CAPT. THOMPSON STEPS UP

This Afternoon's Report Continues RECOMMENDATIONS Cheerful—Bad Weather, Though, on the Somme—Russians Win on 30 Miles of Riga Front

London, July 24—British troops have captured a large part of the village of Pozieres, says the official British statement issued this afternoon. They also gained some ground near Highwood in the direction of Guillemont.

The night, the statement adds, was comparatively calm.
The statement follows: "Apart from continuous heavy shelling by both sides during ne night, comparative calm followed the severe fighting of yester-

"Yesterday, between Highwood and Guillemont, repeated counter-attacks by the enemy gained for him no advantage, and very heavy casualties wers inflicted by our artillery and machine guns.
"We gained some ground near Highwood and in the direction of Guillemont. In the neighborhood of Pozieres, we secured important advantages in spite of the stubborn defense of the enemy, and a large portion of the village is now in our hands. 

There are thirty-cight German ships and Four Austrians in Brazilian ports, estimated to be worth between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000. The biggest ship of the fleet is the Hamburg-American liner Bleucher, net tonnage 7,592.

WESTERN LIBERALS

(From the Winnipeg Free Press.)

Mr. Rogers' newspaper says that there are tens of thousands of Liberals in western Canada who are leaderless. In a sense the statement is not without truth; but the western Liberals are not worrying about the situation. They are doing their own thinking, and they do not feel the need of leadership of the kind known to the newspaper in question; the leadership that instructs they are to think and whom they are to elect. Western Liberalism to the eye of the political machinist may have an appearance of disorganization at the moment; but in reality it was never, more alive, nor has it ever held grater promise of usefulness to the people of Canada. Organization and leadership will emerge when their need appears; that is to say, before the next Dominion contest. Meanwhile Tories of the old thoroughgoing type are becoming an extinct specimen in western Canada. There is something in present-day conditions in western Canada that is fatal to Tory-jism; and the one-time adherents of the party of trade restrictions and corporation affiliations are finding themselves one with the "leaderless" Liberals in a great movement that promises to send a body of representatives to Ottawa at the next election which will be numerous enough and able enough to give the west, at last, the power in parliament which it should wield.

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
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
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

SUNDAY WAR NEWS FROM ALL FRONTS FAVORABLE

London, July 23—A despatch to Reuters Telegram Company from Petrograd says:
"A Russian advance of five miles is reported on the left wing of the Riga sector. General Von
Linsingen's recent losses on the Styr and Lipa rivers are computed at least 50,000 men out of the three

corps engaged.

"The Russians are on the point of enterting the northeast corner of Galicia, General BoehmErmolli and General Count Von Bothmer being out-flanked, both on the north and south.

"The heights captured by the Russians are only four miles from the summit of the Carpathians, and the Hungarian frontier in the direction of Maramaros Sziget.

"The Russians hold the whole of the Trebizond Erzerum road in Asiatic Turkey.

Petrograd, July 22, via London, 8.10 p.m.—The Russians have driven the Teutonic forces resisting them south of the River Lipa, in Volhynia, near the Galician border, beyond the town of Berestechk, to the west. More than 12,000 prisoners were captured by the Russians on Thursday and Friday, making a total of 26,000 captured since July 16:

Vienna, July 23, via London, 7.54 p.m.—Under the menace of a heavy Russian assault the Austrians in the Carpathian region of Southern Bukowina, southeast of Tatarow, have withdrawn towards the main ridge of the Carpathian, the war office officially announced today.
