Morning and Evening Stars.

Mercury will be a Morning Star until the 7th February—it will then be an Evening Star until the 25th April, a Morning Star until the 20th June, an Evening Star until the 6th August, a Morning Star until the 14th October, an Evening Star until the 11th December, then a Morning Star until the end of the year.

Venus will be a Morning Star until the 13th July, then an Evening Star until the close of the year.

Jupiter will be an Evening Star until the 8th March, and a Morning Star until the end of the year.

Saturn will be a Morning Star until the 24th June, then an Evening Star until the end of the year.

ECLIPSES.

In the Year 1856 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

1.—A total eclipse of the Sun, April 4th invisible in North America—but visible in the Eastern Hemisphere.

2.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, April 20; visible in Long. 95° to 178° West of Greenwich, Lat. from 10° to 13° South. Invisible in Prince Edward Island.

3.—An annular eclipse of the Sun, September 28; invisible in North America—but visible in the North Pacific Ocean.

4.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, October 13; invisible in P. E. Island.

CUCUMBER SEED.—Some people do not know how to cleanse the cucumber seeds which they save from their own gardens. They cut the cucumbers open, dry them, and dig out the seed with the dried mucilage adhering to the seeds. A better way is, when the cucumbers are ripe, cut them open, and scrape out the seed with all the mucilage, into an iron or tin vessel large enough to contain them. Put water into the vessel, and set it in a place moderately warm. In a few hours, fermentation will take place, that will collect all the mucilage together on the top of the water, leaving the sound and heavy seeds to sink to the bottom. Pour off the water with the thick stuff on the top, and then you have the seeds clean. Put them where they will dry, and then lay them away till next spring.

Apple Bread.—A very light pleasant bread is made in France by a mixture of apples and flour, in the proportion of one of the former to two of the latter. The usual quantity of yeast is employed as in making common bread, and is beaten with flour and warm pulp of the apples after they have been boiled, and the dough is then considered as set; it is then put into a proper vessel, and allowed to rise for eight or twelve hours, and then baked in long loaves. Very little water is requisite; none, generally, if the apples are very fresh.

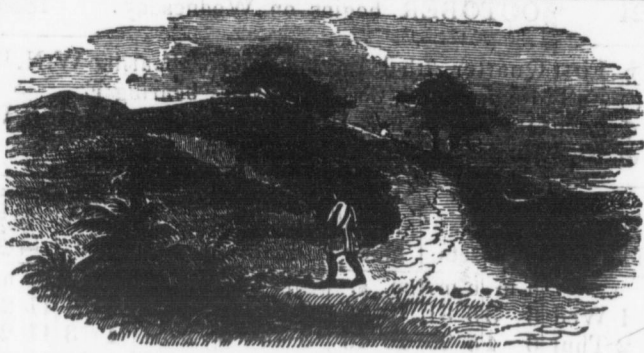

SEED CORN.—Farmers, if they would have the best seed corn, and improve their kind for another year, must not neglect to select the earliest and fairest ears this fall, and preserve them carefully for seed. They may be gathered by the hand from the fields as soon as the husks turn white, and should then be tied and hung up where the air will circulate freely all winter, and where the rats and mice cannot reach them. In all fields some ears are earlier than others. The earliest, selected for seed, will insure a field, nearly the whole of which will be ripe as early next year as the ears you gather out for seed this season. If you allow the later ears to be taken for seed, you will find a late crop next fall. The surest way, therefore, to improve a crop is to be careful in selecting the seed; for it is a universal law of nature, that “like begets its like.”—*Drew’s Rural.*

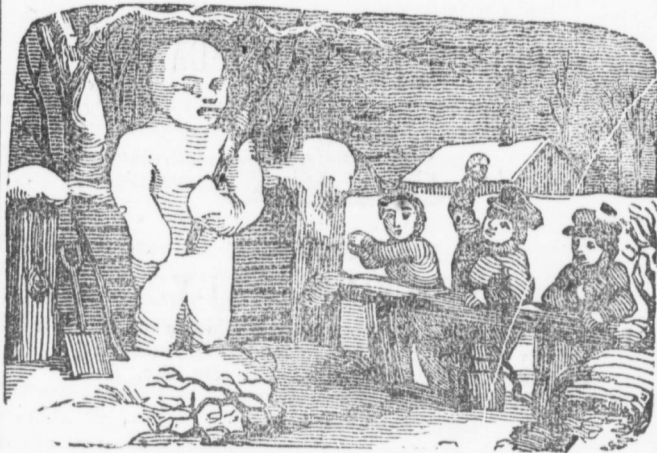
