Pointers Made by the Lawyers in Appeal on Both Sides.

"CIRCUITOUS CONTRIVANCE.

How Plant Account Has Been Augmented by Reserve Fund

The Company's Bank Account and How It Claims the Reserve-The Repairs Fund Compounded-Where Surplus Profits Go-Consumers' Money Used-What is Lost by Putting the Reserve in Plant-Mr. C. Robinson, Q.C., on the The Gas Company's appeal against

Justice Ferguson's judgment in the celebrated Johnston case—which, it is claimed, has in view reducing the price of gas—having been heard, and as many citzens are specially interested, we now propose giving a few of the most important arguments advanced on the appeal by counsel on both sides, containing the company's position as presented by its own lawyers as well as the arguments against it from the other side.

The Court of Appeal for this case consisted of Mr. Justices Osler (presiding), Maclennan and Rose. The counsel engaged were; for the plaintiff, Messrs. Christopher Robinson, Q.C., retained by the city, and John Mac-Gregor, and for the company, Messrs. Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., S. H. Blake, Q.C. and W. N. Miller.

Q.C., and W. N. Miller.

The present dispute with the company is largely involved in the formation and investment of the Reserve Fund. The Act of 1887, allowing the company to increase the stock by \$1,-000,000, directed that the premiums derived from the new stock should, with other profits, be used to form this fund until it equalled 50 per cent. of the paid-up capital. It was further directed that this fund "may" be invested in municipal debentures, etc., but no permission is given to invest it in the company's business; nor on the other hand is there an express prohibition against so investing it, un-less the word "may" be construed as equivalent to "must," which is sometimes done. At present it should amount to \$850,000, as the paid-up capital is \$1,700,000.

Profits Not For Consumers.

After formation of the Reserve, the Repairs Fund, payment of dividends and irectors' fees, all net profits must be used to form the Special Surplus Account, to be applied to reduce the cost of gas—the Act providing that, whenever the amount of such "account" equals 5 cents per 1000 cubic feet on the quantity of gas sold during the preceding year, the price of gas for the then current year shall be reduced at least 5 cents per 1000 cubic feet to

all consumers.

The Reserve must be formed before the Special Surplus Account, and it was claimed, on behalf of the company, that sufficient had never been received to fully form this fund, and or

price of gas should be reduced, but given to the consumer or that he had any remedy if they were withheld or misapplied

Company Wants the Reserve.

They further argued that the provisions of the Act as to the formation and investment of the Reserve were permissive merely and not compulsory, and that full discretion was given to deal with the Reserve, and that the company had a perfect right to invest it in the business and plant; that it was not compelled to invest it in

Reserve in plant. It Claims the Money. It was further contended that by the original Act of incorporation the com-pany was given full discretion to deal as it pleased with all money received (excepting the dividends); that all money belonged to it; that the Act of 1887 merely confirmed the rights is already possessed and gave additional powers; that when money was deposited in the bank the company had a perfect right to check it out as it saw.

And that the company had a perfeet right to put premiums (including the Reserve) into the business and plant, and to charge 5 per cent. on it sums for depreciation—and in doing so the company had done nothing wrong, and that Judge Ferguson erred in holding this to be illegal-and that money in the business and plant was far more bene-ficial for the consumer than in de-

bentures. No Trust for Consumers It was also contended that the com-pany might borrow as much as it pleased, up to \$1,000,000, if it saw fit notwithstanding that by statute its borrowing power is limited to \$200,000 and that the value of plant was not limited, and 5 per cent, for repairs including that purchased with borrow-

And it was further argued that the original Act of incorporation defined investments and gave the company power to put capital in the plant and usiness, and it must pay dividends which cannot be invested in the business, but with all other money it may de







BY A TREMENDOUS MAJORITY In the Face of Lists Stuffed by

the Liberal Managers Who Had Been Working Tooth and Natl Charles a Majority of 822, Which in Reality Means a Gain of 800 Over Mr. McKeen's Majority - The Veteran's Fifteenth Electoral Victory-He is to

he Ranqueted at Halifax Refore Re-

turning in Triumph to Ottawa. Sydney, C.B., Feb. 4.-When Sir Charles Tupper's candidature for Cape Breton was announced, the Liberal leaders promised to make this not only the fight of his life," but also fight for his life," and they have kept their promise. To-day Sir Charles -Tupper made the greatest fight of his life and won his greatest triumph. His election by 800 majority in view of the tremendous forces arrayed against him, the desperate personal canvass made against him and the disadvan-tages under which he labored from the outset, as previously outlined in these despatches, would have been a great victory. His election by 800 in spite of these obstacles is an overwhelming triumph, and is equivalent under normal conditions and a fair contest to 1500 majority.

