

Minister Foster Expresses Regret at the Attitude of the Government.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, says: "From 1868 up to the present time the Government of Canada has been in the door of the United States for free admission to her markets on a just and equitable basis."

Proposals have been made and repeated, but none, in 1854, were ever overruled. The mutually favorable trade relations would have run until to-day but for its termination by the United States.

Since then not a suggestion of any overture has been made to Canada for a renewal of free trade relations by the Congress of the United States, while repeated individual efforts on behalf of the members of Congress or the President have been rebuffed by the committee, silently passed by, or openly condemned by the representatives.

Under these circumstances, Canada must take matters as they are, and persevere her commercial course with a spirit of independence, while she must regret that so large and rich a country as the United States should not consent to a mutual arrangement or a free exchange which would be advantageous to both.

She has the market of Great Britain open to her natural products, and is willing to take all she can get.
