Improved Labor Conditions the First Necessity on the Farm.

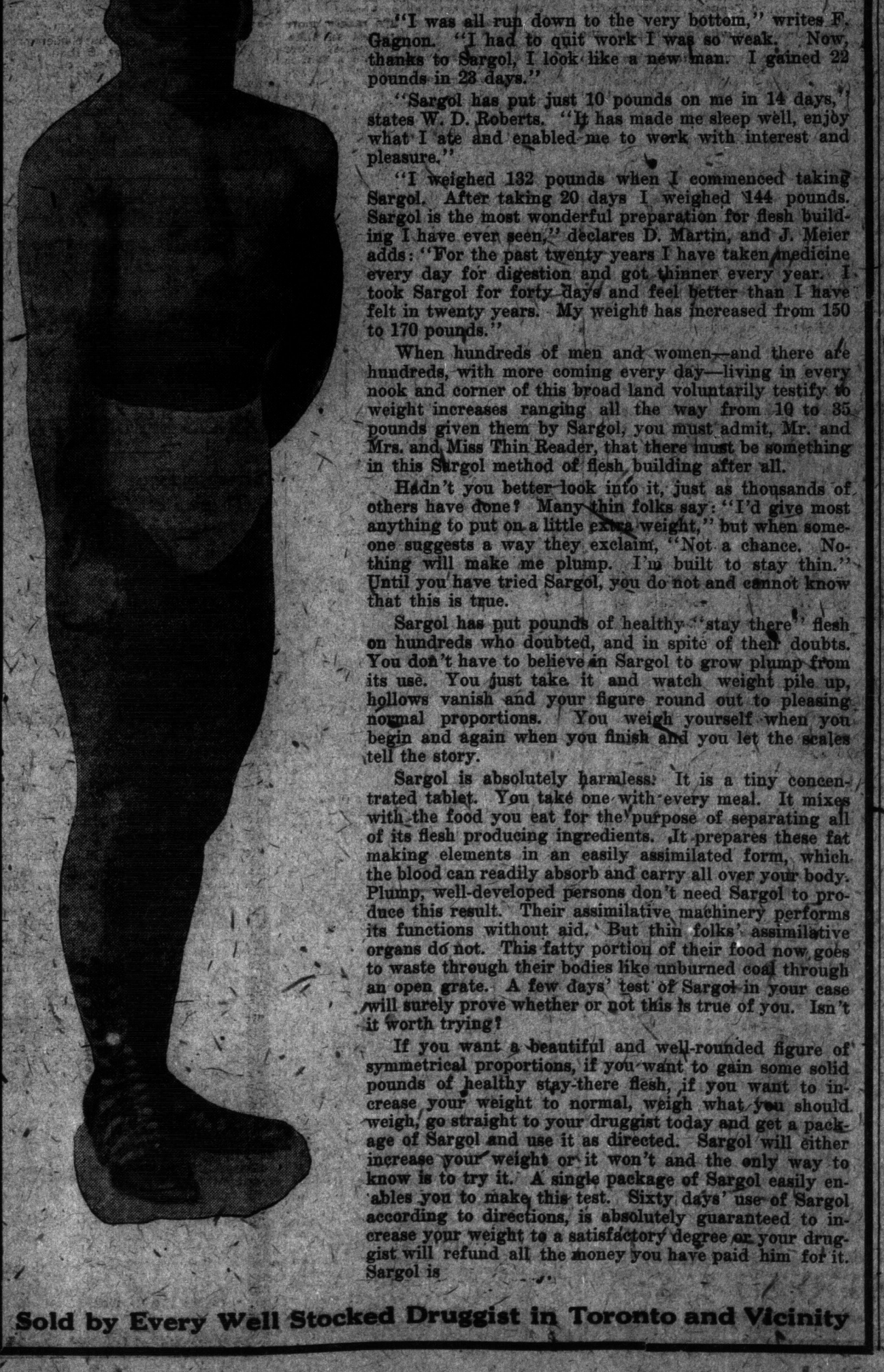

New Type of Car Will Operate on Glen Road.

EVERY TEN MINUTES

Route Commences at South Drive and Ends at Summerhill Avenue.

