This was accepted, subject to ratification by Parliament. The new Government tried to reduce the term of contract to six years but failed. 

Lunch was taken in the tomb of Rameses IX. A visit was paid to the Temple of Karnak by torchlight, the effect of which was heightened by numbers of sailors and Arabs being placed with torches and rockets in every available crevice of the ruins. The whole fleet got aground at Silsilis, near the first cataract, and all the steamers had to be ightened. Coloned Stanton's steamer had to be left behind.

WINE IN CALIFORNIA — California papers represent that wine drinking and consequent intoxication on the Pacific coast is increasing to an alarming extent. Common wine is as abundant as milk, and often more freely drank. In some counties wine is but thirty cents a gallon, while milk costs fifty cents, and in other counties their price is the same. Even women and children use wine as a beverage to such an extent as to cause grave apprehensions for the social morality of the people. As a consequence the use of whiskey and brandy is rapidly on the increase, and the blessing of cheap wine which Californians congratulated themselves upon, bids fair to prove an unmitigated curse to them.
