"If the statements made by Mr. Henry George, in his letter of August 28, filed at Washington on Saturday by his connsel, is correct they certainly present a case for the immediate and careful attention of the government. In preparation for the struggle the conservatives held a great convention here last week, which was certainly a success as regards the number attending, and the enthusiasm displayed in favor of the chieften. And now, directly the demonstration is over, comes eight vacancies are to be filled at an early day, which, of course, must be taken to mean that the event of the general election lies over until next year. It looks almost as if Mr. Mowat had wanted to distinguish himself as a practical joker; allowing his opponents to hold their convention with the question of a general election this year still in suspense, and then immediately the affair was over announcing that the event is postponed until 1883. A campaign there is to be this year, however, after all. But it is to be only a little one; not the great campaign that people have been looking for. We are to have two contests instead of one ; the lesser first, and the greater afterwards. As the initiative lies with Mr. Mewat, who can bring on the greater conest when he chooses, we must suppose tha he has an advantage to himself in having a smaller contest in advance of the greater. And, whether or not anybody be dispose to look upon him as a practical joker on this occasion, his friends will doubtless b claiming credit for him as a tactician.

Still, the little campaign may prove of more importance than to some people might at first sight appear. Eight elections all at once make up something of an event; though there will be only seven contests, a compromise having been arrived at in on the bay until the breakwater men get one of the constituencies-North Renfrew. Last week's convention was avowedly in preparation for the general elections only, and it might be said that the conservative arrangements for that event should not be turned from their proper purpose to meet the smaller event of several by elections. But certain considerations there are, the bearing of which lies the other way. Can and make matters worse than ever at the Sir John and Mr. Meredith afford, immediately after the great display of last week, to allow even the appearance of slackness in the matter of the bitter contest, on the plea that they are reserving their energies for the greater? On their side there is undoubtedly a great rise in prestige and enthusiasm as the result of the onvention; but would not the enthusiasm suffer a tremenduous cooling off, if the chiefs did not on the instant accept Mr. Mowat's challenge to a preliminary engagement. This is the way it appears to us; we do not see how the conservative chiefs can entertain the idea of risking their prospects by hanging back, or even appearing to hang back, on the present occasion. Such a course would, to say the least, be remark. ably out of keeping with the brave words which have just been spoken at the convention. It would almost certainly provoke ridicule, which is more to be dreaded by a statesman than even popular indignation.

Very unlikely is it, however, that the conservative leaders will expose themselves to the chances of being ridiculed for not accepting Mr. Mowat's challenge to a little fight in advance of the big one. Better far would it be for them to accept the challenge and suffer some defeat, more or less, than to allow the country to get the impression that the convention is to prove an affair of words only, and not of deeds. We therefore expect that there will be no shirking but that they will premptly accept the challenge and face the music. Should this anticipation be realized, the little provincial campaign of 1882 will be no unimportant affair after all.

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