The new means of travel in Toronto takes the form of a semi-motor bus. It has a capacity of five passengers. The fare is five cents, and, by purchasing tickets six may be obtained for a quarter.

The first route upon which the jitneys will operate will comprise a section of Rosedale. Glen road will be traversed at regular intervals. South Drive will be the city end of the trip, and Summerhill avenue the furthest point.

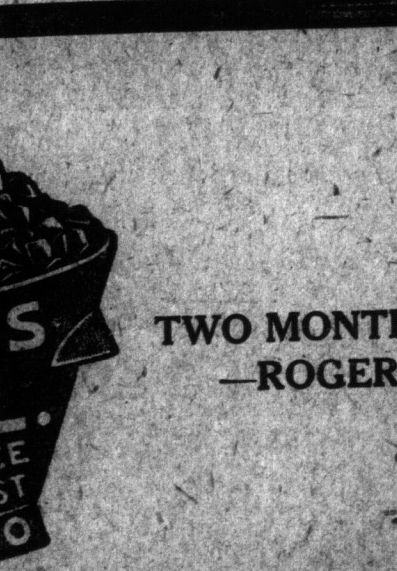

WORKS ESTIMATES SOMEWHAT REDUCED

Nearly Third Taken Off Figures at First Submitted.

CLEANING SNOW COSTS

Reduction Made, But Commissioner Says He Will Require More Yet.

The works department estimates received quite a shock yesterday when about one-third of the total amount was deducted by the committee. The total was \$3,384,081, and the reduction \$1,090,775. Of this amount \$105,775 was taken off the maintenance accounts and \$985,000 off capital expenditure. The amount required for hydrants and valves was reduced \$11,500; reconstruction of pavements still under guarantee by \$20,214. A permanent chlorinating building, to cost \$15,000, will not be built, the item being struck out of the capital expenditure. The following items were killed: New bridge on Spadina road, \$40,000; bridge on St. Clair avenue east, \$345,000; high pressure fire system extension, \$500,000, and the remodeling of St. Andrew's market, \$100,000. The estimates of this department have yet to come before the board of control, and it is more than probable that they will be subject to further pruning.

Street Cleaning Cost. The estimates of Commissioner Wilson of the street cleaning department came before the committee yesterday afternoon when \$21,597 was taken from the total of \$1,438,656. The most interesting item in these estimates is that for snow cleaning. To date it has cost the city \$41,700 for this work and it is not done yet.

Water in Abundance. The 54-inch conduit across the Island connecting with the tunnel across the bay has been completed and is being put in, so that Toronto is now sure of an unlimited supply of water from the lake. The new intake has a capacity of 65,000,000 gallons making a total of 150,000,000.

Chief Thompson's estimates for the fire department this year are \$492,231, against \$475,000 last year. The increase is due to the raising of salaries. A permit has been issued for the erection of a 325,000 office building on the east side of Yonge street, near Isabella. R. C. Bustard is the builder.

U.S. HAS GRIEVANCE OPINION OF FRANCE

German Note Termed Simply Refusal to Comply With Protests.

PARIS, Feb. 19, 5:55 p.m.—All the evening papers devoted considerable space to the German reply to the American note concerning neutral shipping in the war zone created by the German proclamation on Jan. 17. The semi-official Temps in a leading article says that Germany is making a supreme effort to avoid the consequences of an inevitable food shortage, and that whatever be the extenuating circumstances and judicial appearances by which Germany surrounds its pretensions, the United States can only refuse to bow before methods of war menacing to the neutral countries. The United States, continues the Temps, certainly will not lend itself to the plans of the Germans, who want to use them against England and her allies in order to prolong the contest for universal domination.

The Conservative Republican Journal des Debates concludes that the reply is simply a refusal to comply with the protests of the Washington cabinet. "This is reported to have caused in the United States disappointment and indignation," says the paper. "The first surprise is because nothing else could be expected from Germany, and the second is natural and justified."

