Completion of the Preliminary Investigation. Refore Inspector Dowling, J.P.

Oxarart Committed for Trial at the next term of the District Court. He Gives Bail to the Extent of \$4,000. The investigation of the charge preferred against Michael Oxarart and Chas. Thebo, by sub-Collector of Customs W. Bannerman for stealing 45 horses, which began on the

22nd September and which was adjourned. until the other day, was concluded Friday last before Inspector Dowling J.P. John D Lowder was examined. evidence was to the effect that he bought from Mr. Oxarart 78 head of horses and there were 8 colts thrown in. On the bargain he was to give \$45 per head, \$500 cash paid down at the time. He afterwards took in Jack Sparrow as a partner. The horses were delivered by Oxarart and taken up to the former's rauche to be branded. After the branding they were turned loose. He ascertained after a few weeks that there were more horses than his in the brand, but he did not know how they got there. The horses were driven out to Goost River and kept there for a time. He branded them D. L. This is the same brand as the D. minion Lands brand and he thought that

horses. He did not know where they were and he did not claim them. William Bannerman, Sub-Collector of

the extra horses might be Dominion Lands

Customs at Calgary was the next : He stated that he seized 268 horses on the 16th of June last and released them on the 28th June, and he re-seized them on the 29th June and released them again on the 7th July. Ot these 268 Oxarart claimed 133, the balance belonged to Mr. Davis, of Fort McLeod. The release of the 7th July was under orders from Collector of Customs Mingaye, at Winnipeg. The 45 horses met. tioned were stolen on or about the 7th July before being released. The horses were in possession of a man named Nutting, Pres. Bradford, J. Sparrow and "three fingered Jack." Witness engage! Nutting an ! Nutting engaged the other man. Witness approved of these men. As soon as his suspicion was aroused regarding the horses stolen, three fingered Jack, Bradford and Sparrow left the country. Witness does not know where they are. He does not know anything about Oxarart and Thebo taking the horses or being implicated in taking them. Sixteen different persons had dealings with the horses but he refused to tell their names. He said he saw Sparrow after the warrants had been issued, but he did not arrest him. He paid Sparrow and Brad-

A number of witnesses were examined and they testified as to having bought horses

Agustus Carney, testified : He went to the Mount Royal Ranche and found 104 head of horses and 13 colts. He ran them through the shoot and examined their brands. He stated what Major Baynes told him, but the Court said it was not evidence. He admitted that Major Baynes had told G. C. KING & COMPANY him certain matters in confidence and that the witness had afterwards violated this confidence. He gave his word of honor that he would not disclose the information but he afterwards disclosed it to Mr. Bannerman. He did not know the Oxarart horses. Charles Godds Lauder helped to brand the horses. He acknow ledged that Collector Cotton had seen him before he seized on that date, and had shown him the entry he had made and had assured him that everything was straight and

He referred to the entry made with Capt. Cotton, then after hearing Capt. Cotton's explanation and seeing the sworn entry witness did not believe that the entry had been properly made, he believed that the affidavit that Oxarart had previously made was the correct one, although he explained the mistake in making it.

Mr. Peterson asked the witness if the entry made with Capt. Cotton that was shown to witness was a forgery. Witness said he had nothing to say about it, but he had

On the magi-trate summing up he stated that he had made up his mind to commit the pri-oners for trial. He informed the counsels before they had gone into argument that he intended to commit but that they could go on with their argument if they liked. 

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
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
