CANADA WINS TWO SECONDS This Morning's Results At Olympic Games in Stockholm WEATHER WAS DULL

Canadian Finished Second in Two Heats of The 5,000 Metres Running Race — Too Many Entries in the Wrestling Competitions

(Canadian Press) Stockholm, Sweden, July 9.—The fourth day of the athletic section of the Olympic games began today in dull weather and with rain in prospect. Several thousands of running enthusiasts assembled for the principal event of the morning, which was the decision of the first three trial heats of the 5,000 metres flat race. Canadians were well represented on the spectators' benches, and had the satisfaction of seeing their men finish second in each of the heats.

THIRTY YEARS IN PRISON FOR CAMORRISTS One of Them Cuts Throat in Court on Hearing Sentence Pronounced

Pandemonium Reigns as Judge Declares Their Fate—Prisoners Shout, Pray and Weep—Backbone of the Terrorizing Organization is Broken

(Canadian Press) Viterbo, Italy, July 9.—The verdict of yesterday, finding the Camorrista guilty after two years' trial, as a whole, proved somewhat of a surprise and all are agreed that the severity of the sentences is the last blow to the Camorra, which has practically been annihilated since the arrest of its leaders. The verdict found Corrado Sorrento guilty of the murder of Giovanni Rapa, Di Maria and the others are convicted of being instigators of the crime, and members of a criminal organization. NOTED FRENCH AIRMAN FALLS TO HIS DEATH Rene Bedel Strikes Telegraph Wires in Descent and Motor Crushes Him

Chalon sur Saone, France, July 9.—Rene Bedel, one of the most experienced airmen, and the holder of the Pommeury cup for cross-country flying, which he won from Jules Vedrines, met his death this morning before the eyes of thousands of French troops, who were assembled on the ground at Mourmelon-Le-Grand near here. Bedel, who had come in his monoplane from Villacoublay, near Paris, to participate in the manoeuvres, arrived above the camp after a fine flight. He was about to descend when his monoplane struck telegraph wires which a prevailing haze evidently prevented him from seeing. The machine sprang and Bedel was thrown to the ground. It is believed that he was not killed by the fall, but the motor of his aeroplane fell on his body, and he was crushed almost beyond recognition.

PRINCE ARTHUR OF CONNAUGHT TO WED RUSSIAN PRINCESS? Report Says Betrothal to Daughter of Grand Duke Alexander Michaelovitch Will be Announced Soon

New York, July 9.—A cable despatch to the New York Times from Paris this morning says:— The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Echo de Paris, reports that Prince Arthur of Connaught, only son of the Duke of Connaught, will soon marry Princess Irene Alexandrovna, daughter of the Grand Duke Alexander Michaelovitch, who is a cousin of the Czar. It is said that the marriage was decided upon last August but no official announcement was made owing to the youth of the princess, who, however, is now just about to reach her seventeenth birthday, when the betrothal will be announced. The marriage, it is added, will be celebrated in St. Petersburg and it is expected that King George will attend the ceremony.

THE BORDEN BALLOON IS NEAR COLLAPSE Disappointment Awaits The Tories in the Old Country NO NAVAL POLICY

Canada's Prime Minister is to Deliver a Speech on Wednesday Night — He Will Go With Pelletier to Gay Paree

(Canadian Press) London, July 9.—It is generally understood that Mr. Borden's speech at the meeting of the R. C. I. on Wednesday evening, will somewhat dispel the popular belief largely inspired from Canada that he has come to London with a "cut and dried" naval policy. On the contrary, it will be found that his attitude today will not vary much from that outlined in his speech in November, 1910, when he said in effect that the pressing needs of complete naval defence would be considered on their merits; that a permanent policy would be carefully considered and discussed and that such action would be taken as would meet the requirements of both cases.

THIRTY MANNERS IN ENGLAND KILLED

Cambrough, Yorkshire, Eng., July 9.—Thirty miners were killed and two injured by a coal dam explosion at thirty-six feet in the Cadeby colliery here early this morning. King George, who is making a tour in the neighborhood, yesterday paid a visit to an adjoining coal pit. Many people in St. John will hear, with regret, of the death of Gilbert L. Purdy, son of Gilbert Purdy, and for thirty-six years accountant with the firm of Andre Chubb & Co. here, which occurred at the home corner of Queen and Canterbury streets, this morning. Mr. Purdy was one of the prominent citizens. He was a great grandson of Gilbert Purdy, one of the loyalists who resided for many years at Purdy's Point on the St. John river. He was born on October 18, 1832, in the North End, and was educated in John Montague's school there. Later he studied in Mr. Mills' school in Coburg street.