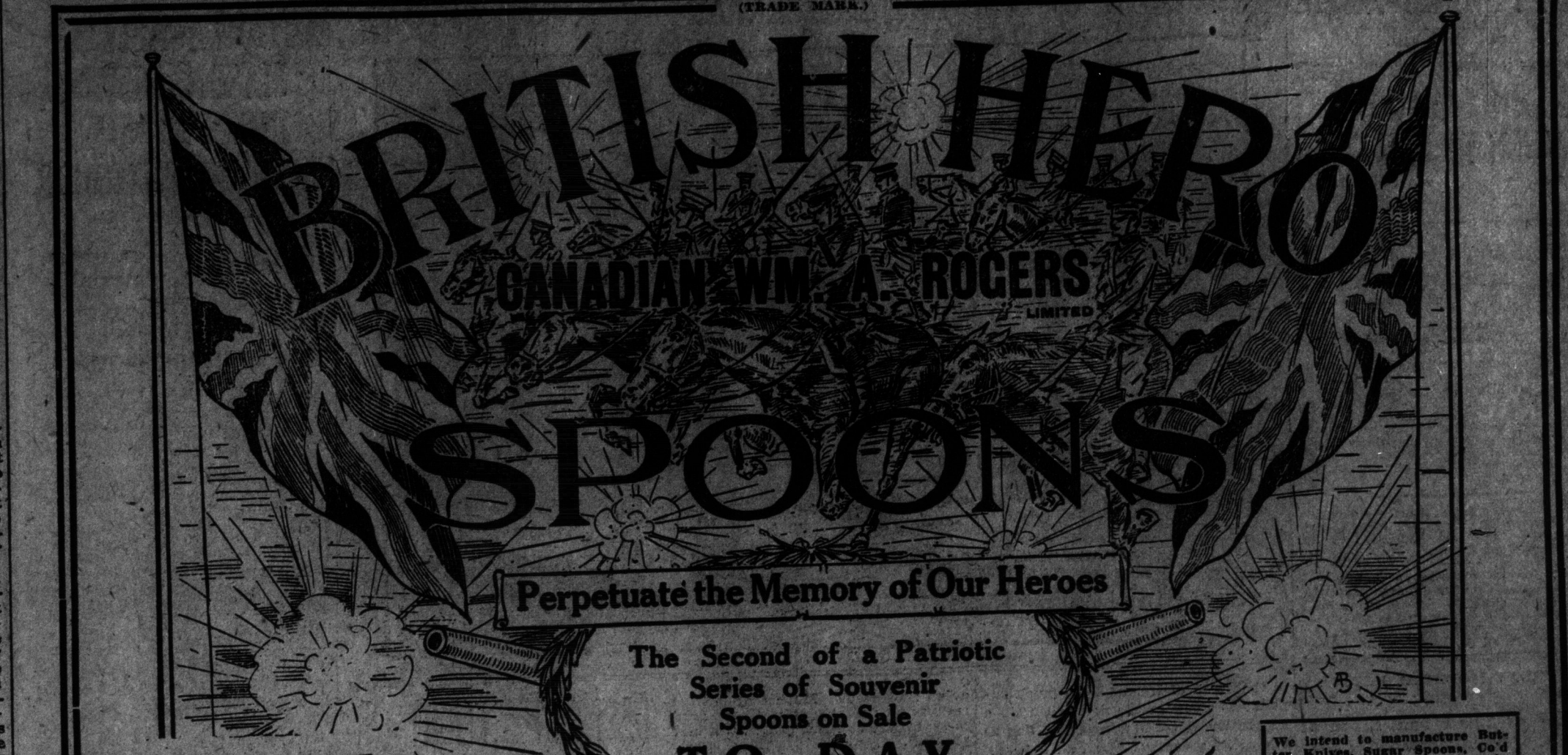
SHOE CONTRACT PROBE TO START NEXT WEEK

Parliamentary Committee Organizes for Inquiry With W. S. Middlebro Chairman.

OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—The parliamentary committee to investigate the army boot scandal organized today by W. S. Middlebro being appointed chairman, on the suggestion of Sir James Aikins, who is to conduct the chief examination of witnesses. The hearing of evidence is called upon to prepare a list, giving the names of boot contractors, quantities delivered; when and where and by whom inspected; quantities accepted without inspection and why; forms of contract and correspondence relating thereto; number of rejected names of contractors who furnished rejected footwear.

Both Chairman Middlebro and Sir James Aikins announced that the committee would get at the truth and place the blame where it belonged, no matter who was affected by the decision. The inquiry promised will be prompt and thorough.

