Leo Salay, an Assyrian, aged 18, faced Magistrate Ritchie this morning on a charge of indecent assault, preferred by Mrs. Michael Shannon, also an Assyrian, who alleges that he entered her home on Erin street last night and, going into her bedroom, made indecent proposals to her and attempted criminal assault.

Mrs. Shannon appeared in court this morning with a number of others from her neighborhood, including Mrs. Hattie. An aunt of the prisoner was also present, as well as several of his friends. The women who came to give evidence were told by his honor that they would not be heard today, and their presence was not required, and they withdrew.

Dr. A. W. Macrae appears for the prosecution and E. S. Ritchie for the defence.

Mrs. Shannon was the only witness examined, and when placed on the stand testified that her name was Amelia Shannon; she was married and was 17 years of age. She lived in the house with Mr. Hattie, at 135 Erin street. Her husband (Michael) was away in Carleton county selling goods. The bear says the market is a purely manipulated one. No doubt it is. But so was the depressed market of June, in which the lowest prices were on sales by speculators of stocks they did not own. Different views are expressed as to the ground for the advance, but all agree that it has been greatly assisted by the efforts of bears to buy back stocks which they sold when they did not own them.