Grand Mira has not been heard from at the hour of telegraphing, but, assuming the vote to be the same as at the last election, the figures stand as follows: The total vote polled was 6786, of which 3791 were cast for Sir Charles Tupper and 2985 for Mr. Murray, giving Sir Charles a majority of 796.

Mr. Murray's stronsholds were Sydney Mr. Murray's stronsholds were Sydney. North Sydney and Sydney Mines. In these three towns there were 464 more voters than at the previous elections, mostly all put on by the Liberais. They expected 450 majority in these three places and got 320. In the als. They expected 450 majority in these three places and got 320. In the Glace Bay and Port Morien mining district 550 new names were added, the larger majority by Liberals, and the Liberals boasted that they were putting in some fine work there and they succeeded to the extent of 60 votes, for, in these districts, Sir Charles only got 261 majority, as compared with 321 for Mr. McKeen. Compared with the last election Mr. Murray made gains at Sydney, Leitche's Creek, Victoria, Little Bras d'Or, Hillside and Ball's Creek, making his total majorities 464 to-day, compared with 331 four years ago, or a net gain of 133. Whereas, by the same comparison with Mr. McKeen's vote, Sir Charles Tupper increased the Conservative majorities as follows: Louisburg 10, the north side of East Bay 55, Boisdale 18,Grand Narrows 45, Catalone 32, Bridgeport 78, and transferred Lingan from 32 for Mr. Murray into 41 majority for Sir Charles Tupper; Big Pond from 14 for Mr. Murray to 30 for Sir Charles, the south side of East Bay from 36 for Mr. Murray to 30 for Sir Charles, and Gabarus from 19 for Mr. Murray to 1 for Sir Charles, in all rolling up a majority of over 1200 votes. While the Conservative organization was not to be compared to the compact concrete body of men who directed the Liberal campaign, much praise is due to the energetic efforts of the Emmbers of the Dominion and Provincial Parliaments and such untiring workers as Colin Chisholm, ex-M.L.A., and A. G. Bertram.

The Majority is \$22.

Later—Complete returns give Sir Charles Tupper a majority of \$22 votes. No greater tribute could be paid to the personal popularity of any man and the domination of his powerful individuality, not only over his own party, but over the great mass of his countrymen, than was paid to Sir Charles Tupper, Baronet, to-day, by the people of Cape Breton County. The first time he has been in the county for 18 years, and the third time he ever was in the county, he came here less than a forfnight ago and placed himself in the hands of the people. He was under a great disadvantage from the outset. A man of 74 could not expose himself to all the rigors of a midwinter campaign like his opponent, who is in the prime of young manhood. Sir Charles could not see the great bulk of voters who live back from the railway, He was denounced from one end of the county to the other as a "stranger" and a "foreignet," and the strongest personal appeals were made to electors to vote for the "Cape Breton Boy," as against "the millionaire English Baronet."

Mr. Murray was the strongest and most personally popular man that the Liberals could nominate and the "non-resident" cry had a far more wide-reaching effect than the Conservative managers at first dreamed of. But the greatest obstacle to a Conservative sweep was the condition of the lists. Elections nowadays are won by the addition of new voters the year before the election is held. Lulled to sleep by their 750 majority of four years ago, the Conservatives did not evince one-tenth the interest in adding new voters to the list that the Liberals did and they claim that a large percentage of the names they handed to the revising officer are not on. Thus, of the 40 Conservative names said to have been sent to the revisor from Sydney Mines, not one of them is on the list, and this is only a sample of the indignant complaints that come from Conservative committees all over the county and which demand investigation.