DEATH OF GILBERT PURDY After leaving school he went into the insurance office of William J. Starr and later was with Schofield & Beasly. After leaving this firm he went with Andre Chubb & Co. He was held in esteem by all who knew him. Mr. Purdy was married twice. His first wife was Miss Frances M. Alexander. By the union there were three children: H. Gilbert Purdy, teler of the Bank of Montreal in Buckingham, Quebec; Miss Edith and Mrs. William Warwick of this city. His first wife died about twenty years ago. About eight years ago he married Miss May Bookhout, daughter of William Bookhout, of this city, who survives him. Three sisters also survive. They are:— Mrs. J. Boyd McLaren and Mrs. Robert Gale, of this city, and Mrs. Elford S. Bassett, of Barabul, Minn. Fraternally he was a prominent member of the I. O. O. F. For twenty-five years he was a prominent member of the congregation of the Mission church, St. John Baptist. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from that church.

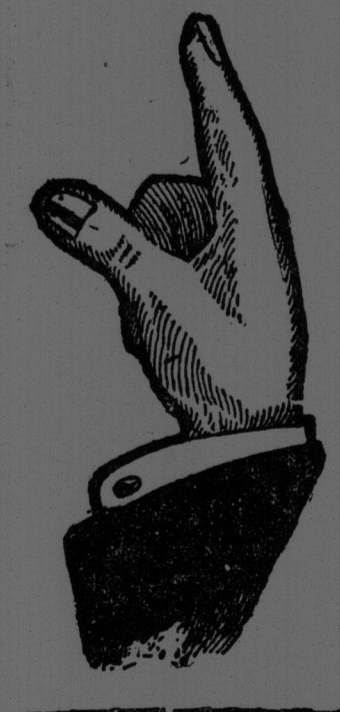

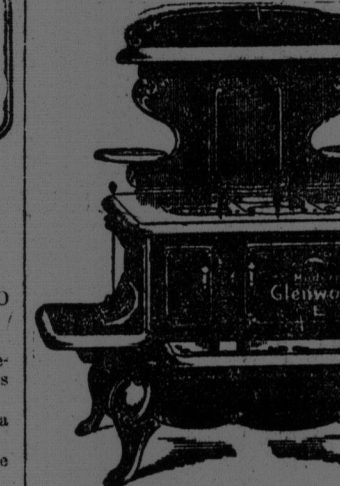

CONDENSED DESPATCHES. London, July 9-The active British fleet in English waters and the vessels from the Mediterranean station consisting of some 315 ships of all classes, gathered at Spithead today for inspection by the members of the House of Lords and Commons. The Canadian premier, with his colleagues attended the inspection, which opened with a display of aeroplanes and hydroplanes now being used for the first time at British naval manoeuvres.

STATEMENT ON CROP CONDITIONS OF WORLD. (Bulletin of Agricultural Statistics-June 1912). The Bulletin of Agricultural Statistics for June has just been issued by the International Institute of Agriculture in Rome. The bulletin contains tables showing the area under wheat, rye, barley, oats, maize and rice, and the estimated production in the United States it is estimated at 98,294,000 quanta, or 84.3 per cent. of last year's output (winter wheat only); and in India at 90,709,722 quanta or 97.7 per cent.

DR. FLANDERS ACCEPTS. Dr. C. R. Flanders has accepted the appointment to the congregation of St. John's, this having Centenary pulpit vacant. The latter congregation has taken no steps yet towards securing a permanent pastor.

NEW BANK BUILDING. F. Neil Brodie is preparing plans for a new building for the Bank of New Brunswick to replace their branch at Grand Manan, which was destroyed by fire on Sunday night. Like the previous structure, it will be of wood, but will be devoted entirely to bank purposes, instead of providing accommodation for the manager's residence, as formerly.

URGE TRUSH. The council of the Board of Trade at a special meeting this morning passed a resolution endorsing the resolution adopted by the Quebec Board of Trade petitioning the Dominion government to hurry the completion of the terminal facilities at Quebec and St. John in order to have them ready for the use of the Grand Trunk Pacific by the time the section between Cochrane Junction and Winnipeg is completed.

JUVENILE COURT MONTREAL DOING MUCH GOOD WORK. Numerous Small Offenders Brought Before Judge in Course of Typical Day. Montreal, July 8-The juvenile court in Montreal is now in full swing. **CARLETON COUNTY HAS STORM AFTER EXTREME HEAT**

Two Barns Struck By Lightning and Burned — Woodstock Battery Sergeant Reported Missing

Woodstock, N. B., July 9.—(Special)—The extreme heat of yesterday culminated in an electrical storm about six o'clock. Two barns at Richmond Corner, owned by George Bell, were struck by lightning and burned to the ground. They contained a lot of farm machinery, most of which was saved. The loss is about \$2,000 with no insurance. There are no fatalities reported in this section.