BELIEVE SOURCE LIES IN BAKERY

Outbreak of Spinal Meningitis May Have Originated Where Bread is Made.

SUPPLIES FROM OUTSIDE

No More Baking Until Matter is Fully Investigated by Officials.

While nothing definite has been ascertained there is good reason to believe that the source of the outbreak of spinal meningitis has been discovered in the field bakery. Operations in the department have been suspended and the bread supply for the camp is being obtained from outside sources. How long it will be necessary to do this is not certain, but the men are being kept under close supervision.

Owing to the seriousness of the outbreak night operations have been abandoned. Seven cases have now been reported, one of which has proved fatal. Privates Benjamin Matheson, No. 2 Company of the 19th Battalion, being the first to die from the disease. The funeral will be held privately from his home at 26 Vermont avenue this afternoon. It will be attended by two platoons from No. 2 Company of the 16th, to which he belonged. Six of the soldiers will act as pall-bearers. Rev. W. L. H. Rowland of Avenue Road Presbyterian Church will officiate. Interment will be made at Prospect Cemetery.

Others Doing Well.
It was reported late yesterday afternoon that all the other cases are progressing as favorably as can be expected. Lieut.-Col. J. T. Fotheringham paid a visit to the General Hospital where he found the condition of the men satisfactory. Two more detachments have been placed in the isolation camp on Strachan avenue as a result of the two additional cases discovered.

Trench Digging.
During next week the troops will be given instructions in trench-digging. The men will be taken in companies, each taking half an hour. Fire trenches and all the other types will be tried out under the direction of officers on thearrison common.

Major F. C. McCordick, now with the 19th Battalion, has been recommended to command an infantry battalion of the third contingent. His appointment is being considered by the militia department at Ottawa.

Former Man Killed.
Private Robert McDonald of the Scots Guards adds to the list of Toronto men who have been killed in action. The news was received by his brother at 678 Lansdowne avenue. He was a reservist and rejoined his regiment at the outbreak of the war. He was killed in action on December 18. Target practice for the artillery will commence at 10 o'clock this morning.

WHOLESALE DRUGGISTS PROTEST AGAINST TAX

Will Wait on Finance Minister on Monday to Ask Consideration.

MONTREAL, Feb. 19.—Deputations representing the wholesale drug trade and the patent medicine dealers of Montreal, as well as of Toronto and other cities, will wait on the minister of finance at Ottawa on Monday to enter a protest against the war tax on patent medicines. The druggists claim that in the new war tax they are being called upon to bear more than their fair share of the extra revenue to be raised.

BIG EXPENDITURES LAURIER LEGACIES

Railway and Other Obligations Involve Outlay of Many Millions.

By a Staff Reporter.
OTTAWA, Feb. 19.—In view of criticism that is being made, of the expenditures of the government since it came into power in 1911, it is felt that it is only justice to the government to make clear that a very large part of these expenditures have been made on works that were undertaken by the late government. For the last four years these expenditures include the following amounts: National Transcontinental Railway, \$55,000,000; Hudson Bay Railway, \$9,000,000; Quebec bridge, \$10,000,000, making a total of \$75,000,000.

G.T.P. Obligations.
Moreover, as a result of the implementing clause in the G.T.P. contract,

the finance minister has had to pay \$5,000,000, besides spending \$35,000,000 on G.T.P. guaranteed debentures, and afterwards lending the G.T.P. \$15,000,000. For these various purposes, legacies of the late government, the minister of finance has had to find a total of \$178,000,000. And as the large works referred to are unfinished, the government will still have to spend considerable sums on them at a time when there are other heavy demands on the finances of the country.

RUSSIANS RETIRED IN SPLENDID ORDER

Retreat From Southern Bukovina Effected With Comparatively Little Loss. BRIDGES DESTROYED Great Obstacles Placed in Way of Withdrawing Columns by Enemy.

