





Russians Deny Twenty-Nine Thou sand Prisoners Were Captured of Late.

3.20 a.m.—The Russian headquarters staff, in a statement referring to a recent Austrian official statement, declare that the Austrians' assertions that they captured 29,000 Russian prisoners are not true. As an example the headquarters' staff cites the Austrian claim that they captured 12,000 Russians during the retreat in Bukowina. This number, it is stated, exceeds the total number of Russians engaged on this front, and the actual Russian losses were seven officers and 1,000 soldiers killed, wounded and missing.







The following is the text of the reply of Great Britain to the American note as handed to Walter H. Page, the American ambassador, today:

"The memorandum, communicated on the 11th of February calls attention in courteous and friendly terms to the action of the captain of the British steamship Lusitania is raising the flag of the United States of America when approaching British waters and says that the government of the United States feels a certain anxiety in considering the possibility of any general use of the flag of the United States by British vessels traversing those wagters since the effect of such a policy might be to bring about a menace to the lives and vessels of United States citizens.

Raised U.S. Flag Owing to Threat "It was understood that the German Government announced their intention of sinking British merchant vessels at sight by torpedoes, without giving any opportunity of making any provision for the saving of lives of non-combatants, crews and passengers. It was in consequence of this threat that the Lusitania raised the United States flag on her inward voyage.

"On her subsequent quiward voyage a request was made by United States flag should be hoisted presumably to ensure their safety. Meanwhile the memofrom your excellency had been received. His majesty's government did not give any advice to the company as to how to meet this request and it understood that the Lusitania left Liverpool under the British flag.

"It seems unnecessary to say more as regards the Lusitania in particular.



BIG EXPENDITURES LAURIER LEGACIES

Railway and Other Obligations Involve Outlay of Many Millions.

TO HOLD SESSIONS

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—In view of criticism that is being made, of the expenditures of the government since it came into power in 1911, it is felt that it is only justice to the government to make clear that a very large part of these expenditures have been made on works that were undertaken by the latgovernment. For the last four years these expenditures include the following amounts: National Transcontinental Railway, \$56,000,000: Hudson Bay Railway, \$5000,000: Quebec bridge, \$10,000,000, making a total of \$75,000,000.

Moreover, as a result of the implementing clause in the G.T.P. contract,

the finance minister has had to pay \$5,000,000, besides spending \$33,000,000 on G.T.P. guaranteed debentures, and afterwards lending the G.T.P. \$15,000,000. For these various purposes, legacies of the late government, the minister of finance has had to find a total of \$178,000,000. And as the large works referred to are unfinished, the government will still have to spend considerable sums on them at a time when there are other heavy demands on the finances of the country.


