

The Government deserve all credit for the prompt manner in which they are bringing before the House the measures promised in the Speech at the opening of the session. On Tuesday night Hon. Mr. Dorion introduced the Government Bill for the election of members of Parliament by ballot. The Government prefer the system by which absolute secrecy in voting is preserved. Each Province is to be allowed to fix the franchise for the Dominion elections within its own boundaries. This is done in order to save a great deal of unnecessary trouble and expense, and it is proposed also to adopt both the franchise and the machinery of the Local Legislatures in the elections for the Commons. The Ontario Legislature in their election law have adopted the English, or open system, of voting, so that we will have experience of both in our elections, and after a thorough trial will be able to say which system is the best.

The Bill also provides that Sheriffs or Registrars be Returning Officers; that the elections shall take place simultaneously over the whole Dominion on the same day except in British Columbia, Manitoba and the electoral districts of Algoma and Muskoka. Public nominations are to be done away with, and in their place nominations are to be made in writing to the returning officer, each nomination to be signed by not less than two electors. The day and place will be fixed for the nomination, and at the hour mentioned the returning officer will be present to receive the nomination papers. The property qualifications of candidates is to be done away with, which will make the law in that respect the same as it is in the local elections for Ontario.

Nearly all the speakers who followed Mr. Dorion expressed unqualified approval of the bill, characterizing it as a measure which will secure the true, unbiassed and unimpeded wishes of the people in the choice of representatives, and which would simplify the whole machinery of elections. We are satisfied the country will endorse this opinion, and that the bill, in its main features, will meet the views of the Opposition as well as the supporters of the Government.

The Globe is sorry to learn that Mr. McEwan, the chief of the syndicate which floated the last Grand Trunk issue of stock, has stopped payment, with liabilities \$463,000.

AMNESTY.—Mr. Mackenzie, on Tuesday, in reply to a question, stated distinctly that it was not the intention of the Government to apply for an amnesty for Riel, or any one engaged in the Red River insurrection.

The Clinton, Ill., Public, a temperance advocate, says, "Returns from twenty-five different towns in Ohio show that over one thousand saloons have been closed since the woman's temperance movement began, and that the number is fast increasing." It seems remarkable that the number should "be fast increasing," notwithstanding that so many have been closed.

MEMORIE IMMIGRANTS.—The U. S. Senate Committee on Public Lands on Friday heard a delegation of the Menonites from Pennsylvania and two from Russia, asking legislation to enable preparation to be made for the settlement in the United States of some 40,000 Menonites now living in Russia, who are obliged to emigrate from that country prior to the year 1881, or else perform military service which the tenets of their religion forbid. The committee authorized Senator Windom, of Minnesota, to prepare and report to the Senate a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to withdraw from public sale such large tracts of land as they desire to occupy within the next two years, either by homestead or pre-emption entry.

Court of Chancery. APRIL 7.

NATIONAL EXCHANGE BANK OF ALBANY vs. MOORE AND OTHERS.—Bill filed to have trustee of a deed of composition and discharge declared liable for the dividend of plaintiffs. Judgment reserved. Mr. Cassels for plaintiffs, Attorney General Mowat for defendants.

ROBINSON vs. McDONALD.—Bill filed by assignee of a mortgage to recover amount of mortgage debt or for foreclosure. The defence was that the mortgage contained a special insurance clause whereby the mortgagee had before the assignment received \$1,400 in respect of policy of insurance thereon, the property having been destroyed by fire, and this money paid over to the mortgagee. By the conditions of the mortgage, the mortgagee was, upon the mortgagee's erecting a brick store of certain dimensions, to hand over to the mortgagor this \$1,400. This he failed to do, and the mortgagor in this suit contended that it should be applied in reduction of his mortgage. Decree accordingly, with costs to defendant, Mr. Ferguson and Mr. Allen for plaintiffs; Mr. Cassels for defendants.

-Application has been made to the Home Secretary for a new trial of the Tichborne Claimant.

Huron and Quebec Railway.—An influential meeting in the interest of this railway was held in the Town Hall, Stratford, on Tuesday evening, presided over by Mr. P. R. Jarvis, Reeve. Mr. Fowler, of Cobourg, addressed the meeting at length, setting forth the advantages of the proposed southern branch of the railway extending from Orangeville through the northern part of the county of Waterloo and the county of Perth by Stratford to Port Frank and Mooretown, to connect with the railways of the West. The mileage of the road through Perth will be thirty miles, and the bonus asked from both the county of Perth and town of Stratford is \$330,000. It is proposed that the principal workshops of the branch shall be located at Stratford, employing at least one hundred and fifty men. This railway is a part of the proposed scheme extending from Quebec westward.

Lois.—The machinery of Randall & Co's factory has been removed from Hespeler, and Mr. Farr and a number of the operatives have left for Holyoke, Mass.

Mr. T. J. Day has sent us Bow Bells for April. It is an excellent number, profusely illustrated.

News from Ottawa. Ottawa, April 7th. M. Masson, of Terrebonne, denies the statement which appeared in the Star and other journals, that Riel was his guest in Terrebonne since the House adjourned. A mass meeting of the Frenchmen of Hull, under the cloak of a meeting of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, was held last night at Leduc's Gardens. About 500 were present. They proposed organizing a body of three thousand men, drafting a petition for Riel's pardon, and if their petition was not granted, to take possession of the House. After a great deal of discussion, it was decided to send in their petition, and if a pardon be not granted, to allow Riel to appear. Drs. Beaudin and Champagne had a dinner with them at the meeting, and gave him a seat upstairs in Leduc's Garden, at a window which they raised, so that he could see and hear all that passed. This man is supposed to have been Riel in disguise. A mass meeting was held of the Gatineau Point yesterday afternoon on the same question, and another is called for this evening. It is reported that several Orangemen were in the galleries on Wednesday last, armed with revolvers, and resolved to take Riel's life, and the extraordinary precautions which the Government take to preserve order show that a disturbance is feared to-morrow. If Riel came to any injury, it is certain that the French population of this city would do something desperate.
