BALANCE OF TRADE WITH U. S. STILL AGAINST CANADA

Ottawa.—Canada is still importing more from the U. S. than she is exporting to that country and still exporting more to Great Britain than she is importing thence, according to the latest trade returns published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. These figures cover the twelve months ending with April.

During that period Canada imported from the United Kingdom goods valued at \$111,375,000 and exported goods valued at \$294,555,000 to that market, while imports from the United States were \$507,406,000 as compared with exports of \$286,430,000.

As the total foreign trade has been falling rapidly, there is a falling off in all these items, but the export trade to Great Britain is holding up much better than exports to the United States or than imports from either country.

The decline in the exports to the United Kingdom for the twelve months period ending April, as compared with the figure for the year ended with April, 1921, was only about eighteen million dollars, while Canadian exports to the United States fell off more than \$25,000,000 for the same period.

In imports the falling off from the United Kingdom was a little less than one hundred million, while from the United States the decline was more than three hundred million.

AUSTRALIAN TRADE

Canadian trade with Australia continues to show a heavy balance of exports. The exports to Australia for the twelve months ended April, 1921, were exceptionally heavy, being eighteen millions compared with eleven millions for the corresponding period to April, 1920, and ten millions for the twelve months ended with April just passed. Our imports from Australia for the year ended with last month were \$1,175,000 as compared with \$820,000 for the previous year, and \$1,343,000 for the year ending April, 1920.

HOW TO SECURE TOURISTS

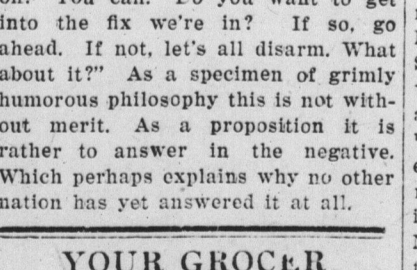
At the joint meeting of representatives of the St. John and Halifax Board of Trade held in Halifax, G. E. Barbour, St. John, led the discussion on the promotion of tourist travel, and the following resolution was passed:

"In the opinion of this conference there is no section of this continent that possesses a more interesting history, or that contains more alluring tourist attractions, more fascinating scenery, more sporting possibilities, and greater opportunity for pleasurable and healthful summer vacations than the Maritime Provinces section of Canada, and that in order that these attractions and advantages should be utilized to the fullest possible extent, the respective Provinces, through their governments and transportation and commercial organizations, be urged to co-operate together along such lines as uniformity of traffic rules, betterment of highway systems, arranging of special tourist routes and the advertising of same, the supplying of road maps, the providing of summer excursion rates, and by appealing to former residents of the Maritime Provinces to spend their vacations in their old homeland."

ANOTHER RUSSIAN OBJECT LESSON

Disarmament proposals from Russia came as a shock to the Geneva conference. Yet from what other source could they have so logically come? The Bolsheviks have the largest standing army and the most completely bankrupt government in the world. They can and do set themselves up as a horrible example which they cheerfully invite other nations not to follow. Though the government has practically no available funds, it successfully maintains a million or more men under arms through levying taxes "sin kind"; that is, accepting food, clothing, and supplies in payment. This it can continue indefinitely. In effect the Russian proponents say to the rest of Europe: "So long as you maintain your armies we have to maintain ours. We're broke. You'll be the same pretty soon if you keep up your military establishment. We can't be worse off. You can. Do you want to get into the fix we're in? If so, go ahead. If not, let's all disarm. What about it?" As a specimen of grimly humorous philosophy this is not without merit. As a proposition it is rather to answer in the negative. Which perhaps explains why no other nation has yet answered it at all.

ANOTHER VICTORY FOR BRIDGETOWN

Defeat Lawrencetown Six to Three In Well Played Game—Nobody Got a Walk.

Bridgetown baseball team added another to their thus far unbroken list of victories this season when they defeated Lawrencetown here on Wednesday afternoon by a score of 6 to 3. Harry Donaghy was heavier for the first four innings for Bridgetown and pitched good ball, only two hits being made off him, but the support given was not always of the best and the entire five errors against the team were made while he was on the mound.

Malcolm went into the box in the fifth, and after his advent better work was done both in infield and outfield. He has, at time of writing, pitched twenty-six innings in games with the different visiting teams no member of which have made a run while he was in the box.

The Lawrencetown boys put up a good contest and the credit of being the very best class of sports is theirs. Messenger pitched a good game, striking out ten men, but was hit pretty heavily at intervals. His support in the field was good, and the visiting team played errorless ball and created in every way a most excellent impression among the fans. Bridgetown, in the innings during which they scored got their hits well placed and timely. All the scoring was done in the first, fifth and seventh innings. H. T. McKenzie was umpire at the plate and J. B. Jefferson on bases. The decisions of both gentlemen were well received, and there was an entire absence of wrangling. None of the players walked any men.

