### SIR WM. MULOCK IS 81 YEARS OLD

He Rose From Farm Boy to be Chief Justice of Ontario.

Eighty-one years ago today, says The Thomas Mulock, an Irish physician, and his wife, nee Mary Cawthra, became the down Yonge street that night bore tidings of the stork's arrival to the Toronto relatives. Little did they dream that the tiny stranger was destined to become Sir William Mulock, who after a distinguished career in politics, would be Chief Justice of Ontario. Hard times soon followed for the Mulocks, for the doctor died, leaving a widow and young family. Little William went to school in Newmarket, and between times toiled hard on the farm to help his widowed mother. Mr. Cotter, son of a Waterloo veteran, and at 86 still County Crown Attorney at Barrie, knew the Bill Mulock of those days, when not only hoys, but grown people congregated to watch the novel sight of Ontario's first railway train drawn by the locomotive Toronto, belching wood sparks from her huge stack, thunder past to Newmarket station at 20 miles an hour.

Pitching hay on the farm, doing statutory labor on the roads, young William Mulock earned enough to send him to Toronto University. While studying for his Arts degree he lived in rooms on Melinda street, cooked his own meals and eked out a living as study master at Upper Canada College. A gold med-silist in modern languages, he took his degree in 1863 and was called to the bar at Osgoode Hall in 1868. Oddly enough just when young Mulock was determin-ing to become a disciple of Blackstone, Henry Blackstone, a grandson of that famous English judge, was in success-ful practice at Newmarket. Was it co-incidence or an inspiration? In any case the young lawyer who had mar-ried into the wealthy and influential Crowther family in 1870, rapidly advanced at his chosen profession, founded the family firm, and in due course, be-

North York, with better taste than it displayed at the last general election, sent William Mulock to Parliament in 1882, where, among other things, he moved in 1894 for a reduction of the Governor-General's salary from \$50,000 to \$25,000 a year, and in 1895 did his best to stop the pernicious practice of members of Parliament accepting rail-way passes between their constituencies and Ottawa. When the long years of opposition were past and the sunshine of Laurier's premiership burst upon the Liberals in 1896, the faithful fighter from North York was rewarded with a knighthood and the Postmaster-Generalknighthood and the Postmaster-General-ship, which office he retained until the end of his political life. Sir William was also first Minister of Labor. He, too, was the father of Imperial Penny Postage. 'Twas in 1898 that the late John Ross Robertson, then M. P. for East Toronto, dropped the first letter bearing the Mulock-designed map and the legend "We hold a greater empire than has been" into the box at the General Post Office in Toronto.

Sir William was Vice-Chancellor of Toronto University from 1881 to 1901, when stress of work caused his retirement. His other public offices included presidency of the War-time Toronto and York Patriotic League, where he paid \$1,000 for a single T.S.R. car ticket put up at auction. Sir William has been Acting Lieutenant Governor of Ontario

estate at Mulock's Corners, a stone's throw from his birthplace up Yonge street, he completely drops his legal mein. He loves to gaze at his prize cattle or to give orders concerning the blooded Shetland and Dartmoor ponies, which are his hobby. Here he lives all summer, motoring to Osgoode Hall as fast as the law allows. And here ir cold weather visits he sits before a crackling fire of maple logs, paring one of the crisp Spies grown in his orchard planted with slips from the Kalser's estates, or cracking black Canadian walnuts from the grove on the farm he grew from the kernels. On occasions like this Sir William's mind must hark back to the days when he drove with other young people to dance at the hospitable "Homewood" of the Barwick family on the hill at Holland Landing. Or perhaps he meditates just when it will be safe to take his grandson, William Mulock the fourth, to the pew at St. Paul's where the Chief Justice. formerly a Cathedralite, has been seen of late with his son and grandson, lis-tening to Canon Cody's brilliant exposi-tion of the Scriptures.

According to latest reports no epidemic of influenza is so far scheduled for appearance this winter.

This acute infectious disease in practically all cases invoives the respiratory tract, gastro-intestinal canal and in many persons the nervous system, together with a weakened heart and reduced circulation. It is also met with endemically (in certain localities or peculiar to some classes of people). One must constantly be on guard to stall off influenza during the germ season (winter and early spring).

TAMMANY AFTER


