as it pleases, and that the reserve was a liability for the shareholder and not a trust for the consumer, and it was denied that the company had been guilty of any fraud but had acted honorably and in the best interests of the consumer.

Consumers Recovering Money. The consumer for the plaintiff Johnston answered the company's lawyers, and argued that it treated the whole dispute as a mere matter of bookkeeping; that it apparently assumed that the entries in the books were correct; that it was pleased with the money. Mr. Christopher Robinson stated that he knew very little about bookkeeping, but it convinced him that the wonderful results he would devote the rest of his life to mastering the science.

They also denied that the Attorney-General or the city should be a party to the present action, claiming that the present plaintiff could sue on behalf of all consumers. They asked that the statute of 1887 be construed as it had been just passed.

It was urged that as consumers were named as parties in that Act, they have such an interest in the profits of the business as to entitle them to an account against the company and this action seeks to recover money overpaid by consumers and to restrain the continuance of acts injurious to them.

It was also contended that the Gas Company was different from an ordinary trading corporation, and that it had obtained by its charter special privileges and advantages which—as such as the right to dig up public highways, stop traffic, commit acts of trespass over private property when laying mains through intervening property, together with a grant of what is practically a monopoly; and in consideration of these great privileges the company's dividends were limited to 10 per cent., and all other profits were to be applied for the benefit of the consumer.

It was further pointed out that the company claims the right to invest the profits to any amount in plans which belong to the shareholders—that this is merely another method of increasing the value of the stock—and that this was not the intention of the Legislature. The capital stock was to be invested in plant, but not the surplus profits. No greater profits should be made out of the consumer than would suffice to pay the 10 per cent. dividends, and this 10 per cent. limit prohibits sinking surplus profits in plant, for what shareholders are forbidden to take out of the company's profits is a bonus in the event of a sale or a "cleverness contrivance."

Why Money is Sunk in Plant. The sections of 407c were mentioned, empowering the company in case of a sale to the city to have the business valued as a going concern and at arbitration and allowing the shareholders to divide the purchase money in proportion to their shares.

And it was argued that the charter should be construed most strongly in favor of the consumer. When a corporation obtains rights which it would not have at common law, it ought not to be allowed any rights not given it by the Legislature, and if there is any doubt as to its powers it must apply to the Legislature. The Act of 1887, which was the result of a compromise between the company and the city, should be construed in favor of the consumer and all doubts decided against the company who drew and promoted it.

There was no dispute over that part of the Act allowing the stock to be increased by \$1,000,000. The dispute only involved those portions relating to the investment of the premiums and surplus profits.

How the Company Violates the Law. By that Act the company obtained three things in addition to the 10 per cent. dividend allowed by the original Act, viz., permission to form a Reserve equaling half the paid-up capital; to form a Repairs Fund by a yearly charge of 6 per cent. on the plant in use, and payment of \$9000 per year to the directors.

And two things were secured by the consumer—the formation of the Special Surplus Account to which all money, after providing for the payments just mentioned, is to be carried, and whenever it reaches a certain amount gas is to be reduced at an equal rate to each consumer; and the company's auditor to audit the company's books in the interest of the consumer.

Where the Consumer Loses. It was urged that Judge Ferguson was right in holding that the company's dealings with the premiums and surplus profits to be a violation of the statute. The Act provided that all surplus profits realized over the par value of the new \$1,000,000 stock should be added to the Reserve, and in the special case it was admitted that the Reserve was to exist when the Act was passed and amounted to \$384,000. Under the Act this fund was only to be drawn upon when net profits were sufficient to provide for the directors, Repairs Fund and pay directors' fees. It was urged that it was improper to invest it in plant, as it is impossible to draw upon plant, and the words in the statute, shall not be otherwise drawn upon, confined the use of this fund to the purposes mentioned in the Act; and as plant was not used for them, it is a violation of the Act to invest it in or draw upon it for plant.

It was also claimed that it was in the consumer's interest to invest the Reserve in debentures, and as to those already on hand, if the Special Surplus Account was ever to be formed, the Reserve must be in debentures. Prior to the Act was invested in mortgages, debentures, one of the words mentioned in the Act, and was kept separate from the other assets of the company. The premiums derived from the new stock were also to be invested in debentures and added to those already on hand. If the Special Surplus Account was ever to be formed, the Reserve must be in debentures. By not investing the Reserve in debentures, and if invested in plant there was not only a loss of the interest, but in addition the consumer had to pay 6 per cent. annually for repairs. The Reserve was a trust for the consumer, and should be invested for his benefit and not for the shareholders' benefit in plant. There the shareholder as a consumer and investor in debentures, there would have been a large amount already in the Special Surplus Account, largely reducing gas.

It was claimed that in a statute the word "invest" to be defined by the context and surrounding circumstances, and in this one it meant "must," and that the provision as to the investing in debentures was compulsory.

As to the Repairs Fund, it was argued that it should be formed out of earnings, and it was unlawful to use premiums for this purpose, and when there was a large surplus already in this fund, that a fraud had been practiced on the Legislature when the company obtained permission to charge 6 per cent. annually for repairs. It is ground that such a charge was not excessive, when in truth it was excessive, and the representation false. An annual charge of 6 per cent. is a large sum, and it is urged that this fund was intended only for usual and ordinary repairs of old plant, and should not be used for the purchase of new plant, and the company had no right to sink the whole of it in the purchase of new plant and charge 6 per cent. on it. It was compelling it, and it would eventually absorb profits, premiums and Reserve money in proportion to their shares.