THE LONG VOYAGE OF A BOTTLE

On the trip north from Demerara to St. John, over two years ago, in the S. S. Chaleur, of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's line of steamers, Dr. M. P. Harrington of Bridgewater, N. S., was a passenger. He wrote a note and placed it in a three-half pint glass bottle which he corked and threw overboard. The following was written in the note: "On board S. S. Chaleur, on voyage Demerara to St. John, N. B., Sunday noon, April 11th, 1920, latitude 39.03 N., longitude 65.29 W., 391 miles to St. John, making nine miles an hour, wind north-east, a full cargo of sugar and molasses and a full passenger list, not much sea sickness on board, everything going well and expect to reach destination on Tuesday 13th inst., M. P. Harrington, Bridgewater, Nova Scotia. Will the one who finds this bottle please communicate with the above address. On Thursday, June 1st, he received a letter post-marked Bahamas, 25th May, 1922, with the note he endorsed in the bottle, and written on the same note were these remarks, 'picked up at Castle Island; Light Station, 3.15 p.m., 13th May, 1922. M. Sawyer, Light Keeper.—Progress-Enterprise."

COSTLY OCEAN TRAVEL

Passenger accommodation on many Atlantic steamers is already sold out for the summer. In Europe an increasing number of 500,000 tourists from this side of the water is expected.

The number would be much greater but for the inordinately high cost of steamship travel, which is prohibitive for many people of moderate means. Says one English Journal:

"Nothing like the number of school teachers or junior professors or instructors who used to come over here before the war will be with us again this summer—a fact which is deplorable, because the tourists of that class, with a restricted purse, came always to study rather than to search for amusement, and they carried back impressions which were a greater contribution to the knowledge in America of things worth while on this side."

The United States Shipping Board is trying to provide a remedy on a small scale by adapting five of its vessels to increased passenger traffic, so as to bring first-class fares between New York and London down to a basic rate of \$120. Many thousands who before the war could afford an occasional trip to Europe must think regretfully of the days when they could travel on a one class boat for \$45 to \$60.

THE LAME MOUSE HELD UP LONDON TRAFFIC

A sudden pulling-up of the traffic in Holborn—near the Holborn Empire—puzzled omnibus passengers recently.

The road was apparently quite clear, and there was no sign of a policeman with uplifted hand. An Evening News representative, who was nearly thrown off an omnibus top by the sudden stop, followed the gaze of two messenger boys and the driver of a van.

The road was not quite clear. In front of the traffic, making its way home at poor speed, and with difficulty, was a lame mouse.

PENALTIES FOR CARELESS CAMPERS

The newly amended forest fire laws of New Brunswick require that all campers building camp fires shall remove all combustible material at least five feet away before kindling their fires and always totally extinguish the fire before leaving it. For failing to extinguish camp, cooking or other fires, fines are provided up to \$200, and also nine months in jail. For throwing away lighted tobacco or matches fines are provided to a maximum of \$50.

SALVATION ARMY MAX RESUME WORK HERE

Capt. Friend and Mrs. Friend, of the Salvation Army, Yarmouth, have completed a canvass of the town in the interests of the Army Self Denial Fund. The amount secured this year locally was only about half that raised last year but this is attributed to pre-organization work not being quite so strong this year. There is a probability that this autumn the Army will resume work in Bridgetown and during his visit Capt. Friend was looking into the question of securing a suitable hall for services.

TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC AT BRIDGETOWN

A member of the staff of the Nova Scotia Sanatorium will attend at the County Health Clinic, Bridgetown, Friday, June 30th, at two o'clock, p.m., to examine any patients who may be referred by physicians wishing expert assistance in respect to the diagnosis and treatment of possible cases of tuberculosis.

It is hoped that the physicians of Annapolis County will take full advantage of this opportunity.

OBITUARY

He had been in ill health for years, but his sufferings were borne with Christian fortitude, and being ambitious, he kept at his daily tasks as far as possible, till laid aside from the activities of life by the infirmities of old age about two years ago; then much of his time was spent in meditation and prayer, and many and beautiful were the subjects of his discourses, as: "I am the Way and the Life", "Trust in the Lord", "In my Father's House are Many Mansions", "I go to Prepare a Place for you", etc., "Seek Ye First the Kingdom of God and all these things shall be added unto you", and many other selections from the Book of Life. His companionship and association were edifying, instructive and elevating in nature and character.

A man of exceptionally good intellect, and possessing a wonderful memory it was a pleasure to converse with him on any subject, and he was interested in the affairs of life till the end.


He was twice married. By the first wife, Miss Lydia Christopher, of Brookfield, Queens County, N. S., he had three sons. The second wife, Miss Lavina Cropley, of Nictaux, N. S., survives him, and resides with her daughter, Minnie (Mrs. Oakes). The other children of this union are Cora (Mrs. Deal); Cress L. Lunenburg Cor; Harry, West Brooklyn, and Johnson, of Centrelea. Besides these to mourn the loss of a most indulgent parent are several grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Mr. Bruce united with the Baptist Church at the time of the "Reformation," conducted by Rev. Willard Parker, and lived a consistent Christian life, his daily walk in life being an example to those who knew him. Services were conducted by Rev. A. H. Whitman, who preached from the text, "Be Ye Also Ready," etc. The hymns were: "Nearer My God to Thee", "Abide With Me", and "Where He Leads Me I Will Follow", favorites with the deceased. The floral tributes were beautiful. The remains were interred at the beautiful Pine Grove Cemetery, Middleton, N. S., there to await the Great Resurrection Morn, when the dead in Christ shall awake to receive their coming Lord and Savior.

"Departed but not forgotten." The memory of the deceased, a true Christian, a devoted husband and father, a loyal brother and staunch friend, a man having the qualities of true greatness, simplicity and unselfishness, shall live always with those who survive him.