**CANADA WINS TWO SECONDS**

(Continued from page 1.)  
In the first heat of the 5,000 metres flat race, George V. Bonhag led the field throughout, except for a brief moment at the middle of the race, when G. N. Hill, an Australian, went ahead during the last mile. Bonhag was fifteen yards ahead of Docteau, a Canadian, with F. N. Hibbins of England another fifteen yards behind and the two other starters far back when they entered the last lap. The Canadian, with a fine burst of speed, drew up and finished only six yards behind Bonhag, with the Englishman twenty yards behind, and the Australian 100 yards farther back. The Swede Lundstrum gave up a quarter mile from the end.

**Second Heat**

The second heat virtually duplicated the first. The representative of the United States made the pace for two-thirds of the race, the two English runners, E. W. Hutson and C. H. Porter, following closely on the heels of Louis Scott and Edward G. Fitzgerald. Joseph Keeper, a Canadian and the two Swedes, R. Modig and M. Persson were only a short distance away. The real fight came early in the third mile, when the Englishman Ruffell took the lead for a few yards, but then dropped by the way. Fitzgerald came up to the front but soon fell back, and Louis Scott reached the tape with a lead of four yards over Joseph Keeper, the Canadian, who was two feet ahead of the Englishman Docteau. The Swede Persson finished a lap behind but his compatriot Modig withdrew during the first mile. The United States showed very poorly in the third heat. Garnet M. Wickhoff, University of Ohio, led before he had covered two-thirds of the distance. The Englishman E. Glover and C. H. Porter led most of the way, keeping together all the time. The Swede Karlsson challenged them in the last 1,000 yards. Coming to the front with a rush, he steadily gained and finished 200 yards ahead of E. Glover, while C. H. Porter was another 100 yards behind. The Finnish representative, A. Lindholm, and a Russian runner were outdistanced.

Montreal, July 9.—Saxby Blair, late head of the horticultural department at MacDonald College, who has resigned to accept the post of superintendent of the experimental farm at Kenilville, N. The secretary reported that \$301.38 was deducted by the chamberlain, from the June assessment, to pay the taxes of teachers and the employees.

Richibucto, July 8—A mild form of smallpox has again made its appearance in town. A house in which two French families are living was this morning quarantined.

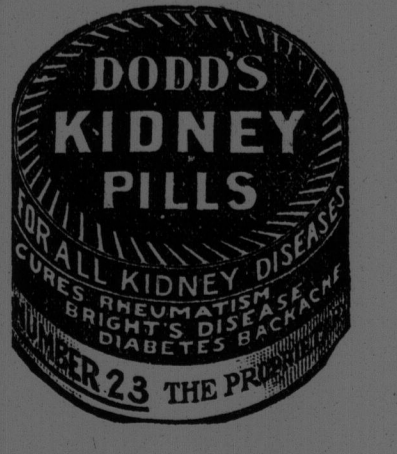

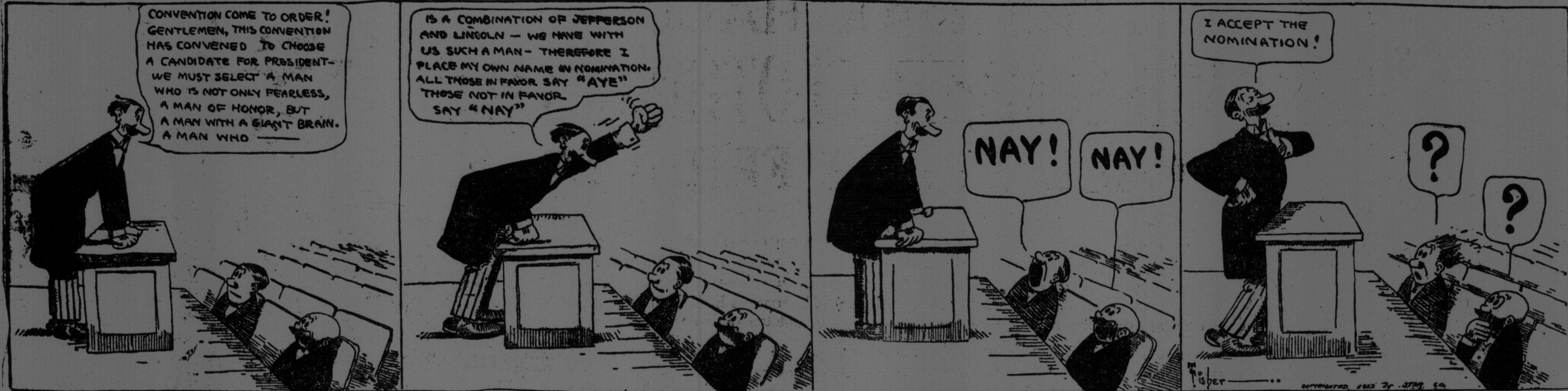

Mrs. Lewis is on her way to the scene, planned to leave for Boston on Monday morning, but the shock was so great that she was too ill to travel. There will be keen sympathy here, and wherever the news is read, for those who have suffered so great a loss in so tragic a manner.
