This investigation discloses a claim, from actual experience, that where "producer gas," or the primary product of coal combustion, can be utilized, the secondary or ighter gas is a by-product, costing nothing. This is stated as the result of the use of the Loomis process at the Disston works in Tacony.

There the general manager claims to have made 130,000 cubic feet of producer gas and general manager claims to have 45,000 of the other gas from a ton of slack. The producer gas, if used while heated, will do as much work in iron and steel manufacture as the whole product by other processes, leaving the other gas as a surplus for domestic consumption. 