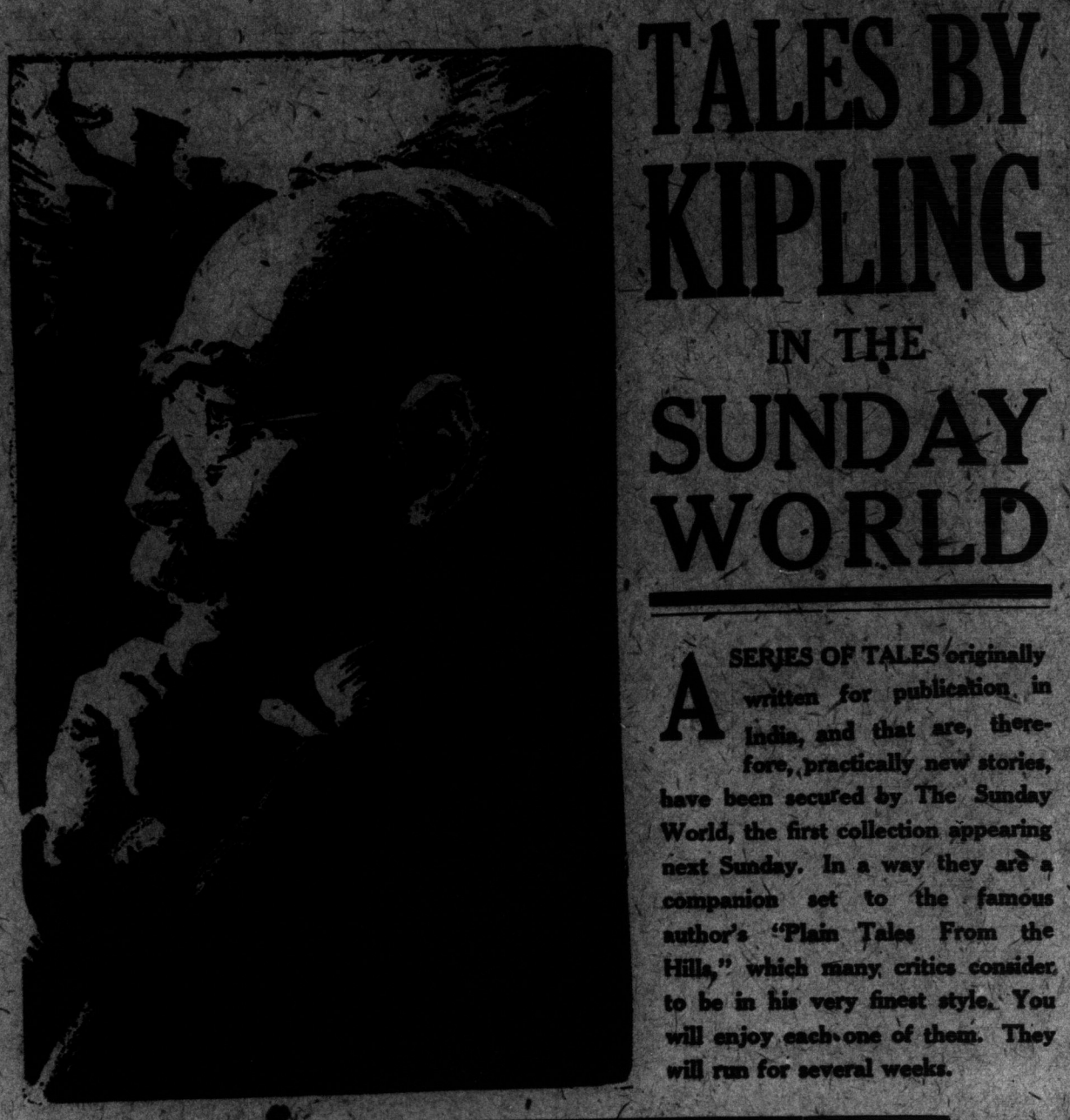

MARMORITZA, Roumania, Wednesday, Feb. 17.—I spent yesterday in Czernowitz, where I received from a high officer of the Russian general staff details and photographs of the Russian withdrawal from southern Bukovina, which forms one of the most thrilling episodes in military history.

The Russian officers acknowledged that they were under a great deal of pressure to withdraw from the district through which the Austro-German forces were advancing. One detachment of Russian husars was caught in a narrow ledge between a precipitous and a mountain side. They refused to surrender and managed to escape, losing 15 men. There had been killed across many defiles in the mountains and enormous difficulties were created, but all these were overcome.
