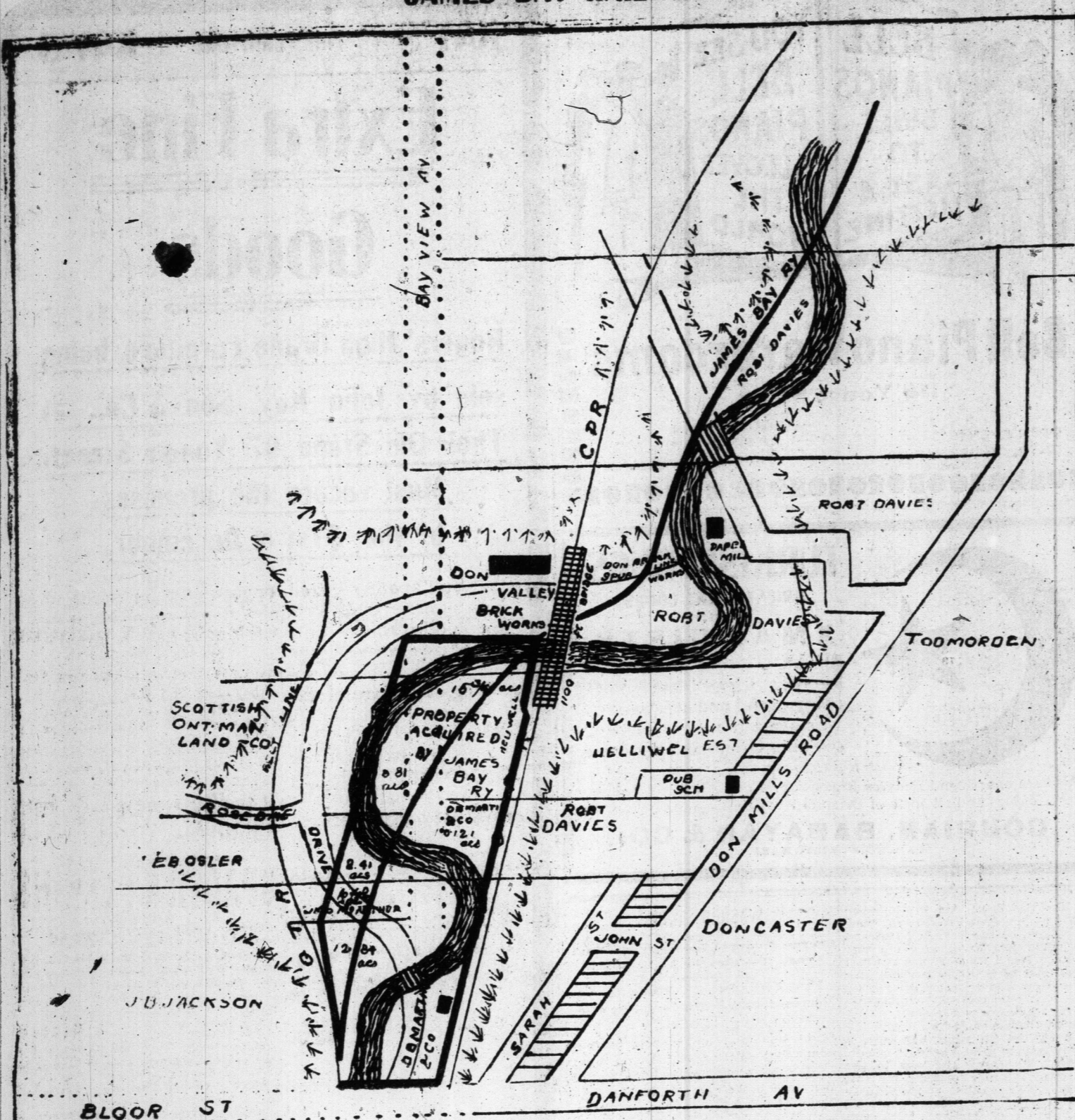

Christmas at the St. Lawrence Market. Display Reflects Credit on the Dealers

Each Stall Keeper Has Vied With the Other in Securing the Best Quality of Animals, and All Succeed.

Christmas at the St. Lawrence Market is in keeping with the reputation that has been established there for nearly a century. As the centre of providing for the table, the old market has long been of its counting, and the present occupants of the various stalls are proud of the past reputation. The Xmas comes for the province's resources. In no country in the world, perhaps, could finer samples of meat be seen than are now displayed by the dealers at this market.

