INDUSTRY BARRICADES DECLARED BY JEROME

Into the Insurance Scandal... One Feature of Sensational Day—Mutual Life Revelations More Shocking Than Equitable, Says Atcurdy—Two Members of McCurdy Family Draw \$2,600,000 in Commissions.

New York, Oct. 5.—That the astounding sum of \$2,600,000 has been paid as commission by the Mutual Life Insurance Company to two members of the family of Richard A. McCurdy, president of the company, and the prominent District Attorney Jerome, that the insurance scandals certainly will be submitted later to an extraordinary grand jury were the sensational developments in the insurance situation today.

It was brought out by testimony before the legislative investigation committee that Robert H. McCurdy, son of Richard A. McCurdy, has received an aggregate of \$920,113 in commissions from the company. Robert H. McCurdy said he expected his income this year would be about \$10,000.

Previous to this testimony W. P. Hamme, an attorney of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, testified that he had paid to the chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee \$200 in cash as a campaign contribution.

Mr. Jerome, in announcing in court that the scandals will be submitted to an extraordinary grand jury, said the inquiry by the legislative committee has shown "greater moral obliquity and persons important in the business world than did the shocking wrongs in regard to the Equitable Life."

In response to a letter of inquiry from a member of the bar, the chairman of the legislative insurance investigating committee, wrote to-day that "We intend to devote some time to fraternal insurance before we finish our labors."

Hyde Gets No Favor. Another incident of the day's developments was the publication of a letter from Chas. E. Hughes, counsel to the legislative committee to Samuel Untermyer, counsel for James J. Hyde, the former controller of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, in which Mr. Hughes said the committee would make no discrimination as to whether the franchise should be granted only for limited periods, on terms most advantageous to the public.

Why It Was Given. Witnesses had suggested by the danger of a Democratic house, that would result in tariff and other legislation, and to upset business and affect policyholders. He said other companies had not known how many did so. Mr. Thummel denied paying money to influence legislation.

SOME DEFECTS.

Perhaps, too, there is something never still in the reaction of the most ardent critics Premier Whitney has sustained here from the press of his own party. Unless these editors are disgruntled, and make their attacks from hidden motives, their freedom of speech is commendable—Toronto Star.

The Reporter has nothing to apologize for. In opposition to the government a divorce between the government and the corporations for less pandering to French-Canadian interests for a mere practical administration of our educational affairs, for the encouragement of the principles of public ownership, for the ownership of the liquor trade; for a reduction in the price of school books; for a more democratic hearing in official circles; for the conservation of the property of the people; and for the weeding out of the unworthy members of the civil service. On the whole the Whitney government has met public expectations. We are, we freely admit, done some things to its credit. The leader of the administration surely does not require a high standard of public control.

It is not going too far to say that the highest judgment yet passed on the Whitney administration have been in the editorial columns of newspapers that would accuse of being in sympathy with the Liberal party, such as the Toronto World, The Galt Reporter and The Western Canadian.

The Whitney administration is not likely to receive from the Liberal press the distinguished and-day-out, right-or-wrong course which The Mail and Empire pursues forever and ever, and in that style of journalism that wears all and convinces none.

The World repeats these two editorials from The Galt Reporter, not so much for what they say, as for the spirit they evince. We have taken the liberty of black lettering portions, but they show that the public conscience is working at last, and especially that in the Conservative party there will be plenty of speaking out in open meeting. That is what we admire. Half a dozen papers joining with The World in its crusade for government of the people are in sight: The Galt Reporter is one; The Weekly Sun is another; and there are others that the public can name. They will be a source of strength to Mr. Whitney—not a menace.

It may be, and we do not suspect, that some of the papers of the smaller towns are very sore on the competition that they have to encounter from cheap Toronto dailies, all of which are owned, published and distributed in the interests of corporations, and the political friends of the corporations, and sold for as low a price as six and five a year. There are two of this class in Toronto, and a third one of them is sent any place outside of Ontario for less than \$2.00 a year. They are all Cox papers.

It is all very well for this class of paper to hand out complimentary notices to the evening dailies in the smaller towns, but they find that those who are most complimentary of them, also push them out of business. Mr. Flavelle, for instance, is worthy of recognition for what he is doing in the way of improving the university, in the development of the hospital, and in other public works, but he is also worthy of the appreciation of Conservatives in his self-sacrifice, and in his willingness to help the cause of the Conservative party, and to strengthen Mr. Whitney's hands in an honest administration of the public affairs of Ontario, but he is also busy in his own business, and apparently also busy in helping on the great Cox syndicate, of which he is a section; and no wonder that papers which feel this competition also think they see in Mr. Flavelle the Conservative end of that combination that is now doing or Ross & Co. so advantageously in the smaller towns, but they find that those who are most complimentary of them, also push them out of business.

So in the light of the quotations above we beg to say that it is not quite equitable or quite good policy for the government, or for the leader of the party, to take any such course as to deal with the press, and to keep his weather-eye open for corporation agents and corporation jour- nals with glad hands and armfuls of compliments. And we take it that this is just what Mr. Whitney is doing. But it will never hurt him to remind him of it at times. And now is one of the times, according to The Reporter.

NO TRIAL; NO DISMISSAL WHITNEY TO PATRONAGE COMMITTEE OFFICIALS SAFE AWHAILE

Ontario Government Will Not Seek Evidence of Partisanship and It is Up to the Conservatives to Lay Charges Against Office-Holders.

Fifty or sixty of the active Conservative party of Toronto, to wit the patronage committee, met at the Parliament Buildings last night. Premier Whitney called it a "tea party," and the other conferees would hardly admit that there had been anything out of the ordinary run. Those who were notified by card to attend the gathering were regularly organized.

Also the conferees were one and all able to hold their information pretty close it nevertheless got out that there was a heart-to-heart talk on matters that lie to the heart of the working Whitties of the party in Toronto. Whitney was informed of the dissatisfaction over the retention in office of those who had been offensively active during the administration of the late government, and asked bluntly what he was going to do about it.

His answer melted the deputation and excretion was turned to blessing. The government has again come out victorious in a family scrap which threatened more dire results than could come from an encounter with avowed enemies. This was the answer, in so many words.

"Gentlemen, if you want the head of a government official it is up to you, the patronage committee, to show why. It is not the business of the government to run around looking for information against any member of the service. We are not here for that purpose. We have other matters of importance before us. We believe you are not here for that purpose."

Haven't Time to Advise Firemen on Building Inspection.

No official notice has been taken by the fire underwriters regarding the recommendation in the Worell inquest verdict that inspections made by insurance companies, resulting in the discovery of defects, should be reported to the fire department.

The verdict has caused considerable discussion, and while the underwriters feel that the city architect or some other official should know what defects exist they cannot do so at the time and expense of advising him.

The classification of defects, too, is a matter for argument. A building with up-to-date fire preventative gets a higher class rate than the old place. The events of the fire, the rate of insurance is made in the defects in the construction of the building. If a building is very bad a prohibitory rate of insurance is put upon it. The underwriters are trying to show that the rate of insurance is not a matter for the fire department to decide, but a matter for the insurance companies to decide.
