Public School Inspector's Report.

Extract from the report of Inspector MacDougall: "In view of the fact that the lowest room has 48 pupils on the roll, it will be impossible to admit new pupils after Easter without making a general promotion from one room to the other throughout the school. This would result in a serious discrement of the throughout the school. This would result in a serious disarrangement of the work and classification of the entire school. Such a disturbance, in the existing order of things, would mean great inconvenience and increase of work for the teachers as well as much loss to the pupils. The loss to the school in general by such a move would be far greater than the gain which would accure to the 15 or the gain which would accrue to the 15 or 20 beginners during the short time be-tween Easter and midsummer. As a rule pupils start to school too young, and I do not think any of those who may have in-tended starting after Easter would suffer any injury or injustice by remaining at home until after the midsummer vaca-tion. I would therefore recommend that the Board request parents not to send be-ginners until September."

ernment to take part in an international conference. That invitation is, in turn, the result of a proposal approved by an international congress of chambers of commerce sitting in London.

The proposals of the calendar reformers are that the first day of the year shall be a bank holiday, called "New Year's Day," which shall not count with a day of the week, of the month, or of the quarter. This leaves for the rest of the year 364 days. This number divides exactly into four equal quarters of ninety-one days each, and into fifty-two weeks of seven days each. Each quarter would thus contain exactly thirteen weeks. According to the proposed scheme it would be divided into two months of thirty days each and one month of thirty one days.

Starting then with the year 1912, Easter Sunday, and all so-called moveable fasts, feasts, and dates dependent upon it, would be fixed so as to fall in every year on the same day of the same month, as well as on the same day of the week. April 14 would then and always be Easter Sunday, and Christmas day, Decem-25, would always fall on Monday Each day of the month also would always fall on the same day of the

To provide for leap year, a bank holiday to be called "Leap Year Day" would in leap year be inserted between July 31 and July 2. As in count as a day of the week, of the month, or of the quarter.

Poultry Pointers.

When the fowls are well cared for they represent a daily income. Pullets and hens will lay just as well without the attention of a male bird as with one. Keep your feed room clean and do not permit any filth to lay around that will taint the feed. Air-slacked lime is a good disinfectant and will help keep the flock healthy if scattered around the houses and yards occasionally. The dropping boards should be made solid and smooth so as not to permit the droppings to fall on the chicken house floor and to make the dropping board easy to clean. An egg contains 65 per cent. water. In the laying pens the water should be furnished in plenty. Just carefully look over your birds; you may find some lice on them, even if it is cold weather. To get the best results from poultry they must be free from lice the whole year, and it pays to fight lice the whole year.



A Word to Housekeepers.

Housekeepers should guard the well during the spring season. When the break up comes and the snow melts, care should be taken that none of this surface water containing the winter accumulation of dirt and filth gets into the well. If the top of the well is higher than the surrounding ground, and the water runs away from the well and not towards it there will be little contamination from this source. But if the well is not properly guarded in this respect and the surface water flows toward the well it will find its way into it and to pollute the well to the extent it is polluted. Then there is also the danger of having the well polluted by filth that may have accumulated on the surface, and as the frost goes out perculates through the soil to the well. To guard against this, all filth and dirt in reaching distance of the well should be moved ere the frost goes out. One cannot be too careful about these little things. Impure water is a menace to the health of the family, and anything that endangers health is of sufficient importance to merit first attention.


