



Housework is Worth \$10,000,000,000 to Nation

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 21.—"Women of the United States who are doing their own housework are making an annual contribution of more than ten billion dollars to the economic resources of the nation," declared Mrs. Thomas G. Winter, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in a speech here.

"Every woman who does her own housework is making a contribution of at least \$40," she said. "The club women should recognize this contribution and should demand that provision be made by the Government for the training of teachers and other women in home economics."







APPLICATION FOR RECOUNT

Technical Objection Sustained by Judge Armstrong -Charlotte Recount on Sat-

An objection taken by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter against a recount of the votes in St. John county in the provincial general election of October 9 was upheld by Judge Armstrong in the county court yesterday afternoon. Judge Armstrong held that there was nothing to show in the rettion of John McKinnon that Mr. held that there was nothing to show in the petition of John McKinnon that Mr. McKinnon was an elector in the county, and the petition was dismissed. The de-claration day totals showed that Hon. Dr. Baxter was elected by eight votes over A. F. Bentley, government candi-

Judge Armstrong's Decision.

At 4 p. m. Judge Armstrong gave his decision as follows:
"Judge of the St. John County Court."
It is true that the County Court Act designates this as the St. John County Court but the same Act at Section 3 enacts that "there shall be one County Court Judge for the County of the City and County of Saint John." Sometimes in signing orders, etc., one term is used and sometimes the other. I think no one could be misled by the phrase used. The objection is not sustained. I may remark that the only paper handed me on the application for this recount was the affidavit of John McKinnon. I drew up the four orders and added the designation to which objection is now made. Since At 4 p. m. Judge Armstrong gave his to which objection is now made. Since that application, an application was made to me for a recount of the City of Saint John Election. The solicitor presenting the same had prepared eight typewritten orders for signature with the words "Judge of the Saint John County Court" typewritten below the space left for signature. I called his attention to the fact that the designation differed from that used in the County recount to which he replied that he would prefer that the designation should remain as typewritten, to which I consented. This I add in explanation of the difference in the designations used in the two separate orders for the recount.

Another objection is that there is no applicant. While the statute does not in terms provide for a formal application, it does speak of an application and of an applicant. Section 145 reads: "If the recount or final addition does not so after the "results of the poll as to affect the terturns, the judge shall order the costs of the candidate or candidates appearing to be elected to be paid by the applicant" and Section 147 (2) reads: "If the deposit is insufficient the party in whose favor costs are awarded shall have his action for the balance." If the successful party should be a respondent candidate, to whom is he to look for his costs if in excess of the deposit? It must be to some person who sets the machinery in motion, that is to say the applicant. In this case the solicitor, on inaking the application for the recount, did not represent himself as appearing for any particular person. He simply produced the affidavit of John McKinnon who swears to an irregularity at one poll and also swears that he is desirous and requires that there be a recount of the votes polled in the county of St. John at and for such election. However, in my view this point need not be disposed of because of the effect which I feel ought to be given to the remaining contention. This contention is that the application, if John McKinnon be an applicant and there certainly is no other, is not that of a candidate or an elector. Mr. McKinnon's affidavit states that he acted as agent for Dr. Curren (one of the candidates) at one of the polls, but it is not necessary that he be an elector in order to act as such agent, otherwise there is no evidence before me as to Mr. McKinnon's affidavit states that he constable as the recount proceedings, to show that he is entitled to invoke the jurisdiction of this court.