Without making invidious comparisons, John Mallon & Sons' display is immediately to the right on entering the market. The stall is one mass of the finest of beef and other carcasses. It would be difficult to conceive of more tempting roasts than are at the command of this firm. In brief, the carcasses of the eighteen prize steers shown last week at the Junction stock show are hanging in union. These are supplemented by several animals, winners of the contest a few days ago at Guelph. Strung in between the enormous beef carcasses are numerous brace of pheasants, imported direct from the estate of Lord Rosebery in Scotland. The showing in sheep is fully up to the standard. This firm have the still Mallon have gone as far as Chicago to keep up the standard of their business. Sheep, which carried off the champion ship in an exhibit of 18,000 animals at Chicago have found their way to this stall. Two lots of prize winners of the American market, and one lot successful at Guelph, are included in the list. Fronting this fine exhibit and adding a distinct feature are three black bears.

These were shot in New Ontario by F. M. Hepburn, and are complete fat, and are a fine specimen of the breed. The attention of the dead meat, poultry, turkeys, geese and other fowl are on hand in profusion, and in these as in character is maintained in these as in the case of the aggregation. A visit to the stall, if for no other purpose than that of seeing the display, is one that should not be missed.

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WHAT IT MEANS TO CITY TO GIVE \$700 EXEMPTION.

Assessment Commissioner's Figures Don't Cause Him to Look on Plan With Favor.

The railway-commission will at here this morning to settle the terms of the order for the expropriation of the Esplanade property for a new union station, for the Yonge-street bridge, and the Lansdowne-avenue subway. A conference was in progress all day yesterday at the mayor's office, between General Manager McGilgan, M. K. Conroy, and Superintendent Jones of the T.R., and Mayor Duggan. It was reported that the railway companies had threatened to draw out of the scheme altogether unless some of the demands made by property owners were withdrawn. Mr. Conroy has given out in regard to the result of the conference.

The council will meet to-day at 6 o'clock to consider Dr. Noble's resolution to reduce the exemption from taxation of all buildings used as dwellings to the extent of \$500.

Commissioner Fleming has forwarded to the board of control his report on the questions which were submitted to him at the meeting of the board on the 15th inst. He is decidedly in favor of the plan, but with a few modifications. He states that the change would mean an increase in the tax rate from 19 to 23.8 mills.

The amount of the assessment would be reduced from \$148,815.971 to \$122,512,400, a saving of \$26,303,571. There are 20,747 houses now assessed for over \$1000, representing a value of \$10,572,500 in assessment. There are 19,318 dwellings assessed between \$500 and \$1000, and 2290 dwellings assessed for over \$4000. In the cheapest class of houses there are 15,125 tenants and only 562 owners. Of the first class, her, 600 are non-resident owners, who would be benefited to the amount of \$7,022,500, or an average of ten houses worth \$700 each would escape taxation, while a man having a \$1000 residence would save \$12 more than he does now.

Over \$4000 in value, the houses number 3200, of which 1963 are occupied by tenants and 1237 by owners. The exemption would amount to \$2,203,000, but the taxes would be heavier in all cases, running as high as \$589.53 more on a house valued at \$100,000.

COMMITTEE SPENT THE DAY BRINGING FORTH OBSTACLES

Question of Itinerary Long Discussed and Unity Approached Only in General Terms.

The Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational committees, which on Tuesday discussed among themselves the question of church union, at Knox Church yesterday morning and afternoon, and adjourned to hold separate committee meetings in the evening at their respective places of meeting, to talk over the deliberations of the day.

The delegates were rather late in arriving in the morning, and it was close to 11 o'clock before the Scriptural lesson was read and prayers offered. The subject of the lesson was charity, based on 1. Corinthians XIII. Dr. Warden presided, and among other presences were Justice MacLaren, Hon. Collin Campbell, Mr. Biggs, Dr. Rose, Dr. MacLaren, Dr. Allington, Dr. Cornish, Dr. Wilson, Dr. Croxon, Principal Patrick of Winnipeg, Principal Falconer of Halifax, Prof. Bryce of Montreal, J. W. Pebody, Hugh H. Pebody, J. L. Gordon, J. K. Macdonald and N. W. Rowell, K.C. Rev. Dr. Carman, general superintendent of the Methodist Church, was the first speaker. He was followed by Rev. Dr. Potts, Rev. Hugh Pebody, Congregational minister, and Dr. Warden.

The morning discussion was wholly given over to the discussion of the question of church union, and it was not until the afternoon, Rev. Dr. Carman argued for the truth of the Gospel on a firm basis. Other speakers were of the opinion that such a union should be excluded from the discussion and that no union could come by lighting the position of the union with a large measure of the truth of the Lord Jesus Christ, and all must be agreed on the same doctrine of salvation. Predestination and the theories of the atonement with similar theories, not essential to the discussion, were not entered into the discussion, the broad question of union being largely left to the essential features of the Gospel, and the truth as it is in Christ Jesus. There will probably be a union of some kind, but it is not clear what form it will take.
